Objective:

1.Immediate Relief: Provide essential food items to alleviate hunger and food insecurity among internally displaced women and their families.

Introduction: This report provides an overview of the intervention conducted by Yerwa Foundation. The foundation extended a grant of 800,000 Naira to support leg surgery for Abu who was a victim of a severe fire incident that left him with extensive burns on his back muscles and leg. The incident resulted in significant damage, impairing his mobility and causing persistent pain. Abu Hussaini was referred to our medical facility for evaluation and intervention.

The funds for this intervention were obtained from a previous fundraising effort tagged Maryam. Sponsors: 1. Direct Cash Donor Funds

Intervention:

Upon careful assessment, it was determined that Abu's burn injuries required surgical intervention to improve his condition. The primary focus of the intervention was on his leg, which had sustained severe burns and required reconstructive surgery.

Medical Procedure:

1.Surgery: Abu underwent a series of reconstructive surgeries to address the burn injuries on his leg. The surgical procedures aimed to graft healthy skin to the affected areas, reduce scarring, and improve overall functionality. The surgery was performed by a skilled medical team, at the Borno Orthopaedic Centre. **Post-Surgery Progress:**

Three months following the surgical intervention, we conducted a comprehensive assessment of Alhaji Ali's recovery and progress.

IMPACT:

1.Improved Mobility: Abu has shown significant improvement in his ability to walk and move around. The surgical intervention on his leg has played a crucial role in enhancing his mobility and reducing discomfort. **2.Pain Management:** Post-surgery, Abu has reported a substantial reduction in pain levels. He can now function with less pain, which has greatly improved his overall quality of life.

3.Emotional Well-being: His emotional well-being has also improved since the surgery. The reduction in pain and improved mobility has contributed to his overall sense of well-being and optimism about the future.

Future Recommendations:

1.Continued Rehabilitation: Abu should continue with his rehabilitation and physical therapy to further enhance his mobility and strength.

2.Pain Management: Ongoing pain management and follow-up care should be provided to ensure his comfort and well-being.

3.Psychosocial Support: Supportive counselling and mental health services should be offered to address any emotional trauma resulting from the fire incident and the subsequent medical procedures.

Yerwa Foundation Grant Proposal Project: Support for Flood Victims

Objective:

Yerwa Foundation is dedicated to providing assistance to victims of flooding in our community who have been severely affected by the recent disaster. We have raised funds to support families in need, but due to limited resources, we can only select one family as beneficiaries. The purpose of this grant proposal is to outline our methodology for selecting the family that will receive the donated funds.

Families in Consideration:

- 1.Ekwa Ruth Kokomo:** Household of 8 people, displaced from a 2-bedroom apartment.
- 2.Mrs. Divine Favour:** Family of 6, displaced from a one-room apartment.
- 3.Bodisere Bubaraye:** Nursing mother of a 2-month-old, family of 5, displaced from a 1-bedroom apartment.
- 4.Oge Emberru:** Family of 4 displaced from original dwelling.

Methodology for Family Selection:

In selecting the family that will receive the donated funds, we propose a comprehensive and transparent methodology that takes into account the severity of their situation, the potential impact of the assistance, and the urgency of their needs. The following criteria will guide our decision:

- 1.Assessment of Need:** Our team will conduct on-site assessments of the living conditions of each family, taking into account factors such as the extent of damage, safety, and immediate needs. We will assess the current state of their housing, access to clean water, sanitation facilities, and the availability of basic necessities.
- 2.Vulnerability:** We will assess the vulnerability of each family, considering factors such as the number of dependents, age, health condition, and specific needs (e.g., nursing mothers with infants). Families facing extreme vulnerability will be given priority.
- 3.Impact:** We will evaluate the potential impact of the assistance on the selected family's ability to recover from the flooding. This includes assessing whether the support will help them regain stable living conditions, access to education, or employment opportunities.
