



Marines that became famous? Here are the "C's through F's". Submitted by Dave Hildibrand

Cop who helped take down Nashville shooter served as Marine grunt

One of the police officers who confronted and shot an assailant who killed six at an elementary school in Nashville is a Marine infantry veteran.

Body-camera footage released by the Metro Nashville Police Department shows Officer Michael Collazo running through The Covenant School on Monday toward active shooter Audrey Hale, 28, and helping Officer Rex Englebert take the shooter down. Collazo served in the Marine Corps from 2010 to 2016 and departed as a sergeant, according to his service record, which was first reported by Task and Purpose.

As an infantry rifleman, Collazo earned the Selected Marine Corps Reserve Medal, National Defense Service Medal and Global War on Terrorism Service Medal. His last duty assignment was at K Company, 3rd Battalion, 23rd Marines, a Reserve infantry unit located in Smyrna, Tennessee, according to his service record sent to Marine Corps Times by Marine spokeswoman Yvonne Carlock on Wednesday.

Marine veteran Blake Morton said he has known Collazo since middle school and had him as a junior Marine serving under him in I Company, 3rd Battalion, 24th Marines, a Reserve unit.

"The discipline that he had was just unmatched compared to his peers," Morton said. And as a friend, Morton said, Collazo would go above and beyond.

"If you needed something and you're broke down on the road, you know you could call him and he could pull you out or whatever," Morton said. "He has no hate in his heart. Always just been a good dude."

A six-minute video containing footage from both body cameras worn by Collazo and Englebert shows the men rush into the school and check classrooms on the first floor on Monday. Then they run up the stairs to the second floor, where they confront Hale. Englebert is shown firing multiple shots at Hale, who falls to the ground. Collazo fires additional rounds at Hale. "Stop moving. Stop moving," Collazo shouts at Hale in the body camera footage.

Another officer yells at Hale, "Get your hands away from the gun."

"Suspect down. Suspect down," Collazo says before taking the rifle from Hale's hands. Hale killed six during a shooting rampage through the school. Police identified the victims as Evelyn Dieckhaus, Hallie Scruggs and William Kinney, all 9 years old; Cynthia Peak, 61; Katherine Koonce, 60; and Mike Hill, 61.

"Yesterday, while we saw the worst of humanity, we also saw the best of humanity, in the police officers who ran into danger directly toward a killer with no regard for their own life, thinking only about those kids and those teachers and those administrators," Tennessee Gov. Bill Lee said in a video posted to his Twitter account Tuesday.

"Gratitude doesn't begin to cover it," Lee said.



Next Gun Raffle Starts 20 April at 1200

The word "classic," when applied to pistols, often brings to mind the iconic John Moses Browning designed 1911, a pistol that nearly all firearms enthusiasts would love to have in their collection. Well, you now have your chance with the next gun raffle firearm.

The iconic 1911 is a single action, recoil-operated, semi-automatic, centerfire with a 5.02" barrel. It is chambered to fire the .45 ACP cartridge from a single stack seven-round detachable box magazine. The 1911A1 weighs 39 ounces unloaded and is made of steel. This was the official sidearm of the US Military for 75 years.

This iteration is a Turkish built 1911A1 US Army pistol. Its chrome-moly-steel frame and slide are finished with a deep Parkerization that has a hint of olive-drab coloration. More importantly, it bears all of the changes made to John Browning's original design in the early 1920s of the A1 version. This includes a shortened trigger, an arched mainspring housing, scallops on both sides of the frame just behind the trigger, an elongated grip safety and a shortened hammer spur. Additionally, in this modern version, the ejection port has been lowered a bit, compared to the genuine article, for improved reliability.

One thing that doesn't match the original, however, is the single-action trigger squeeze. This trigger brakes on average at 4 lbs., 10 ozs., of pressure—nearly two pounds lighter than on the original Colt 1911.

The disassembly procedure for this pistol is identical to that of military-issue M1911A1s. In other words, it's more complicated than the standard field stripping of striker fired polymer pistols with which most everyone is familiar nowadays. Check out a YouTube video if you are not sure of the process.

As usual, only 100 raffle tickets at \$10 per ticket will go on sale on Thursday, 20 April at noon. Once the 100 tickets have sold out, the raffle will be closed, and the winner drawn. The last raffle involving an AR-15 sold out in a day and a half. This raffle featuring the 1911A1 is sure to generate as much excitement. If you have any interest in this historic pistol, be sure to get to The Bunker early on 20 April.

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The Marines and the Spanish American War of 1898

The US Navy sent the armored cruiser USS Maine to Havana Harbor, Cuba in February 1898 in order to help quell a nascent insurgency on the island. However, during the night of 15 February, the Maine suddenly exploded, killing 232 sailors and 28 Marines.

The reaction in the US was immediate and vitriolic. "Remember the Maine" echoed throughout the country as lurid stories about Spanish sabotage spread throughout the land. Factually, there is no evidence the explosion that destroyed the Maine was caused by Spanish saboteurs. However, emotion ruled the day and soon President McKinley sought a declaration of war from Congress, who readily complied.

USMC Commandant Major General Charles Heywood immediately ordered a battalion of Marines to be formed. Five days later, the unit, armed with new Winchester-Lee straight pull bolt action .236 caliber rifles using smokeless powder, was en route to Key West by sea. An artillery battery armed with four 3" naval rifles was also assembled.

As the Marines were concentrating on Cuba, on the other side of the globe in Manila, Philippines Commodore George Dewey in command of the US Asiatic Squadron attacked the Spanish Fleet on 1 May. Dewey routed the Spanish. A Marine detachment was sent ashore after the victory to secure Cavite Naval Station and raise the US flag over the facility. Cavite would remain a major US Naval facility for almost a century.

Back in the Caribbean, Lt. Col. Robert Huntington's Marine Battalion was sent to capture and secure Guantanamo Bay as an advanced base to support a major assault on the city of Santiago, where the Spanish Flying Squadron lay at anchor.

The Marine Battalion hit the beach against only sporadic opposition. They quickly seized Gitmo, and then ran into stiff fire as they approached Cuzco Well, which was the main source of fresh water for the semi-arid Santiago.

On 14 July, two Maine companies supplemented by 65 Cuban guerrillas advanced to secure Cuzco Well. The naval artillery support was inaccurate, and Spanish shells began dropping amongst the Marines. Marine Sgt. John Quick jumped into the open waving a flag at the naval squadron in order to have them adjust their fire. Soon the 500 Spanish defenders were on the receiving end of accurate Naval cannon fire.

The Marines wound up suffering a half dozen killed and 16 wounded, but they defeated the dug-in defenders.

The Spanish surrendered and The Treaty of Paris was signed on 10 December, 1898. In the Philippines, the US Army was dug in around Manila. They then took the city. Instead of installing rebel leader Emilio Aguinaldo as leader of the country, the US Army told him to leave. On 4 February, 1899, Aguinaldo returned with a large force of followers and a nasty little war began. In March, Commodore Dewey called for another battalion of Marines to reinforce the Cavite Naval Base. Eventually, two more Marine Battalions were added, joining the larger US Army operation to put down Aguinaldo's rebellion.

The Philippine insurgency turned out to be the Marines' baptism in jungle warfare. A third Marine Battalion soon arrived augmented by a reinforced company, as the Marines (and Army) grappled with fighting against a ruthless, phantomlike enemy to whom the jungle was home.

Commodore Dewey later remarked that if he had a regiment of Marines with him after his defeat of the Spanish squadron in Manila, the Aguinaldo insurgency could have been stopped before it even started.

The Marines had rarely ever had more than 3,000 men on average. The Spanish American War, and the resulting Philippine insurgency illustrated that The Corps was a disciplined and tenacious fighting force, setting the stage for the larger role The Corps would play in the 20th Century.



MARINE CORPS HISTORY IN APRIL

- **April 1945:** On Okinawa, Marines of the III Amphibious Corps continued to make good progress all along their front, clearing Zampa Misaki and seizing the Katchin Peninsula, thus effectively cutting the island in two. By this date (D+2), III AC elements had reached objectives thought originally to require 11 days to take.
- **5 April 1947:** Five Marine guards were killed and eight wounded when attacked by Communist Chinese raiders near the Hsin Ho ammunition depot in Northern China. This last major clash between Marines of the 1st Marine Division and Communist forces occurred shortly after withdrawal and redeployment plans from China were issued for the 1st Division and 1st Marine Aircraft Wing on 1 April.
- 10 April 1959: Lieutenant Colonel John H. Glenn, Jr. was named as one of the original seven Project Mercury astronauts selected for space training. The seven astronauts, all volunteers, were selected by NASA from an initial group of 110 leading military test pilots. Three years later, on 20 February 1962, Col Glenn would become the first American to orbit the Earth.
- **12-13 April 1918:** Marines of the 4th Brigade suffered their first gas attack on the night and early morning hours of 12-13 April when the Germans bombarded the 74th Company, 6th Marines near Verdun with mustard gas. Nine Marine officers and 305 enlisted Marines were gassed and evacuated, and 30 Marines died from the effects of the gas shells which hit in the middle of the reserve area cantonments in which they were sleeping.
- **15 April 1962:** Marine Corps operational involvement in the Vietnam War began on Palm Sunday when HMM-362 with its Sikorsky UH-34s arrived at Soc Trang in the Delta south of Saigon. The task unit was called "Shufly" and its first operational employment involved lifting Vietnamese troops into battle.
- 18 April 1983: One Marine Security Guard was killed and seven were wounded when a large car bomb exploded just outside the U.S. Embassy in Beirut, Lebanon. Lance Corporal Robert McMaugh was standing guard at Post 1, just inside the front entrance when the bomb exploded outside the door. The explosion killed 61 people including 17 Americans. LCpl McMaugh was buried at Arlington National Cemetery on 26 April.
- **21 April 1951:** Marine carrier-based airplanes made their first aerial contact with enemy planes over the Korean front lines. Captain Philip C. Delong shot down two YAK fighters and 1st Lieutenant Harold D. Daigh destroyed one more and damaged another in the heavily defended Pyongyang-Chinnanpo area. Both pilots were with VMF-312 flying from the USS Bataan.
- **27 April 1805:** First Lieutenant Presley N. O'Bannon, who with seven other Marines was part of a force of Greeks and Arabs led by American Consul William Eaton, raised the United States flag for the first time over a conquered fortress of the Old World at Derne, a stronghold of the Tripolitan pirates. Two Marines were killed and one wounded in the assault on the walled city.
- **28 April 1993:** The last A-6E Intruder departed from Marine Corps service. Marine All Weather Attack Squadron 332 transferred the last Marine A-6E to St. Augustine, Florida, and prepared for the squadron's transition to the F/A-18D and eventual movement from Cherry Point to Beaufort, South Carolina.



LANCE CORPORAL

THOMAS P. NOONAN JR.

Born: NOVEMBER 18, 1943

Died: FEBRUARY 5, 1969

The President of the United States takes pride in presenting the MEDAL OF HONOR posthumously to

LANCE CORPORAL THOMAS P. NOONAN JR UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS

for service as set forth in the following CITATION:

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty while serving as a Fire Team Leader with Company G, Second Battalion, Ninth Marines, Third Marine Division, in operations against the enemy in Quang Tri Province in the Republic of Vietnam. On February 5, 1969, Company G was directed to move from a position which they had been holding southeast of the Vandergrift Combat Base in A Shau Valley to an alternate location. As the Marines commenced a slow and difficult descent down the side of the hill, made extremely slippery by the heavy rains, the leading element came under a heavy fire from a North Vietnamese Army unit occupying well-concealed positions in the rocky terrain. Four men were wounded, and repeated attempts to recover them failed because of the intense hostile fire. Lance Corporal Noonan moved from his position of relative security and, maneuvering down the treacherous slope to a location near the injured men, took cover behind some rocks. Shouting words of encouragement to the wounded men to restore their confidence, he dashed across the hazardous terrain and commenced dragging the most seriously wounded man away from the fire-swept area. Although wounded and knocked to the ground by an enemy round, Lance Corporal Noonan recovered rapidly and resumed dragging the man toward the marginal security of a rock. He was however, mortally wounded before he could reach his destination. His heroic actions inspired his fellow Marines to such aggressiveness that they initiated a spirited assault which forced the enemy soldiers to withdraw. Lance Corporal Noonan's indomitable courage inspiring initiative and selfless devotion to duty upheld the highest traditions of the Marine Corps and the United States Naval Service. He gallantly gave his life for his country.
