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Humans and the World of Fairy

Stories of fairies and their world can be found across the last thousand years in Ireland, the UK, and France, often centered on a human's interaction with a specific fairy or group of fairies. Some stories expand beyond this to also include human interaction with the world that these beings come from, whether that interaction is voluntary or not. The world of Fairy is always, explicitly or implicitly, the backdrop to fairy stories, the place from which these beings come and to which they can return – sometimes with a human in tow. To understand fairies then we must understand their world and how human interactions with it affect us.

Today when we talk about fairies we often focus primarily on the individual beings, the ones who people might have encounters with in the human world or who populate the stories and folk tales that people share. But ultimately we can't separate these beings from their world, something that is reflected by the homonyms - fairy and Fairy - that we use for each, and by the history of the terms themselves. Before we had the word fairy, meaning the individual being, we had the word Fairy meaning the world, a place of enchantment and magic which existed near to but separate from the human world. This place later lent its name to anything with a similar nature, anything that was enchanting and magical, and eventually came to be used to describe the beings believed to live in that world. The word for the place came first, and our understanding of the beings reflected our understanding of the place; this is true in Irish as well where the word sidhe meant (and still means) Otherworldly mounds or hills and was connected to the beings, the aos sidhe [people of the sidhe] who were believed to live there. It is impossible to truly separate the two from each other, the world and the beings who exist in it.

The oldest Irish language story we have that features the Good Folk dates to the 9th century in writing and at least a few hundred years further back based on the language used. Beveridge, author of Children Into

Swans, even speculated that the story might go as far back as the 5th century CE. While it doesn't describe the land of Fairy in detail, or in fact at all, the place is a key aspect of the story. A fairy woman comes from magical islands which have 'sidhe mór' [large fairy hills] to Ireland in order to woo and win a human prince and bring him back with her. She does this, and after sailing off in a boat into the west the two are never seen on earth again. This is a common theme we find across the following centuries into today, that the fairies can and will lure people away – if not outright steal them – to add those humans to the population of Fairy. Why they do this we don't know for certain, but that they do it is established across a range of stories.

The idea of humans taken into Fairy is a common ▲ one across cultures, but it is only one way that a human might find themselves in that world. There are also stories of people who wander accidently out of the human world and find themselves not only encountering fairy beings but also realizing that they are well and truly not on earth anymore. In Welsh myth the human Pwyll followed his hounds chasing a deer through mist and into the world of Annwn, while in Irish myth the high king Conn had a somewhat similar experience when he and his men were encompassed in mist and taken into the Otherworld. Finally there are some stories of people who made their own way into Fairy, sometimes by following specific methods and other times by more literally following the fairy host itself. In the ballad of Childe Rowland the protagonist enters Fairy by walking three times counterclockwise around a church, for example, while in Sir Orfeo the king follows a group of fairies back to their home. In the Adventures of Nera, and Irish myth, Nera enters the Otherworld by joining a fairy procession as it goes into a sidhe.

hose who find themselves in Fairy, willingly or not, I find a place that is in some ways like the human world and in other ways very different. Stories describe forests and fields, castles and towns, rivers and wells, all of which are much like their earthly equivalents. And yet Fairy is also a deeply foreign place. It is said in various sources that there is no sun nor moon there, and that the lighting seems to come from an unknown, diffuse source. The ballad of Thomas the Rhymer claims that all blood shed on earth flow in the rivers and streams of Fairy, and in a similar vein sir Orfeo described both living fairy beings and a wide range of dead humans (each still bearing the marks of their death) in the castle of the fairy king. Some Irish myths talk of monstrous animals that exist in the Otherworld and wreak havoc on earth, but other Irish myths talk of Fairy as a place of peace that is free from violence or sickness. The picture that forms as we look across all of these sources is a place of contradictions, where life and death exist side by side, and where the impossible is possible. It is a place that is full of and in many ways defined by magic.

A s wonderous as the land of Fairy can be it not without its dangers, particularly for humans. It can be overtly dangerous of course, and we certainly

have stories of humans killed there, but its risks can also be more subtle and more insidious. Those who enter may not be able to leave again, and those who are taken may end up spending eternity longing for the world they lost. And yet those who go to Fairy and come back may also pine away with longing for that world, as its beauty sinks into their souls and calls them to return. It is a place that leaves its mark on those who encounter it, and all who experience it are changed by it.

Pairy and fairies captivate human imaginations and, perhaps, more literally captivate humans. It is a place that tempts us with our greatest desires, that dances through our dreams, but which also traps us and holds us in its timelessness until all we knew or loved in life has been washed away. Despite that danger and despite that temptation, it is a world that remains embedded in our collective subconscious, a place that is equal parts paradise and prison but which is intwined within our souls. No matter how our world evolves, Fairy stays with it, tethered to it and to us.

Vision Boards as Magickal Tools

Vision boards are focal items that carry a particular set of intentions, with the goal of bringing about certain qualities, traits, experiences, and manifestations into one's life. For some people, these boards are more like "affirmation boards," containing positive written messages. For others, they're more like pieces of art like a collage. Others prefer to simply focus on symbols, while others prefer to create a piece that combines these approaches. With daily focus, vision boards are believed to help the mind and spirit align to the energies and intentions at hand, thereby shaping one's own life experience. Vision boards and affirmation boards have been amplified by New Age schools of thought, but they can easily be applied to self-transformative practices of Witchcraft.

Choosing to Begin Crafting

During my beautiful and scary visit to northern India a few years back, I had the pleasure of hand-delivering a copy of my latest book, The Everyday Empath, to my beloved friend Vishnu. As a fellow empath, he was thrilled to receive a copy of the book, and also asked if the book contained information about creating vision boards.

"Indeed it does!," I proclaimed.

My dear friend explained that he had become familiarized with Vision Boards due in part to the New Age work of Louise Hay, whose teachings promoted affirmations, visualization, and metaphysical healing techniques related to the Law of Attraction.

"So, what does your vision board look like?," he asked.

"Ummm... I haven't really made one yet..."

"But Raven! Here we are, you and I, discussing our life's goals, but you haven't made a vision board to focus on daily? Let's work on this!"

What can I say? He was right! Shortly after returning to the States, I went to a local Dollar Store for a big piece of cardstock. With art supplies and magickal trinkets handy, and a dedicated sacred space in which to work, I started crafting the first pieces of a magickal vision board. I know all too well how easy it is, in the midst of life's hectic flow, to put off "little" things like this, but the fact of the matter is that intentional art is an act of magick, and magick itself is art. Vision boards need not be restricted to any kind of fluffy metaphysical feel-better practice, but can become an empowering spell that can be as deep as the heart of a Witch.



Choosing Proper Colors & Symbols

To begin with, decide whether you'd like to create the board on paper, on a tack-board, or even virtually. Plan the size of your board accordingly. Beware that sometimes the board will have a mind of its own, because you are tapping into the unconscious, so new things are likely to enter your mind once you start working on it more diligently. When putting thought into the construction of your vision board, consider how many photos, phrases, symbols, and other items you wish to include.

You may wish to draw common symbols on your vision board – as long as they are aligned to your intentions – such as pentagrams, hexagrams, dollar signs, hearts, flowers, smiley faces, or anything meaningful to you personally. You may also wish to include sigils on your vision board. These are self-crafted symbols, using a particular method, representing specific manifestations in an abstract form. Occultist Austin Osman Spare originally popularized the use of sigils in magickal work, and the practice of sigilry has expanded in recent years. Magickal folk of all varieties utilize sigils in modern times, either standalone or in conjunction with other forms of spellcraft or ceremonial workings. For those readers who are more Witchily-inclined, I can't more highly recommend the book Sigil Witchery by Laura Tempest Zakroff (see Sources & Further Reading at the end of this article).

Maybe your board will focus on various manifestations, which is common, or maybe it will be in regard to one goal in particular, thereby becoming a spell for a particular solitary purpose. Although this article focuses on vision boards that are more "life general," individual spells can be created either as vision boards or as part of a spell's creation.

When considering the colors you use in the vision board, including its base material (paper, wood, dryerase board, etc.) and the color of markers and decorations used, it's wise to bring to mind some of the common metaphysical color associations (red for love, blue for insight, green for healing, black/white for all-purpose... you know the drill!). If you study or practice eastern mysticism, you may also wish to consider color esoteric alignments related to the seven chakra centers on the human body, as imparted in ancient Vedic and Yogic texts.

Choosing the Right Words

I'm a big fan of a beautiful and simple book called The Golden Key to Happiness by Japanese Shinto author Masami Saionji. Something that especially stood out to me in this book was her emphasis on the power of words. In one part of the text, she discusses that the words we say or think over and over on repeat actually creates a sort of self-hypnosis. This self-induced hypnotic state can be challenging to break when we become accustomed to thinking in certain patterns, and expecting certain results in our lives. Saionji also emphasizes that the thoughts of the past create the thoughts of the present, and the thoughts of the present create our future experience. Although it's easier said than done, we do have the power to control our thoughts and realize when the mind is playing tricks or is conditioned to a particular modus operandi.

When choosing words for your vision board, you may be inspired to simply incorporate a scattering of words of power. Little affirmations such as "loved," "abundant," and "happy" can really go a long way. If you speak various languages, try incorporating a bit of each. Unleash those creative juices!

Be certain that your board doesn't make use of negative statements. Don't begin things with "I am not," "I do not," or "I will not," for example. Regardless of positive intentions, a negative



statement tunes our psyche to a negative energy, which is associated with loss, have-nots, and ideas of imperfection. Instead, we are focusing on bringing out that which we desire to access and amplify in our lives. The words "Not sad and not poor" have a totally different energy, psychologically and magically, than "happy and abundant."

We are each the center of our own universes, by default, so remember to make the board about yourself. Use yourself as the subject. (Trust me, it's not selfish; it's necessary!) While it would be wise to say something like, "I am a positive influence on friends and family," it would not be wise to place that power onto others with statements like, "My friends and family respect me." Can you feel the difference between the two statements? It's also essential to limit statements to present-moment action or being. Instead of "I will achieve my goals," you'll want to write, "I am achieving my goals." This is still a true statement because you are intentionally choosing to activate this statement, and it becomes truer every day. The goal isn't to fool yourself (because your higher self knows better), but to amplify positive things you're already working on.

The concept of vision boards is becoming widespread due to its creative power and stories of success. My brilliant cousin Tracy is a businesswoman who works within numerous professional spheres, yet keeps spiritually connected and mindful despite a hefty workload. One of the companies she operates is LyfeSpark (.com), where users can create virtual vision boards, meet realistic life goals, and receive direct personal support.

When consulting Tracy about my vision board, she gave a memorable tip about affirmations. She advised me not to use phrases like, "I am working my hardest to be better" or, "I am striving to do my best." Instead, replace words of struggle/toil with more optimistic terms that imply an ease of natural order. In this case, something like, "I am evolving toward self-actualization" would be more fitting. This sort of terminological optimism is also good advice for how we communicate every day!

Equally important to writing "affirmative affirmations" is that your words must be believable. What I mean is, if you write, "My life is happy and joyful" on your vision board, part of your unconscious mind might give a negative internal response, such as, "That's bullshit and you know it."

Words carry incredible power. The knowledge of the mind's interplay with a magickal affirmation can allow you to more carefully select the words you utilize. Following this example, it may be better to write something like, "I create happiness and joy in my life every day." So, write things that you know are true, and qualities you are intending to strengthen.

Writing "I am safe" could be a good idea because you know it's true even if your anxiety or stress tries to convince you otherwise. (However, if you're genuinely not safe physically or emotionally, then it's time to make serious life changes, possibly with the help of legal and/or psychotherapeutic professionals.)

Here are some ideas for phrases that you might feel drawn to write, with examples of alternate affirmations that carry a more positive tone:

I will always be happy - I am creating happiness.

I release the past - I create a positive future.

I work diligently against stress - I choose peace.

I'm not depressed or anxious - I have control over my emotions.

I am going to travel soon - I look forward to seeing the world.

Everyone respects me - I have self-respect.

I am wealthy and rich - I am actively creating financial stability.

I refuse to be single anymore - I am openly attracting my soul mate.

I am powerful and influential - I am becoming more self-confident every day.

I have strong magickal powers - I am a child of the gods.

There's nothing I can't do - I am achieving my goals.

I free myself of disease - I create health and healing.

I banish fake friends and toxic people - I choose to surround myself with good people.

My life is free from struggle - My life is abundant and joyful.

I wish for health, happiness, wisdom, and love - I attract health, happiness, wisdom, and love

I am not sad - Happiness is my natural state.

The Universe will meet all my needs - All of my needs are becoming met.

Choosing Imagery & Visuals

Here's where things become a bit tricky, and where we must use our intuitive powers – and our knowledge of both magick and psychology – to determine which kinds of imagery to use on our boards, if any.

It's standard in New Age thought to create vision boards that are heavy image-based collages, kind of like a real-life Pintrest. The idea is to cut and paste inspirational images from magazines, or print photos from online, and affix them to our board as items of focus. Commonly you'll see people using photos of happy people, scenic landscapes, ideal body types, fancy cars, and whatnot. But, like I said, this is where things get tricky in a magickal sense.

If we are cutting-and-pasting photos of other people's happiness, is that really inspiring our own... or could it create jealousy and a feeling of "lack" instead? On a metaphysical level, is having the image of two smiling people in love inspiring us to manifest the same, or is it sending energy to the people in the photo? This is what I tend to believe, which is why my own vision board displays a very limited amount of actual images (all of which are drawings), and no magazine cutouts.

For this reason, I feel that sketching and drawing images on a vision board is miles more effective. This way, the image of people, places, fat stacks of cash, or whatnot, actually comes from the mind and hand of the practitioner themselves. This seems far more magickal than latching onto external images of the goals we are achieving.

Additionally, for people like us who are more esoterically minded, actual photos/clippings of gods, deities, and symbols could be much more relevant and spiritually connecting. Gods and angels, for example, do not exist in the human dimension. This is why connecting to their images on a vision board can be safe and encouraging due to their divine energetic embodiments. This can also strengthen a person's devotion to their patron and/or matron god(s). Like everything, it's up to the practitioner's intuition and creative spark!

Choosing Herbs, Stones & Spell Components

If you have a little collection of "small powerful stuff" you've found in nature or which has been gifted to you, this could be an ideal opportunity to utilize these items. It's easy to accumulate little stones, charms, berries, and other special items because Witches and mystics know a powerful item when they see it. Rather than letting these things accumulate in a pouch, drawer, or box – or even scattered about your altar – consider affixing some of them to your magickal vision board.

A few items that I may suggest affixing to your board, if you get the calling to do so, include feathers, leaves, flower petals, powdered incense, found objects, small gemstones, metal charms, incense resins (dragon's blood, copal, frankincense, etc.), and raw herbs. Be sure to consider the metaphysical property of any item you affix to your spell.

An easy way to seal items to your board is to use a hot glue gun, although any reliable "fixing" method will do. When you affix the object, incorporate your own affirmation or spoken spell. Make it an intentional act. Magick follows intention. Most importantly, know that you are performing important esoteric work to help improve your life. Improving your life, by extension, helps improve the life of everyone you touch.



Choosing Ritual Timing & Procedure

It's essential to be in a positive, encouraging state of mind when creating or ritually empowering a vision board, or any creative act of manifestation magick, for that matter. We get out what we put in. While it's advisable to mystically surrender to the gods (etc.) during times of high stress, positive manifestation work needs to be performed when we ourselves can lend that vibrational boost to the working at hand.

You may wish to consider the sun or moon's zodiac placement (and to be mindful of any retrogrades) when crafting your board. Daily planetary rulerships may also be taken into consideration:

Sunday ~ Sun Monday ~ Moon Tuesday ~ Mars Wednesday ~ Mercury Thursday ~ Jupiter Friday ~ Venus Saturday ~ Saturn

After you have finalized your board precisely as you'd like it, and after you have performed your own personal magick to enchant the piece as a living spell, consider where to place the board. Personally, I do not like to show the board to other people, in order to "keep it secret, keep it safe," by not dispersing the energy to others. I chose to staple my big board on the ceiling right above my bed so that it is the very first thing I focus on upon rising for the day. I have found this method to be profoundly effective.

However you choose to craft the board, and wherever you choose to place it for daily reflection, follow your intuition and believe in yourself. You are the magick; you are the power. Happy crafting!

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



Foraging at Beltane

Wild foraging is one of most rewarding ways to provide yourself with amazing and magikal ingredients too nourish and nurture your mind, body and soul. Not only does it connect you the land in which you dwell it allows yourself the opportunity to create some delicious dishes with ingredients provided directly from Mother Nature.

My top three foraging plants/weeds to pick are Nettle, Cleavers and Wild Garlic. These three plants work well together in soups, omelettes, casseroles and the ever favourite Wild Garlic pesto. The list is endless in the creations you can make, you are only limited by your imagination. Here are some wonderful ways to ensure you have something wild everyday:

Nettle Tonic - Pour boiling water over a handful of Nettle and or Dead Nettle leaves-seal in a mason jar over night and strain.

Nettle contains up to 25% protein and contains Vitamins A and C, iron, potassium, calcium copper and magnesium.

Nettle Chips - Toss young nettle leaves in coconut oil and add preferred seasoning, Bake 120-130C until crisp for up to 30mins, turn half way.

Cleavers Tonic - Cover a handful of chopped/broken plant with cold water in a jug and allow to infuse over night. Cleavers contains Vitamin C and Silica and improves the bodies ability to eliminate waste and promotes lymphatic drainage of toxins.

Wild Garlic Pesto - Blend leaves and flowers with Nettle (blanched) with walnuts, parmesan and lemon juice to taste. Perfect for freezing or adding to a soup.

Wild Garlic Salt - Blend wild garlic and sea salt and place an extra handful of unblended sea salt together on a baking tray. Allow to dry out in a 125C oven for an hour.

BELTANE FOLKLORE: RIDDING CATTLE OF EVIL

As Beltane draws us into its fertile folds, with warm promises of the coming sun and growth of flowers, crops and livestock, we become more aware of the rituals and folk medicine used by people of the past.

Perhaps for many of us, at the time of this ancient fire festival, we imagine or even re-enact the driving of cattle between two bonfires to cleanse them of evil, illness and fleas that may have settled over them in the gloom of winter. But for many people today, and many more people of the past, the health of their cattle and other livestock meant the difference between poverty and affluence, hunger and health, or even life and death.

Due to this, much advice was sought from cunning women in rural communities. Evidence of this can be found in remnants of old farming manuals and cattle husbandry books as far back as the 1600s, with margins filled with recipes and charms (Sussex Archaeological society 1895).

Some charms survived better than others, and the belief in their power was undisputed to the point that farmers forgot what the charm was supposed to do, but religiously kept it up for fear of what may happen if they did not.

One such practice was that of lucky stones. Hag stones (those with a natural hole through them) were hung in stables and cow sheds to ward off evil (synonymous with illness), but Lucky Stones were different. These stones were found, or blessed, by the farmer or cunning woman, then perforated and hung around the cow's neck with string. This was firmly believed the stave off illness, and ensure the income and health of the whole family, as evil would not enter the beast with such a stone.

A fter the stone fell off it became common practice to pierce the ear of the cow and tie the string, that had once suspended the Lucky Stone, through the hole and around the ear. The string was then knotted, which was considered an additional protection against evil entering the cattle.

So as the days warm, and the cattle grow fat on the fruitful crops and grass, be sure to keep your eye out, for in some rural communities this practice is still continued, and with the light of the Beltane Fires, may the smoke cleanse all livestock of their ailments and plague brought on by this lingering evil!

From the moment I wake up in the morning, I am surrounded by the buzz of my young family, social media pings, coffee and general life admin. I wouldn't change it for the world of course, but there is also something instinctively inside me that calls for that other thing: The Wild. This special, sacred thing that lies just beyond the cusp of our waking reach, this concept that tends to elude us as we are sucked up in a garden of concrete or even if we are surrounded by countryside, the digital world behind a screen tends to hold more allure on an ordinary day.

It's still there though, The Wild. It's always been there but sometimes we only catch glimpses like the roots of a tree breaking through the tarmac, the tufts of grass creeping through the cracks in the pavement or the caw of an inconsiderate crow making us miss the last line of that YouTube video. It calls out, it beckons us and those of us who are sensitive can't help but respond. But how? How can we even put into words that longing? It's something like a ripple in our hearts, a frisson through our limbs that draws us mysteriously away from the jobs we can't quite let go of. But connection is hard, we have responsibilities, we are shamelessly distracted by the many other things on the list and because sometimes it's just plain hard to see past the end of your own nose. Even for the most dedicated of Witches, The Wild can seem a long way away sometimes.

With intention and a little effort we can fill that empty space that sits beside our daily lives. With Beltane approaching, gradually tempting us with warmth and sunshine after a cold, wet start to the year (certainly here in the South East of England) there is never a better time to make that shift and add something new to the daily routine, even if only to shake it up and make us notice The Wild where she is right now. Below are three ideas to get you started, you can practice them just the once, you can practice them every day, but the idea is that they simply slot in amongst all the other tasks and open the door, even if only for a moment, and allow us to embrace The Wild.

Wild Yoga

I always advocate Yoga as a beautiful addition to any form of Witchcraft but you don't have to be a seasoned Yogi, or even like physical exercise, to add a simple breathing technique to your day. It's best if you are somewhere peaceful and in an ideal world are in eyesight of a natural space, but imagination will suffice. Simply place your hands in the prayer position (or as us yogi's say: Anjali Mudra) over your heart centre. Take a moment to set the intention to connect to the natural world in whatever way that resonates with you. This might be connecting to a deity associated with The Wild such as Pan or Artemis, imagining a great tree in front of you or just noticing the energy of the ground beneath your feet

Press your thumbs together and apply a gentle pressure to your heart centre, this activates the Anahata (or heart) Chakra and creates a wonderfully comforting feeling in the body. Spend a moment here trying to feel the natural world, send your mind out and just notice what is happening in the air around you or in the earth beneath you. Feel the plants growing, the water running, wind rushing. Stay here for as long as you can hold that concentration, once you notice it has wandered (don't worry if this is a few seconds or a few minutes) come back to the now and thank The Wild for letting you in.



Wild Tarot

I call this a 'Tarot' section but really this can be done with most forms of divination from Oracles to Runes and you can do this as a daily spread or something a bit more ad-hoc when the need for connection arises. This is a very simple three-card spread. Shuffle up the cards or other tool you are using and set the intention to receive whatever message The Wild has for you. Take a deep breath and make a connection in your mind to the natural world, lay three cards face down in front of you.



Read left to right, the first card represents your place in The Wild. What is the role you play here? This will show what you do to contribute and the ways in which you fit in. The second card represents what actions you need to take. This card will reveal the things The Wild wants you to know about what you can actively do to strengthen your bond with her. The third and final card represents what is coming to you. This reveals the future of your connection and how it will shape things that are to come in your life.

Wild Energy

This is one of the simplest and quickest things you can do to check-in daily, it requires no tools (except the imagination), and the practice will pave the way to working with natural energy should you wish to take it further. You don't need to be attuned a healing modality such as Reiki to practice using the abundance of energy that is around you. However, this one will require you to either be outside or in auras-reach of something natural such as a crystal or houseplant Begin by coming to something that can anchor you to The Wild.

Position yourself near to your chosen object (or outside with the ground beneath you) in a way that

you can be comfortable. Close your eyes and take three deep breaths, focus on the breath until you start to feel calm and then gently begin to open your mind. Place your dominant hand on the object and the other on your heart centre. It may take some practice if this is your first time but feel the energy in your mind surrounding the object, feel the energy running up your hand and into your heart.

Set the intention to take in what will nourish you and then imagine all the stale energy that does not leave your body to be recycled by the earth. Take what you need from The Wild and when the time feels right imagine light energy coming from you to support the earth. You have created a loop, you give and you receive. Stay here as long as you feel you need before you disconnect and disband the cycle. Thank The Wild for working with you and wish it well.

The Wild is a vast and magical place but it's sometimes forgotten among the hustle and bustle of daily life. We all feel a strong connection to nature, that's why we are on this path after all, but it's easy to lose sight of it occasionally. I hope that these techniques will help you to reconnect and re-wild when you need to and allow the spirit of The Wild into that permanent space where she has always belonged.

I'm Jen. An artist firstly but also a lover of motorbikes, travelling, good food, adventures and a lover of cultures from around the world.

I began creating jewellery back in 2018 but have long been making art in many forms through-out my life. I studied Creative Art at Bath Spa University where I learnt everything from drawing and sculpture to knitting and ceramics.

In-between my uni work, I created one-of-a-kind clothes from charity shop finds and up-cycled them into knitted crop tops and embroidered bolero jackets with curtain tassels and doilies. The clothes were very 'granny sheik' and actually sold quite well though a little funky market called St Nicks in Bristol.

Soon enough my love of the unconventional crept into my dress making. The urge to add moss, glue the seams with epoxy and paint the fabrics became too strong to ignore.

Towards the end of my degree I began exploring the art of mask making and wearable art. I began making larger-than-life heads for competitions and shows. I found a job with a theatre company working away in Germany and settled into becoming a props maker specialising in masks and puppets.

It was through theatre that I began making some of my favourite works, from clay sculpted bear heads, recreated into complex patterns and translated into foam structures for the stage. Large scale Dragons, cat skull masks and cat puppets.

During the 2020 pandemic, theatre sadly became an un-accessible job for me, but luckily, in 2018 I had spent some time working and travelling in India where I learnt the basic skills of silversmithing.

I had always loved the idea of silversmithing and had seen friends go through university courses, so I always thought it was out of reach for me unless I was willing to go back to Uni to study it. So to my amazement and complete joy, I could learn the basics sitting cross-legged in a tiny blue room in India, drinking chai and burning my fingers!

I create OOAK pieces from recycled sterling silver, recycled gold and ethically obtained precious stones. Following my deep intrigue into culture, ancient history and folklore, I hope that my work feels as though they have just fallen out of the pages of an ancient storybook or could be sat upon the hand of a Queen in Medieval Britain.

Last year in May, I began making May Crown Rings from sterling silver, gold and precious stones, to celebrate the Beltane, the May King and Queen. The rings are a celebration of the coming season, as well as a manifestation of growth and renewal. Each ring has its own name, often after a poisonous plant, as a nod towards the poison rings Queens used to wear in the medieval ages.

The process of using fire, melting metals and ogling over ancient gemstones, has had me captivated for 5 years now and there is no signs of stopping. Over the years of teaching myself silversmithing I have experimented with a number of styles and ideas.

Finding your style as an artist, I think, is one of the most pressing, challenging and exciting journeys that we go on. I feel that, like the rest of life, finding my 'style' has meant journeying back into my childhood and past endeavours. Just like when I was younger, I found happiness and inspiration in being outside, roaming the countryside picking up stones and taking in the beauty of the natural world.

After spending four years living on the craggy shores of the West coast of Scotland and the West coast of Wales, my Deep Earth and Igneous ring collections have all been inspired by Geology from these areas.

These rings are made from forged plates of sterling silver, layered and hammered to create a strata-like pattern representing rock formations. I like to use rose-cut, precious gemstones for contrast between the organic looking, oxidised silver to marvel at what the earth is capable of making deep down in its crust.

One of my more recent collections is named 'The Storybook Collection', which came from my love of masks, puppet making and my love of folklore and childhood stories.

DRAGON MAGIC

Beltane has long been my favourite Sabbat. As a small child, Beltane is the time of one of my earliest magical memories. My grandfather took me deep into the heady scented bluebell woods at sunrise and left me alone in a small clearing, a clearing where the air seemed to change as we walked into it. As the morning sun rose, as did the excitable air around me. First there were giggles, a slight tugging at my dress and then ripples in the flowers and tiny lights moving fast around me. What swiftly followed was the manifestation and appearance of so many woodland fae. From then my life changed as I accepted I was in this world but not of it.



At only three years old I had seen garden fae many times which bizarrely favoured the compost heap behind the onion patch but this was the first time I had seen them in the wild.. and so many of them... This was also my first meeting with Great God Pan and what I view as my formal introduction to my purpose and the world of elemental beings. An introduction and yet the first time I had ever felt calm and home. In this lifetime, I have agreed to help Pan with his work and one way of assisting is by being a communication channel between the subtle realms and our own. It's a task so few have had through time and one I am honoured to perform.

As we move into Beltane, a fire festival, one where we celebrate the world starting over with new fragrance and energies, we all feel the fae presence increase around us. However, the one being that has been stepping forward with more prominence than ever over the last few years is the dragon.

I have worked with dragon energies in this life since I was thirteen; I feel I needed to be older as their energies are an intensity that no child could physically handle. They tend to sit outside Pans remit and work in their own colonies and courts, choosing to keep a greater distance from humans owing to the persecution they have suffered through history in the West especially. The dragons and I have had a beautiful relationship since Lemuria where I was a High Priestess in the temples there. We combined magic, working with crystal skulls and other pure magic to created powerful healing and knowledge, ready to release into the world at this time.

Since they left our dimension after so much slaying, much like all elemental beings, dragons shift their vibration and move between dimensions to be seen and unseen. They very much choose who sees them and will never appear unless invited.

Dragons recognise that there is so much low-density energy clinging on to the earths matrix and really want to help us with this so we can live in a higher vibration in oneness with them and the beings in the other worlds. Part of their power lies in the ability to transmute energies into the opposite of what it is. Indeed, they have helped me transmute grief, depression and guilt – all those emotions that only existed since Atlantis fell and serve us no purpose.

They are suspicious of witches. They tell me their experience with many witches is one where they feel used or 'owned'. Witches will try to summon them to help with magic or as a party trick rather than honouring them. They do want to work with witches but in an equal friendship and to help the earth as one force rather than for personal power gain.

To connect with them, firstly think about where your interest lies. Does it come from your heart? The fact you are reading this article rather than skipping through is probably a sign that you are indeed ready to make friends with the dragon realm and start a journey with them.

My first tip to connect with dragons would first be to think about the element you are most comfortable with as each dragon and sub realm is connected to those. For example, if you are a Water Witch then look towards the sea serpents – the most famous sea dragon being old Nessie in Loch Ness who baffled scientists for years. If you are unsure then that's ok too. The most popular exercise I help witches with is how to meet their guardian dragon – this starting point, done through guided meditation often opens doors softly and the more you do it, the more you and the dragons become familiar with you. I have this available on my Youtube channel.

Otherwise, simply go into nature, sit quietly, open your heart with pure intention and invite only dragons of the light to commune with you. It may not happen straight away but soon you will feel hot breath, something brushes past you or sniff you or simply just curl around you... Ask them how You can help Them in their mission and the rest will develop naturally. The next few years will see an acceleration in witches and dragons coming together to help Gaia rebirth and to clean her skin. Increasing amounts of dragon initiates are waking up and asking me for help and the

dragon crystal skulls I source and code are becoming more active, calling their new guardians before I have even listed them for sale. Other High Priestesses like me around the world are rebirthing dragons from power points to clear stale energies and reactivate energy centres. It's an exciting time.

Once you connect with dragons, you will feel a huge shift in both your magic and energy. They are nothing to fear and everything to admire. I always tell people dragons are like giant Labradors – loyal, loving and protective. Beltane is a wonderful time to call out to them. Watch for their shapes in the fires you light and the clouds that pass in the sky. Listen to the beat of their wings in the breeze and the heat of their breath as they pass you by. Start to feel them this Beltane...seeing them will come.

The Sacred Drum

The drum is the oldest sound humans know. The sound of the drum is one those primal things that resonates deep within and touches a memory, an instinct, our soul. The rhythmic shamanic drum beat that deeply touches the subconscious part of our brain.

Hearing the drum beat, the simple two heart beats, touches a memory that takes us back to our time in the womb, when the one safe constant we knew was our mother's heartbeat. Her pulse was the first vibration we felt before we heard sound.

When a drum beat resonates through us it brings us back to safety and begins to slow our brain waves from beta (our everyday waking brain wave) to theta the brain wave causing us feel in a deep relaxed state. Drum can open the door to our shamanic consciousness. The drum connects us with the heart beat of mother earth.

Drum is feminine and represents the cycles of life within the hoop. The centre is hollow, contains space for the feeling, the energy to flow. The drum is like a conduit that supports your own connection to within, to your soul, and also to all that surrounds you, to other beings in soul-to-soul connection.

Shamanic drum beats

There are various shamanic drum beats, each can induce trance in their own way.

The trance beat. This builds from a slow heart beat to 220 beats per minute. The beat at this speed can induce altered states. This can be hard for some people experiencing to get into but when you are, it can change your brain waves.

The four beat, war beat. Accentuating the fourth beat. This induces adrenaline. But today it serves as a release type beat. It can also induce a trance type state.

The rhythmic heartbeat, a pulse. This brings us back to ourselves. It is grounding, it connects us with mother earth, and our within. It is calming, and reduces our brain waves.

Find the right beats that work for you.

The sound and feel of the drum have so many benefits.

- -It slows our brain waves. It slows your brain waves to theta if we drum long enough.
- -It takes us out of our head and into our heart!
- -It relaxes us.
- -It can stimulate the release of happy hormones, dopamine, serotonin, oxytocin.
- -It regulates your heart and blood pressure.
- -It is grounding when the beat is deep and rhythmic.
- -It aids focus.
- -Reduces anxiety and stress.
- -It can help control chronic pain.



Drum is often known as the shaman's horse, because it aids our travel in the shamanic realms.

'Scientist believe that listening to monotonous drum beat facilitates the production of alpha and theta brains waves. Other Studies indicate that theta waves are connected to our creative and imaginary states of consciousness. It is believed drumming may allow shamans to align their brain waves to the earths own pulse'

The five main brain waves

Gamma - Concentration

Beta - Anxiety dominant, active, external attention, relaxed

Alpha - Very relaxed, passive attention

Theta - Deeply relaxed, inward focused

Delta - Sleep

The use of drum in ritual is powerful, due to its effects on our brain and nervous system it can really support our transition into the betwixt and between, into the liminal with greater ease and depth. Drumming opens our heart, aiding our sense of connection, which is perfect when we are working in community spaces creating deeper connection to others, both seen and unseen.

"Tribal people all over the planet still rely upon the drum to connect the energy of each person participating in ritual, prayer, or ceremony." -Jamie Sams

A perfect example of the use of drum in a real-life rite of passage ceremony, is with birth. I am a doula and Shamanic practitioner; I often use the frame drum to support women in labour. I see labour as a ceremony, a rite of passage.

The theta brain wave the drum brings us to, is the same as that of a person in established labour, with the hormone oxytocin in full flow. Very often a labouring persons brain waves will slow to delta as they reach full dilation. They will then drift in and out of a deep sleep, as their body moves through the path

of birth. So, you see it's a cycle, we need the hormone for labour to progress well, to help the parent reach natural theta state we need to create the right environment too. The cocktail of hormones and brain waves that support the rite of passage or ceremony of birth is very much supported by shamanic drumming!

The drum can offer many roles in ceremony. It serves to support liminal space for ceremony and ritual, shifting our own consciousness into the realm of shamanic consciousness. Drum also serves to protect the sacred space for the ceremony. It is pretty hard to change the environment or cause an energy shift when a drum beat is playing, the drum holds the space (I know this well through supporting birth).

There is so much evidence world wide of the use of Shamanic Drum in ritual and ceremony throughout history. It was quite possibly our first instrument, and as I said before that first sound, we feel and hear in the womb, creating sacred, safe space.

If you are interested the use of shamanic drum in ceremony, I suggest connecting with your drum daily, and how its sound changes within different environments. The skin drums are affected by environment, including temperature and energetic atmospheres. Crafting and working with drums, has gifted me the some of the strongest connections with nature, and with my ancestors.

The drum holds liminal space, its heart beat holds the connection with all. It has held our ancestors' ceremonies through our rich tapestry of life on earth, and still hold us through ceremonies today.

RUNELORE III

When one considers the Common Germanic Futhark and its twenty-four runes, a scholar could be forgiven for believing the divinatory powers of those runes to be extremely limited. After all, twenty-four runes would surely equate to twenty-four meanings?

However, if you have followed this Runelore series so far, you will have already realised that the combinations of multiple runes, their position themselves, as well as in relation to each other, actually provides almost infinite possibilities. We must never lose sight of the most important lesson from the first article, which is that of the deep relationship which a rune master forms with their futhark. In time, it becomes unnecessary for a rune caster to consult books or articles. Rather, the caster immediately feels or senses what the runes are telling them, as they cast their eyes over them, with their context held firmly in mind.

Meditative techniques go hand in hand with rune casting, no less than they do with most other forms of divinatory work. Once the rune casting has been seen and held within mind, a deep trance can take the caster into inner realms where higher meanings or more pronounced omen can be learned.

If this remains a journey which you wish to undertake, then allow me to take your hand for a third time. Let us feel the wind in our hair once more as we drift across Midgaard and beyond to other realms.

Reversed Runes

In Runelore Part II in the Spring Equinox issue of the Witch magazine, we explored the meanings of runes depending on whether they were upturned or downturned. There are some casters who pay attention to the direction in which upturned runes land, considering a rune resting upside down, to hold the downturned meaning.

There is nothing wrong with adopting this practice if it resonates with you. However, a complication arises, simply because the direction of facing of a rune cannot be a binary outcome. A rune cannot simply be upright or reversed. They will often lie in between and, of course, whether a rune is upside down or not depends on there being a focal point, usually the position at which the caster sits or stands.

What is the meaning of a rune which is perfectly sideways? A rune lying upturned or downturned is a simple binary state and this, I find, removes what would otherwise bring unwanted ambiguity to an already complex matter.

Rune Position

To complete the exploration of a casting of multiple runes, we need to consider the way in which runes find themselves lying in relation to each other. We have previously discussed the interpretation of runic relationships and the way in which a single rune can take on slightly different meanings when considered alongside another. We can also consider the distance between different runes, dictating the closer or the more distant relationships. We can further consider whether one rune sits above, below or alongside its counterpart, being a matter given meaning depending on the context of the casting.



For example, here in this casting we have an upturned Wunjo sitting beside the Algiz rune. As you will read below, the upturned Wunjo is a very positive sign, likely referring to human connections, which will be fruitful. This is greatly enhanced by the Algiz rune which suggests that the benefits of such connections will be relevant to the higher self, even the divine and are likely, therefore, to have profound impact on the caster or the subject.

There is a downturned Sowulo rune which has rolled away and lies well outside of the casting board. This might indicate a hint or perhaps a distant pitfall. Perhaps a warning of following the wrong pathway at some point in the future. However, depending on the meaning of the casting board, held in the mind of the caster, it may be that this rune is simply discounted altogether.



However, there is one more. The downturned Nauthiz rune refers to unnecessary struggles and the paralysis of fear. What this is likely to indicate is that there is enormous potential in a new or developing connection which is available, but that there is a danger of being constrained by your own fear or mistrust and that a huge opportunity might be missed.

Let us now pick up the thread from Runelore Part II and explore some more of the Common Germanic Futhark.

Gebo

This rune has its meaning based in the concept of exchange and its insights are in keeping with the Viking tradition of "a gift for a gift", deeply seated within the sagas. Gebo, pronounced, "Ghay-boo", with a soft G, can mean an exchange of physical gifts as much as spiritual or emotional ones. It governs, for example, the magic of sexual intercourse and the exchange of love and pleasure between partners. Equally, it can refer to material or even monetary exchanges in the form of trade.

However, the deeper wisdom lies in recognising that there is always a price for everything. Even taking of things by conquest weighs heavy burdens in the end. In divination and in the positive sense, Gebo tells us of generosity, honour, sacrifice and mutual exchange. However, it can also be downturned and in this sense, it represents an imbalance in such exchanges. Greed, dependence, over sacrifice and imbalance in relation-

ships can be what lies there.

Wunjo

The appearance of this rune, upturned, in a casting is an enormously positive thing. Wunjo is pronounced "Won-Joe" and is very much the rune of harmonising energy between human beings. It portends bliss, hope, and the prosperity which comes from fruitful connection and the absence of all ills.

Love is, of course, the strongest of these energies and Wunjo can indeed represent love between people. However, this rune is very much about human peace and harmony in a much broader sense. Of course, Wunjo can be downturned too and in that sense, it represents the illusion and manipulation of which all human beings are capable. This divination is a warning of potential deception, betrayal and ultimately anxiety and sorrow.

Hagalaz

This rune is pronounced "Hag-all-az" and has the immediate meaning of Hail. Naturally, hail is not a pleasant thing and no less potentially destructive than the flowing water, which it becomes once it melts. The rune represents destructive forces over which the individual has little control.

In divination, Hagalaz represents immediate crisis and pronounced change. However, this is not always a negative thing in the long-term sense and the most common suggestion from the appearance of the rune, upturned, is that the pathway ahead holds a storm to navigate before calmer seas are reached. A difficult time, may lead on to correction and inner harmony.

Downturned, the appearance of Hagalaz is unfortunately an entirely negative omen. It warns of crisis and loss, material or otherwise. There may be an association with lasting bitterness, blame or guilt lying in the past, which continues to poison the present and the future.

Nauthiz

Nauthiz is another rune which is quite harsh in nature, quite similar to Hagalaz. Pronounced, similarly to, "Not-this", the rune upturned speaks to us of corresponding or balancing forces or cause and effect. Without darkness we cannot recognise light. Without resistance or conflict against opposing forces we cannot gain strength. This rune is about our recognition

of primal truth and most potently, speaks to us of life lessons, achievement gained through hard graft and personal development. As such, the overall meaning depends greatly on the runic relationships found within a wider casting.

Downturned, Nauthiz tends to refer more to unnecessary struggles. Constraints of freedoms and meaningless drudgery are highlighted as well as our being held back by worry or fear. Usually there are needs which we have which are still lying obscured and which are otherwise unfulfilled.

Isa

Isa is pronounced "Issa" and means "Ice" and usually sits within a rune casting as a warning.

Very much a rune of the self, the upturned meaning makes reference to self-control and stillness. As a particularly poignant example, in any spiritual journey, as our understanding grows, so too can our ego and whilst we all project this in our definition of ourselves, an unmastered ego, can inflame and become a deeply self-destructive energy. We are warned to remain conscious of the flow of our ego and ever prepared to focus on our ability to still our mind and thoughts, reflect and keep ourselves in balance.

Where Isa appears downturned, this tends to indicate selfish and ego-centric behaviours which usually serve to actually inhibit our growth and leave us frozen.

Jera

This rune is pronounced "Yehr-ah" and is the rune of harvests and cycles.

Most people who follow any pagan tradition, tend to be acutely aware of the wheel of the year, the ever turning cycle of the seasons as our planet revolves in its orbit around the sun, tilted, sometimes toward and sometimes away from that great source of energy, all relative to the earth's hemispheres.

Upturned, this rune reminds us of the importance of our recognition of the cyclical nature of all things. It represents generally good things, such as the fruits of our labours, peace of mind, body and spirit and the benefits of our work with natural cycles. Downturned, there is a very stark difference, and this rune becomes particularly negative, representing a break or conflict with the natural order of things. This can only lead, sadly, to further conflict, misfortune, pointless pursuits

and diminishing.

Eihwaz

On immediate examination the Eihwaz rune, pronounced," Yew-was", means Yew, in the context of the tree. This is a sacred wood, timeless and eternal, standing steadfast and strong and yet flexible also, like the wood fashioned into a powerful longbow and the sacred weapon of the deity Ull. However, in popular mythology, the Yew can be of both help and hindrance.

More abstractly Eihwaz represents liminal borders between this world and the other, and between life and death. As such, whether this rune lies upturned or downturned has perhaps the most profound difference of all of those in the futhark.

Upturned, this rune refers to the awakening of hidden energies and our journey to enlightenment. It can also refer to powerful initiations and our ability to endure them. However, downturned, this can refer to flaws and confusion, or even death – although in the latter sense, not so much physical death, but the death of a part of you, perhaps leading to a reawakening.

Pertho

Pertho is pronounced very much as it is spelled in English and is a rune associated with the feminine. The appearance of the rune in a casting is usually a positive thing, since it often portends the birth of something. Attempts at its translation have also given credence to an association with feminine sexuality and even female genitalia. However, it is also a rune which is perhaps the most unknown of all of the futhark and it's meaning is often debated.

Whether upturned or downturned, there is an air of mystery about this rune, and it may be necessary to peer beyond the immediate or obvious seeming meaning of a casting. Upturned, there is usually a prediction of good things and new things. However, downturned, there is a sense of delusion, illusion, obsessions and things which are not meant to be understood, at least for now.

Algiz

Conversely to the mystery of Pertho, the Algiz rune, pronounced "Al-jizz", refers to higher powers or indeed the divine self. As such, where it appears alongside or close beside another rune, it sets the meaning of its associate at a more important level and not to be

considered in the profane or mundane sense.

Upturned, this suggests the higher planes, divine protections or spiritual growth toward the divine self. In its translations, there is a distinct reference to strong protection and wards, which, in the divinatory sense might depict a protector or warn of the need for one. Downturned it warns of situations where spiritual growth moves too quickly and a fall from grace rapidly follows.

Sowulo

The final rune which we shall explore a little in this article is that of Sowulo, pronounced "So-eelo" and which means Sun.

As the source of almost all of the light which we physically sense, the upturned Sowulo rune represents mastery, wholeness, fruitful goals and achievements. It provides great reassurance that we are pursuing the right pathway.

However, downturned, this rune represents darkness and warns of the opposite. You may be pursuing pathways and goals which are not right for you, and which might be pointless or even harmful.

The Final Chapter

There remain eight more letters of the Common Germanic Futhark which we have yet to explore. In the final article, completing the Runelore series and appearing in the next issue, will see our journey through this ancient alphabet completed. However, for now, if you were new to this subject and have followed all of the Runelore article series so far, then your understanding will have grown considerably. It is, once again, time to digest, practice and reflect, as your relationship with your own runes develops and grows in strength.

May Thor grant you strength and courage on your way!

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The Festival of Summer and Irish Folk Beliefs

Bealtaine has always been my favourite part in the wheel of the year celebrations not just because I was born in the month of May but because there is so much going on. The trees are green, the bluebells are in full bloom throughout native woodland areas and nature magic is fully awake!

It's a time of celebration for everyone and signifies the end of the dark half of the year. The weather has usually picked up by May with the arrival of warmer temperatures and that is always a good thing.

Bealtaine in Ireland was always celebrated with great gaiety but also with great superstition. The faeries 'malevolence was at its height. Dairy farmers would worry about the faeries obsession with corrupting anything associated with dairy production. At milking time, the cow was blessed and a red rag or a garland of flowers was tied to its tail. A mountain ash branch was always thought to offer protection to cow's milk. Butter stealing and the inability to churn butter were feared. There was a procession around the farm on May Eve and holy water was sprinkled copiously.

It was believed that May was a liminal time when the presence of the other world was closer and magic was at it strongest from sunset on May Eve to dawn on May Day. Flowers played a large role in the appeasing of the spirits and offered protection. Flowers like marsh marigolds, branches of gorse in full yellow flower were tied together and hung above doors.

It was also believed that bringing the white flowers of the hawthorn into your home brought bad luck. The May Bough was made from sycamore leaves and was the preferred Bough where I'm from in Cork, as it was thought to guard against bad luck. Another tradition in parts of Ireland to celebrate Bealtaine was the making of a May Baby or Babóg na Bealtaine, made from straw similar to the St Brigits Day Brídeog. The May day custom was for a man and his wife dressed in straw costumes to dance around the doll while the music played with laughter and merriment amongst the crowd all while money was collected. I believe this was certainly a fertility ritual of sorts to seek the blessings of the May spirits.

In the UK they dance around May Poles but in Ireland the people would historically decorate chosen trees or bushes with ribbons, posies and colourful egg shells from easter and would dance around them in celebration.

ANCIENT MAGIC

Magic, as we understand the term, first became a popular art in Mesopotamia nearly 6,000 years ago with the Sumerians followed by the Babylonians, Assyrians, Hitties and Persians. Sumer was conquered by Semitic speaking Akkadians in 2350 BCE, founding the administration capital at Babylon on the Euphrates River.

By 1810 BCE, the influence of powerful rich merchants had spread through Mesopotamia originating from the city-state of Assur on the west bank of the Tigris River. The Greeks called these merchants Assyrians who traded in grain, woven textiles, tin and precious metals, ruling Mesopotamia until the arrival of the Hittites in 1600 BCE. The Hittites settled in Anatolia, modern day Turkey, ruling Mesopotamia up to 1180 BCE. They were named from the Hebrew word 'Hitti', meaning the 'Children of Heth', a Canaanite King who ruled around 1800 BCE. They are understood to have migrated westwards from the Indian subcontinent, bringing Vedic philosophy with them, introducing an Indo-European language with the root words for mother, father, brother, sister, hero, grain, brew and bizarrely, werewolf.

The Greeks described the Hittites as a fierce waring tribal race who were among the first to manufacture iron tools and weapons. They were skilled farmers, road builders and inventors of fast two-wheeled battle chariots. During this time, a new form of magic performed by a priestly caste known as the 'magoi' emerged. The prophet Zarathustra developed this new magic when a revolutionary new way of thinking was revealed to him by an intelligence he called Lord Wisdom or Ahura Mazda, the one true God, a principle of pure focused consciousness. Lord Wisdom created the universe through emanations from which other forces and material manifestations were generated. This primal energy was in constant conflict with the dark destructive spirit known as Angra Mainya, the Devil, a demon serpent who was the epitome of ignorance, violence, destruction and everything negative in the world.

Emanating directly from Lord Wisdom are the seven orders of Archangels, first and the most important is the Holy Spirit who is connected to both Lord Wisdom and humanity. Next came the messengers who we understand as gods and goddesses who can be both

angelic and demonic. Lastly are the guardian angels, assigned to each one of us.

The essence of the Zarathustrian magic is to have consciousness and communication with our guardian angel. Once a link is formed and made permanent, we become magicians, witches etc., a wise person and one of power.



A system of spiritual and intellectual enlightenment was taught to initiates called the 'Great Fellowship', and written down around 1,000 years later during the Persian era (600-330 BCE) as a new religion, Zoroastrianism, that still exists today. Zarathrustrian magic was a combination of spiritual wisdom and the method by which things are revealed and made to happen, a process known as the 'Great Mystery'. The philosophy of the 'Great Fellowship' dealt with moral and scientific principles interacting with one another, increasing individual and collective perfection of being and to be a co-creator with Lord Wisdom. The magic is the applied method of ritual and cosmology - the origin and nature of the universe. One of the main aspects of Zarathustrian magic is the mastery of ceremony techniques based on the many levels of meaning and symbolism. It is the technical understanding of how rituals work by means of channelling forces, mainly the elements of Fire and Water, the interacting of the original world before order prevailed.

Zarathustra was aware of the ritualistic nature and use of words to move the forces of reality. He composed many mantras to invoke the heavenly forces and understood how certain sounds in a certain combination can have certain effects. Mantra is the fuel of the ritual and the medium by which a message is carried from the magician to the deities in the spiritual realm. Ceremonial magic included the arrangement of symbolic objects in the ritual space. They act as a metaphorical understanding between the magician and the deities they wished to connect with. This connection occurs on two levels, one to the celestial and symbolic realm and the other to the terrestrial and natural realm.

The small effects produced in the ritual space begins a process of transformation in the spirit world, its power depending on how accurately and strongly they are channelled. Astrology was included into the act of ritual to view past events, forecast the seasons, and predict the future and other cosmic phenomena that could affect Mesopotamia. The celestial movements determine the historic order of events on the esoteric level. Zarathustra saw the vault of heaven as a dark crystalline rock and the stars as light portals originating in the realm of the gods, revealing an eternal message to humanity from Ahura Mazda. One of the most fundamental practices of the Zarathustrian priests was

silent meditation, seen as the best means of acquiring cosmic knowledge and spiritual insight.

The Hittites were conquered by the Greeks in 1180 BCE with its capital city Troy razed to the ground after the Trojan prince Paris stole away Helen from King Menelaus. A resurgent Babylon regained what they had lost to the Assyrians when the capital city Nineveh was defeated in 612 BCE only to fall to the nomadic Persian warriors in 559 BCE under the command Cyrus the Great. The priests of Zarathustra wrote down his interpretation of the will of Ahura Mazda, passing from generation to generation by word of mouth for the past 1,000 odd years. They founded the Zoroastrian religion who had been waiting for the return of a coming saviour, the messiah who they saw as King Cyrus, as did the Jews who he liberated from slavery in 538 BCE.

Under the command of Xerxes I, Persia attempted to conquer Greece but was beaten back twice before being defeated by King Leonidas and 300 Spartans in 480 BCE heralding in Athens Golden Age and the beginning of modern history.

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
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Am I on Track?

Am I on the Right track with my Witchcraft Practice?

Every other week I get a message from someone who has recently started out on their Witchcraft journey and wants to know if they are on the right track or not. It has happened so often that I now accept that this is a common concern among practitioners, so I thought I would talk about it a little bit here as I do not see a lot of people writing about this, so I hope I can fill a gap in our information sharing.

The first thing that should be said is probably the obvious – there is no one way of doing Witchcraft or magical workings (unless, of course, you belong to a religion or traditional practice – full respect to you). So it can be hard to know if you are on the right track or not for new comers – but basically this is between you and your own moral compass. Do you have a good knowledge and relationship with your moral compass? This is an important step people often overlook.

No one is going to come and grade or rate you, no one is going to give you marks or a certificate, so how do you truly know if you are on the right track or not?

Some people might say that it doesn't matter, that practice is enough, and trying to measure your practice is a waste of energy. I am fully going to challenge that and not just because of the numerous messages I get about the topic. Here is why – we are a social species and get all of our information through our senses from our environment and each other, that's just a fact. It is normal and often necessary to get feedback from other people, and I personally think it is smart to ask experts, especially if you desire to be one too!

With that being said we are often without that sort of information or feedback from experts, and many of us are hesitant to even reach out and ask.

Why? For some reason or another we have this strange perception that being spiritual means knowing all of the answers already, or that "the answer lies within".

Well, that's a cool story....but sometimes that is untrue, and other times that message is completely irresponsible. Unfortunately we live in a culture of toxic individualism that completely undermines our natural state of interdependence.

Do you want to know where to start in your practice? I

will always say the same thing:

- Grounding
- Protection
- Cleansing
- Banishing
- Attraction
- Shadow work (but this is only to be practiced by adults with executive function and who are mentally well).

Read up about these beginner practices and explore how other people do it – what has gone well for them and what could have gone better? Researching will allow you to measure what is right for you and what isn't. When you are ready to start putting methods into practice choose a couple of different approaches and see how they feel to you – really lean into it. Check out your ancestry and try some of their methods too as many people report feeling stronger within this approach.

It is important to note that not every magical practice will feel natural straight away, so do not use this as the means to measure if you are on the right track or not. Just like anything else in life some things take effort. I know in our spiritual circles people will tell you that if it is right for you then it will just flow, but in my experience I have had to work for most things to be good at it, and my spiritual practice is no different. Sure, some things will flow and come naturally to you, but others will require some dedication and work.

Once you have started your practice and want to know if you are on the right track or not you can do a simple self-reflection to assess. This will take some quiet time, journaling, and possible meditation. What you want to do is measure the practice by asking yourself the following questions:

- What is the practice? Explain in detail what you do and what its purpose is.
- What are my thoughts about the practice? Explain any thoughts that come up.
- What are my feelings about the practice? Explain any feelings that come up.
- Knowing how I think and feel about the practice, do I believe I am on the right track or not and why?

Bowl (to soak your feet in)

Flowers!

Yellow Tulips - Yellow for renewal, and tulips for prosperity, hope and self-love.

Daisies and Daffodils- New beginnings, hope for the future and purity.

Bluebells - Luck and moving through obstacles to rise up.

Lavender - Rebirth, luck, tranquillity and happiness. Warm water (this can be flower moon water, left out the night before under the full moon)
Soft Towel and Comfy socks!

Find a time where you can fully relax and feel your power. Fill a bowl with warm water, add in the flower moon water, if you have gathered some, to add that extra connection. Oils: Lavender

Black Pepper: Inner Strength and to banish negative

energy

Protective Gloves and glasses

Wearing your protective gear, take the rose with thorns and pluck off each thorn with tweezers. Think about each thing you wish to get rid of whilst doing this act. Our Nordic cousins really embrace it more than any other country and to them it is not only called Witches' Night but Walpurgis Night. It is named after an 8th Century nun from Wessex, Walpurga. However, it really has nothing to do with the Saint and is a Spring festival often called and viewed as a springtime Halloween for Scandinavia.

Witches' Night occurs the night before Beltane, one of the most powerful festivals of the witches' year. It is the fire festival and a time when the Goddess has returned completely. Bonfires are lit and great rejoicing occurs as we welcome the Goddess of the Spring and Summer back into the world.

We sing and dance to ensure a good harvest and we also embrace the powerful energies that surround us this night. It is often called the Fertility Spring Festival and for good reason with many couples getting married this time of year. A remnant of this can be seen in the Morris Men and May Poles we see the next day, May Day. Just as with Halloween as the

Goddess begins to retreat from the earth and the harvest and bounty disappear, Witches' Night welcomes the Goddess back with open arms and gifts of love, light, laughter.

Here are Twelve ways to celebrate Witches' Night:

1 Light red, and yellow candles and open the windows to let the Spring in. Many people still follow the old ways by opening up the front door at midnight and walking through the house with fresh sprigs of foliage and then going out the back door. You are chasing the winter away through the house and allowing the spring in.

2 Decorate the front with fresh sprigs of foliage or spring flowers that are now in full bloom. But never cut white lilac as this belongs to the Goddess and you are likely to bring bad luck for the rest of the year.



- 3 Plant sunflowers on this night. Sunflowers are the embodiment of summer and warmer days so plant as many sunflower seeds as possible. Then give the plants as gifts to friends if you have too many.
- 4 Create your own ritual on Witches' Night and praise the Goddess. Welcome her in to your garden and life by thanking her for all the good and wonderous things she has brought to life in the garden.
- 5 Read poetry aloud or cast a poetic spell. It might sound strange but poems resonate energy and we need to harness that energy to bring about the powerful change that is Spring. We want to give nature a helping hand. So read or quote your favourite poem, even better if it is about nature.
- 6 Dance. One of the ways to connect to your inner witch is to dance. So, put on your favourite music, turn it up and just go wild round the house or garden dancing.
- 7 Light a bonfire. If you can light a bonfire. In Scandinavia, bonfires are lit and parties are held on this night, to chase away evil. Many people make noises too and there are trick and treats antics with people wearing

masks and costumes too.

- 8 Walpurgis Night is traditionally regarded as one of the most powerful times of the year for ghosts, demons and all manner of scary beings. So, make the most of this night and go on a ghost hunt.
- 9 You could also try your hand at scrying, seeing the future by looking into the flames of a burning candle and watching what images form in your mind's eye.
- 10 Have a midnight picnic. Many people have a party and enjoy being outdoors on this night. They drink sparkling wine and embrace the cool spring night air and raise their glass to the Goddess. So, grab the Prosecco and embrace the night.
- 11 In Lincolnshire, we hang cowslips on doors and windows to ward off evil.
- 12 Create a floral display in your house and really let the spring time in with flowers and plants that are now in full bloom. So, have a vase of tulips, hyacinth and irises in the house.

Creating Your Own Beltane Altar

Beltane celebrates sunshine, abundance, and fertility. The name comes from the Irish "Bealtaine" which translates roughly to "bright fire," and bonfires and candle magic are a staple at Beltane. It's also a time when spirits—especially the fae—are very present in our world, making it a great time for offerings. Though as a note on the fae in particular: make sure you know what you're doing, and who you're dealing with, before you invite them into your life.

When to Create a Beltane Altar

Beltane is a time of eagerness and new beginnings. This is the one altar that you're better off setting up a day early than a day late. The evening of April 30th, or morning of May 1st is the perfect time.

How to Create a Beltane Altar

Pick a spot, and begin to build your altar. Fill this sacred space with symbols of everything you love about Beltane.



Fire. Choose an altar cloth that symbolises fire to you. It might be a deep and bright red, woven in shades of orange, or even be decorated with little candles. Imbue this cloth with the passion of fire so everything you place on it will be magnified. Add candles to enhance the effect, being mindful of candle safety.

Ribbons. Ribbons are used for both Maypole and handfasting rituals. Get several ribbons, or strips of cloth, in bright colours such as orange, yellow, pink, and blue. Braid them together while imbuing the braid with a sense of fertility and abundance. Take a leap of faith in the universe, and do not specify what kind of fertility you seek.

A Sun Bouquet. The sun deserves a place on your Beltane altar, and you can invite it through a bouquet of yellow flowers such as daffodils, dandelions, marigolds and of course sun flowers. Leave the bouquet on your altar for a few days, making sure to remove it before it wilts. If your flowers are not treated with pesticides, you can then leave it in a sun-filled field as an offering. Otherwise, discard in the trash where pollinators won't reach it.

Fertility tokens. Unlike our ribbons, we will imbue these with a specific purpose. Gather fertility tokens such as acorns, seeds, a chalice and sword for a traditional altar, or pleasure items if you work with sex magic. Imbue each with a specific purpose, such as creative fertility or monetary abundance. Don't overask.

Offerings. Leave a cup of coffee for your ancestors, a poem for the fairies, or offerings for whatever other spirits you want to honour and invite into your home. A prayer is also a great offering. May Day is traditionally when Catholics celebrate the Virgin Mary, so now is the perfect time to invite her if you work with Christian saints.

Cards. The Wands suit represents the passion of Beltane, and Pentacles the abundance. Make sure to check individual card meanings before you place any on your altar. The High Priestess, The Empress, The Sun, The World all embody fertility and abundance. The Lovers card is perfect if you're seeking a union. You can also add a painted or printed icon of an Earth Goddess, the Green Man, any fertility deity, or the Virgin Mary.

Your personal altar favourites. What calls to YOU in an altar? Add anything that you associate with Beltane and that makes you happy.




The Ice Maiden by Lucy English




Madame Voodoo by A. W. Jackson
