A Final Message from Your 2005/2006 President

Thank you all for your support during my two-year term of office. I especially want to thank you for your great support for our efforts to adopt and support Sea-Service ships and shore stations. Why? Because for me, there is no greater Navy League mission than to recognize the men and women who work to keep us free.

We support our adopted units in many ways. Here's one example. The submarine Alexandria had an XBOX360 game device on their "wish list." Our Council purchased and shipped the device, along with extra controllers and a variety of games. Because the sub was deployed, it took six months for the gift to reach the sub. All that time, the crew knew it was coming, and anticipation rose and fell with each mail delivery that came up short. When the delivery was finally made, it came with a donated supply of Italian Biscotti and Hershey's licorice. Here in part, is what the sub's commanding officer wrote:

Dear Nancy and the Navy League of Northern Virginia,

Please send along my deepest and most sincere thank you to you and all of the Navy Leaguers for making the XBox360, controllers and games all possible. We are some sea going dogs with 70% operating tempo (OPTEMPO) this year, a 7-month deployment with an almost 90% OPTEMPO and a grand total of 17 days in homeport over a 9 plus month period. My crew does all of this while living in a little tube far from home and they never complain; they are just honored to serve. You and the Navy League continue to make a huge difference in their lives. The fact hat a group of strangers would donate such a nice gift or continue to reward them with monetary awards gives them a sense of pride and accomplishment.

The Navy League by adopting us has become the symbol of the nation to the crew. A group of dedicated Americans who care about them and what they do. The XBOX could not have come at a better time—the crew saw that even in the middle of nowhere, we are still connected to our Navy League. I tell you when the boxes were brought to my stateroom, it was like Christmas—the guys suspected what it was when they saw your name and I had just about every one of my electronics technicians ask me if I needed any help setting things up. It was in the crew's mess and being played within 15 minutes of opening the box.

I cannot thank you enough for everything you and the league do to take care of my ship. Bravo Zulu (Navy talk for Good Job) to you and the Navy League.

I will be sending you my quarterly update in our next port call and will include all the data about my sailors of the quarter. Thanks for caring.
