THE LITURGY: INVOCATION

As Lutherans, we have a pattern we use when we gather together for worship. This pattern gives structure and order to our time together in God's presence, for our God is not one of confusion but one of peace (1 Cor. 14:33). The structure allows us the freedom and space to focus on who God is, who we are, and what He has done for us.

The term we have for this pattern is "liturgy". Liturgy is a Greek term that simply means "Public Work." We define it more as external ritual or pattern that governs our time in God's presence, individually or collectively, for a particular end: being fashioned more and more like Jesus.

Over the next few months in the Newsletter we are going to explore, briefly, the meaning of the different parts of the liturgy as a way of explaining what we do and why we do it and what it means for us as we gather together for worship, coming into God's presence and being guided into an exploration of our faith as lived out daily. While there are variations on the idea of liturgy across denominations, we will look at this from a primarily Lutheran perspective.

We will start at the beginning: The Invocation.

It seems that this part of liturgy has been around since ancient times. In most worship services in the Lutheran tradition (special services such as Good Friday and Easter Sunrise being the exceptions), worship begins with the Invocation. The invocation is a space that does two things (at least). One: it orients us as to who we are worshiping: the Triune God. This Triune God created and established everything in

the universe. We are His creations.

Second, it orients us around our baptisms. We are baptized in this same Triune Name, and thus not only are we created by God but also we are recreated by God when He reclaimed us and remade us by means of the Word, either heard and applied by the Spirit or experienced through the means of Grace in Baptism. The invocation then is a way of grounding us in our identity as children of God, citizens of His kingdom, and followers of Jesus.

This sets up everything we do for the rest of the service. It is in this identity that we approach God and He comes to us.
