



The First Marine to be Awarded the Medal of Honor

The Marine Corps has certainly had its share of recipients of the Medal of Honor. But who was the first Marine to earn that award?

John F. Mackie (October 1, 1835 – June 18, 1910) was a USMC sergeant during the Civil War. He was awarded the nation's highest military decoration for valor, the Medal of Honor for his actions aboard the USS *Galena* during a battle with Confederate Marines (yes, the Confederacy had its own Marine Corps) and artillery batteries at Fort Daling near Richmond, VA, on May 15, 1862.

Sgt. Mackie was the first Marine to receive the Medal of Honor in the history of the Marine Corps.

By way of background, Mackie enlisted in the Marine Corps from New York on April 24, 1861. His first assignment was with the Marine Detachment on board the USS *Savannah*. He was promoted to corporal on March 1, 1862. On April 1, he began serving on the ironclad USS *Galena*.

The *Galena* was a broad-sided ironclad with a maximum speed of 8 knots. She carried a crew of 164 and was armed with only six heavy cannon (four 9" smoothbore Dhalgrens and two 100 pound Parrot rifles). She was only clad in 3" of iron, which left her vulnerable to enemy fire from anything larger than 12 pounders.

During Union General McClennan's Peninsula Campaign, on May 15, 1862, a five-ship Union Navy squadron, including the *Galena*, steamed up the James River to test the defenses of the capital of the Confederacy, Richmond, VA. After reaching a bend in the river, the squadron encountered submerged obstacles and heavy fire from two battalions of Confederate Marines positioned on the banks of the river along with artillery fire from Fort Darling atop Drewry's Bluff about eight miles below Richmond. The Confederates had installed numerous cannon including one 10" and two 8" columbiads at Fort Darling. The columbiad was a large caliber smoothbore muzzle loading cannon able to fire heavy projectiles at both high and low trajectories. This feature enabled the columbiad to fire solid shot or shell to long ranges, making it an excellent seacoast defense weapon for its day.

Mackie commanded 12 Marines on the gun deck of *Galena*. During the battle (which would come to be known as the Battle of Drewry's Bluff), most of *Galena*'s naval gun crew was killed or wounded. John Mackie was a Marine sharpshooter handling a musket and firing at the Confederate Marines who were manning the banks riverbank around Ft. Drewry. Seeing the numerous casualties among the Naval gun crews, Mackie spontaneously led a group of

Marines to take over operation of two of the cannon of the *Galena* for the remainder of the battle.

It was hot work. The fire from the Confederate fort resulted in the *Galena* being damaged during the battle because her armor was too thin to prevent the heavy Confederate shots from penetrating. The fort's artillery inflicted severe damage on the *Galena* and forced the Union squadron to turn back down the James River.

On July 10, 1863, Mackie was awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions aboard the *Galena* on May 15, 1862. Mackie was particularly mentioned for his "gallant conduct and services and signal acts of devotion to duty".

On October 11, 1863, John Mackie received the medal while on his new assignment aboard the USS *Seminole* which was anchored off Sabine Pass, Texas. Mackie was presented the Medal of Honor during a ceremony on the quarterdeck of the ship.

John Mackie was given an honorable discharge from the Marine Corps on August 23, 1865.

Mackie eventually married and settled near Philadelphia, PA. He died at the age of 74 and is buried in Arlington Cemetery. At Drewry's Bluff, now within Richmond National Battlefield Park, a marker is posted which features Mackie's Medal of Honor action.

Pigeons have always gotten a bad rap, especially when you consider the disparity between their reputation and that of the dove — which is actually just a pigeon with a better PR team. In addition to being much more intelligent than you may have realized, some members of the Columbidae bird family are even war heroes. This includes the three pigeons who were awarded a military medal in 1943, all of whom served in the U.K.'s Royal Air Force. White Vision, Winkie, and Tyke were the inaugural recipients of the Dickin Medal, which was created by the People's Dispensary for Sick Animals (PDSA) to honor animals who aided Britain's efforts in World War II; the carrier pigeons delivered lifesaving messages that led to the rescue of ditched aircrews.

All three decorated pigeons traveled great distances to complete their duty, with Winkie flying some 120 miles in order to alert the RAF Leuchars air base of his handlers' predicament. The flight crews were located within 15 minutes, and all of them were saved. The birds' medals, meanwhile, included this citation: "for delivering a message under exceptionally difficult conditions and so contributing to the rescue of an Air Crew while serving with the RAF." In the 80 years since the Dickin Medal was created, a total of 32 messenger pigeons have received the medal alongside as many as 38 dogs, four horses, and one cat. The bronze medallion is inscribed with the words "for gallantry" and "we also serve."



MARINE CORPS HISTORY IN JUNE

- **2 June 1918:** At dawn on this date, the crack German 28th Division attacked along the axis of the Paris-Metz road hitting the American 2d Division, including the 4th Marine Brigade. The Marines opened with deadly rifle fire and helped hand the German troops a setback which set the stage for Marine victory at Belleau Wood which would soon follow, although at great cost.
- **8 June 1995:** A Marine tactical recovery team from the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit stationed on board the USS Kearsarge rescued a downed U.S. pilot, Captain Scott O'Grady, USAF, from Bosnian-Serb territory in Bosnia.
- 10 June 1898: The First Marine Battalion, commanded by LtCol Robert W. Huntington, landed on the eastern side of Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. The next day, Lt Herbert L. Draper hoisted the American flag on a flag pole at Camp McCalla where it flew during the next eleven days. LtCol Huntington later sent the flag with an accompanying letter to Colonel Commandant Charles Heywood noting that "when bullets were flying, ...the sight of the flag upon the midnight sky has thrilled our hearts."
- 12 June 1961: President John F. Kennedy signed a Presidential Proclamation calling for the American flag to be flown at the Marine Corps War Memorial in Arlington, Virginia, "at all times during the day and night." Discussions between the Attorney General's office and Marine Corps officials earlier in 1961 on improving the visibility and appearance of the monument led to the proposal to fly the Flag continuously, which by law could only be done by Congressional legislation or by Presidential proclamation.
- **15 June 1944:** Preceded by naval gunfire and carrier air strikes, the V Amphibious Corps assaulted the west coast of Saipan, Marianas Islands. By nightfall, the 2d and 4th Marine Divisions, moving against heavy opposition, had established a beachhead 10,000 yards wide and 1,500 yards deep.
- **20 June 1993:** The 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit returned to Mogadishu, Somalia, to stand ready to assist United Nations forces in maintaining peace in the war-torn country. Earlier that month, the 24th MEU had been ordered to cut short Exercise Eager Mace 93-2 in Kuwait to respond to possible contingency operations in Somalia.
- **25 June 1950:** Shortly before dawn, eight divisions of the North Korean People's Army crossed the 38th Parallel and invaded the Republic of Korea. Within three days, the South Korean capital city of Seoul had been captured. On 30 June, President Harry S. Truman ordered a naval blockade of the Korean coast and authorized the sending of U.S. ground troops to Korea. Two days later, General Douglas MacArthur, the Commander in Chief Far East, formally requested that a Marine regimental combat team be deployed to the Far East.
- **25 June 1966:** In Vietnam, Operation Jay began about 30 kilometers northwest of Hue, and lasted nine days. The 2d Battalion, 4th Marines landed north of the North Vietnamese 812th Main Force Battalion, and the 2d Battalion, 1st Marines landed south of the enemy's position. Caught in between the two Marine units, the enemy suffered over 80 dead in nine days of fighting.
- **26 June 1918:** BGen James G. Harbord, the Commanding General of the 4th Marine Brigade, notified American Expeditionary Force Headquarters that Belleau Wood was "now U.S. Marine Corps entirely." After 20 days of combat, and at a cost of over 4,000 casualties, the 4th Brigade of Marines had proven its fighting heart. The grateful Commander of the French Sixth Army would soon decree that in all official correspondence, Belleau Wood would henceforth bear the name, "Bois de la Brigade de Marine."

PRIVATE FIRST CLASS HAROLD C. AGERHOLM

UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS

for service as set forth in the following CITATION:

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty while serving with the 4th Battalion, 10th Marines, 2nd Marine Division, in action against enemy Japanese forces on Saipan, Marianas Islands, July 7, 1944. When the enemy launched a fierce, determined counterattack against our positions and overran a neighboring artillery battalion, PFC Agerholm immediately volunteered to assist in the efforts to check the hostile attack and evacuate our wounded. Locating and appropriating an abandoned ambulance jeep, he repeatedly made extremely perilous trips under heavy rifle and mortar fire and single-handedly loaded and evacuated approximately forty-five casualties, working tirelessly and with utter disregard for his own safety during a grueling period of more than three hours. Despite intense, persistent enemy fire, he ran out to aid two men whom he believed to be wounded Marines but was himself mortally wounded by a Japanese sniper while carrying out his hazardous mission. PFC Agerholm's brilliant initiative, great personal valor and self-sacrificing efforts in the face of almost certain death reflect the highest credit upon himself and the U.S. Naval Service. He gallantly gave his life for his country.
