The successful completion of the curriculum outlined below, along with other administrative and financial requirements, will entitle the student to receive a Certificate of Completion in the Esthetics program at the Academy of Therapeutic Esthetics And Massage.

Facials, Cleansing, Toning, Massaging

120 hours = 72 hours of instruction in classroom and 48 hours in clinic setting

Instructional methods utilized: Lecture based instruction, hands-on practical training, demonstrations and modeling, interactive learning and group discussions, project based learning, digital learning and multimedia resources, cultural competency & inclusivity.

Course Description:

This course offers an in-depth exploration of essential skincare practices, focusing on the vital techniques of facials, cleansing, toning, and facial massage. Students will learn how to analyze different skin types and conditions to select the appropriate treatments. Emphasis is placed on mastering the steps of a facial, including deep cleansing, exfoliating, and applying nourishing masks. Students will also gain expertise in using toners to balance the skin's pH and reduce excess oils, as well as performing therapeutic facial massage techniques to stimulate blood flow, promote relaxation, and improve overall skin health. Additionally, the course includes an overview of skincare products, tools, and their proper usage, allowing students to create customized routines for clients based on their unique skin needs. Special attention will be given to using facial devices.

The content covered in this course will be utilized in all practical hands-on courses and the Student Clinic Experience.

Makeup Application

100 hours of classroom instruction and hands on practice

Instructional methods utilized: Lecture based instruction, hands-on practical training, demonstrations and modeling, interactive learning and group discussions, project based learning, digital learning and multimedia resources, cultural competency & inclusivity.

Course Description:

In this hands-on course, students will develop the skills and techniques needed to perform professional makeup applications. The curriculum covers a range of topics, from understanding skin tones and choosing the right foundation shades to contouring,

highlighting, and creating various eye looks. Students will learn the key principles of makeup artistry, including the use of different tools, brushes, and products to achieve flawless results. The course also explores makeup application for various occasions, from everyday wear to special events and theatrical makeup. Emphasis is placed on hygiene, sanitation, and creating long-lasting makeup looks. Students will gain confidence in applying makeup for diverse clients and will have the opportunity to refine their skills in a practical setting, preparing them for a career in beauty.

The textbook for this course is *Pivot Point Fundamentals Esthetics*.

Hair Removal

80 hours = 48 hours of classroom instruction and hands on practice and 32 hours in clinic setting

Instructional methods utilized: Lecture based instruction, hands-on practical training, demonstrations and modeling, interactive learning and group discussions,

project based learning, digital learning and multimedia resources, cultural competency & inclusivity.

Course Description:

This comprehensive course covers temporary hair removal methods, including waxing and tweezing, ensuring students have the skills and knowledge to perform each technique safely and effectively. Students will learn about the anatomy of hair growth, the best practices for preparing the skin for hair removal, and how to minimize discomfort and skin irritation during the process. The course focuses on facial, body, and Bikini/Brazilian hair removal, offering students a wide range of techniques to suit different client needs. Students will also explore post-hair removal care, learning how to advise clients on soothing treatments and the importance of aftercare to prevent irritation and ingrown hairs. With a strong emphasis on hygiene and safety, this course prepares students to confidently perform professional hair removal treatments in a spa setting.

The content covered in this course will be utilized in the Student Clinic Experience.

The textbook for this course is *Pivot Point Fundamentals Esthetics*.

- 10. Describe the procedures used to perform a hard (non-strip) waxing service

- 12. Describe the preparation and setup for the temporary hair removal treatment room
- 13. Explain temporary hair removal care and safety guidelines

- 16. Demonstrate proper skills to hold a tweezer, handle the area to be tweezed and identify the correct removal direction

Body Treatments/Aromatherapy/Wraps

120 hours = 9 five-hour classes, 1 two-hour class, and 73 hours of hands on practice in Student Clinic Experience

Instructional methods utilized: Lecture based instruction, hands-on practical training, demonstrations and modeling, interactive learning and group discussions, cultural competency & inclusivity.

Course Description: This course explores a variety of standard body treatment, bodywork and body massage modalities that are additional tools in an esthetics practice. Classes include theory and hands-on practice of the following: body scrubs and wraps, Swedish massage, aromatherapy, Indian head massage, lymphatic drainage, cupping, hot stone, chair massage, and prenatal massage.

The content covered in this course will be utilized in the Student Clinic Experience and referenced in the final project for Business Practices & State Law / Spa Management & Salesmanship

The textbooks for this course are *Pivot Point Fundamentals Esthetics*, as well as proprietary handouts, and online instructional videos

Competencies / Learning Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Attain a basic understanding of various modalities along with their benefits & uses and the conditions that are contraindicated for each.
- 2. Acquire technical skills to integrate some or all of these modalities into a regular practice.
- 3. Determine whether they choose to specialize in any of the modalities presented and how to continue with additional training in that field.
- 4. Maintain, set up and clean equipment for safety, sanitation and longevity of the equipment.

Students' progress will be assessed through classroom participation during lectures and classroom practice sessions, through completion of homework reading assignments, and quizzes. Content from this course is included on the mid-course and final exams. Students must achieve a grade of 75% or above on quizzes and exams.

Reflexology

35 hours = 1 five-hour class, 2 six-hours classes and 18 hours of hands on practice in the Student Clinic Experience

Instructional methods utilized: Lecture based instruction, hands-on practical training, demonstrations and modeling, cultural competency & inclusivity.

Course Description: This course introduces students to the therapeutic practice of reflexology, focusing on the benefits and techniques that complement esthetic treatments. Students will study internal organs, muscle and bone structures, their

function and location in the body, as well as their location on the corresponding reflex charts. Students will explore how reflexology can improve overall well-being, enhance relaxation, and support skin health. Through hands-on training, students will learn to apply pressure to specific reflex points on the feet, hands, and ears to promote balance and healing. This course is designed to integrate reflexology into esthetic services, helping students offer a holistic approach to client care.

The textbook for this course will be *Pivot Point Fundamentals Esthetics*. We will also be using handouts, reference charts and study guides from various sources and other anatomy textbooks.

Competencies / Learning Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Understand the principles and history of reflexology and its connection to esthetic treatments.
- 2. Learn the internal organs, body muscles and bones that correspond with reflex points on the feet, hands & ears.
- 3. Identify key reflex points on the feet, hands, and ears and their corresponding areas of the body.
- 4. Learn effective reflexology techniques for relaxation, stress relief, and skin health enhancement.
- 5. Integrate reflexology into facial, body, and massage treatments to promote client well-being.
- 6. Understand contraindications and safety protocols for reflexology in esthetic practices.
- 7. Develop the ability to customize reflexology treatments based on client needs and health conditions.

Students' progress will be assessed through classroom participation during lectures and in-class practical exchanges, a quiz, and documented hands-on practice sessions outside of the classroom. Course material will be covered on the mid-term and final exams. Students must achieve a grade of 75% or above on the quiz and written exams and must display competency during the hands-on practical exam.

Cosmetic Sciences, Structure, Conditions, Disorders

85 hours = 53 hours of instruction in classroom and 32 hours in clinic setting

Instructional methods utilized: Lecture based instruction, hands-on practical training, demonstrations and modeling, interactive learning and group discussions, project based learning, digital learning and multimedia resources, cultural competency & inclusivity.

Course Description: This course provides a comprehensive foundation in the science of skin. Students will learn about the structure and function of the skin, along with common skin conditions and disorders that impact esthetic treatments. Topics include acne, aging, pigmentation issues, and various dermatological concerns, with an emphasis on understanding how these conditions influence cosmetic procedures. This course equips students with the knowledge needed to assess, treat, and recommend appropriate esthetic solutions while promoting overall skin health and wellness.

The content covered in this course will be utilized in all practical hands-on courses and the Student Clinic Experience.

The textbook for this course is *Pivot Point Fundamentals Esthetics*.

Cosmetic Chemistry, Products & Ingredients

75 hours = 45 hours of instruction in classroom and 30 hours in clinic setting

Instructional methods utilized: Lecture based instruction, hands-on practical training, demonstrations and modeling, interactive learning and group discussions, project based learning, digital learning and multimedia resources, cultural competency & inclusivity.

Course Description: This course in Cosmetic Chemistry, Products & Ingredients provides a comprehensive overview of the science behind skincare and cosmetic formulations. Students will explore the key ingredients in beauty products, their

functions, and how they interact with the skin. Topics include the chemistry of common cosmetic ingredients, safety and regulatory standards, product formulation, and how to select and recommend products based on skin types and concerns. Through this course, students will gain a foundational understanding of the products they will use and recommend in their future esthetics careers.

The content covered in this course will be utilized in all practical hands-on courses and the Student Clinic Experience.

The textbook for this course is Pivot Point Fundamentals Esthetics.

- 11. Offer examples of regulations governing cosmetics
- 12. Define matter and its forms
- 13. Compare physical changes with chemical changes of substances
- 14. Describe the basic units of matter, including elements, atoms, molecules and compounds
- 15. Explain the three major biochemical components of the body and skin
- 16. Explain the effects of acids and alkalis in water in relation to pH
- 17. Summarize the significance of the pH scale, including measuring, balancing and the effects of pH on the skin
- 18. Identify product ingredients that pose potential contraindications in our clinic
- 19. Describe the product ingredients and key benefits of all products used in the clinic

Students' progress will be assessed through classroom room participation during lectures and small group activities, homework assignments, and quizzes. Students

must achieve a grade of 75% or above on all quizzes. Content from this course is included on the mid-term and final exams.

Salon/Spa Management & Salesmanship & State Law

65 hours = 55 one-hour classes in Spa Management & Salesmanship, Professionalism & Ethics, and 10 one-hour classes in State Law

Instructional methods utilized: Lecture based instruction, interactive learning and group discussions, project based learning, digital learning and multimedia resources, cultural competency & inclusivity.

Course Description: This course contains topics such as business fundamentals, marketing strategies, client management, practice setup, legal and ethical considerations, state law and compliance with industry regulations, and adherence to professional codes of ethics from organizations like the National Interstate Council of State Boards of Cosmetology. This course is tailored to the specific needs of an esthetics practice, whether it be in an employment setting or an independent practice. Students will write an informal business plan as a guide for their first year in practice.

The content covered in this course will be utilized in practice hands-on sessions in the Student Clinic Experience.

The textbooks for this course are *Pivot Point Fundamentals of Esthetics* and *Business Mastery* by Ben E. Benjamin and Cherie M. Sohnen-Moe. The textbooks will be supplemented by printed state statutes and regulations.

Competencies / Learning Objectives:

- 1. Create a strategy using common marketing methods for start-up clientele and repeat business.
- 2. Develop a strategy for a successful practice, business, or employment situation.
- 3. Differentiate between business structures (sole proprietorship, LLC, etc.)
- 4. Identify the process required for an esthetics license and what steps remain in that process after graduation.
- 5. Identify state and federal legal requirements for creating, maintaining and retaining client, financial and tax records.

- 6. Review State statutes governing estheticians and salon & spa businesses in the State of Missouri.
- 7. Maintain proper documentation practices to protect client privacy and personal information.
- 8. Manage client expectations regarding the benefits and limitations of skin therapy.
- 9. Recognize and navigate situations that are beyond the scope of practice for an esthetician.

Students' progress will be assessed through classroom room participation during lectures and small group activities, homework assignments, quizzes, and a final project encompassing class content throughout the course. Students must achieve a grade of 75% or above on quizzes and the final project. Content from this course is included on the mid-term and final exams.

Hygiene, Sanitation, Sterilization & Safety

45 hours = 5 one hour classes covering topics below, plus 40 hours of hands-on practice and review in the Student Clinic Experience

Instructional methods utilized: Lecture based instruction, hands-on practical training, demonstrations and modeling, interactive learning and group discussions.

Course Description: This course provides essential knowledge and practical skills in maintaining hygiene and safety in esthetics practices. Students will learn about universal precautions, proper sanitation techniques, and effective infection control measures to prevent the transmission of infections. Topics include personal and environmental cleanliness, safe handling of equipment, and protocols to ensure a safe, healthy environment for both practitioners and clients. By the end of the course, students will be equipped with the tools to uphold the highest standards of hygiene and safety in their professional practice.

The content covered in this course will be utilized in all practical hands-on courses and the Student Clinic Experience.

The textbook for this course is *Pivot Point Fundamentals of Esthetics*.

Competencies / Learning Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Define types of pathogens that could be found within a spa/esthetics practice environment.

- 2. Describe the ways infection is transmitted within a spa/esthetics practice environment.
- 3. Define the term "cleaning" as related to infection control.
- 4. Explain the disinfection method for tools and multi-use supplies.
- 5. Offer examples of various sterilization methods.
- 6. Identify infection control procedures used in a spa/esthetics practice.
- 7. Demonstrate appropriate levels of personal hygiene in the spa/school environment.

Students' progress will be assessed through classroom room participation during lectures and small group activities, quizzes, and documented sanitation checklists for all hands on services. Students must achieve a grade of 75% or above on all quizzes. Content from this course is included on the mid-term and final exams.

Student Clinic Experience

273 hours = Students will perform 273 hours of hands on services - 15% of each hands on service (40 hours) is documented Hygiene, Sanitation, Sterilization & Safety procedures; 12% of each hands on service (32 hours) is Cosmetic Science, Structure, Condition & Disorders evaluation & documentation; 11% of each service (30 hours) is Cosmetic Chemistry, Products & Ingredients identification & documentation; the remaining hours (171 hours) will be performing the steps of services (73 hours of body treatments/aromatherapy/wrap services, 32 hours of hair removal services, 18 hours of reflexology services, 48 hours of facial services).

Instructional methods utilized: Hands-on practical training, demonstrations and modeling, cultural competency & inclusivity.

Course Description: The Student Clinic Experience is the practical component which allows students to apply esthetics and skin care services under the close supervision of instructors. This allows them to gain hands-on experience in a real world situation in a controlled environment.

This course includes an introduction to clinic experience, scheduling their clinic hours, the service documentation process including guest intakes and post-treatment notes, exploration of the clinic space, utilization and documentation of hygiene, sanitation, sterilization and safety procedures used in/before/after each service, documentation of guest consultations evaluating client skin structure, conditions and disorders, and documentation and discussion of the appropriate cosmetic and skin care products, their ingredients, any allergies or contraindications for each client in utilizing such products.

The textbook for this course is *Pivot Point Fundamentals Esthetics*.

Competencies / Learning Objectives:

Upon successful completion, students will be able to:

- 1. Refine technical skills and appropriate documentation within a spa environment.
- 2. Conduct thorough intake consultations to identify product allergies, contraindications, skin conditions & disorders, areas of concern and tailor treatment accordingly.
- 3. Perform necessary hygiene, sanitation and sterilization practices prior to, during, and after each service.
- 4. Integrate feedback from instructors and clients on technique, pressure, body mechanics and client communication to ready themselves for future career opportunities.
- 5. Demonstrate clinical reasoning when developing treatment plans.
- 6. Establish an effective closing consultation based on clients' individual needs that encourages an at-home treatment plan and follow-up care.
- Complete hands-on sessions in a professional manner and environment, including 273 hours of hands on practice on clinic customers, staff, or other students.

Students' progress will be assessed through instructor observations of the sessions, client survey forms, students' self surveys and completion of service notes forms that clearly demonstrate clinical reasoning. The Student Clinic Experience occurs in a workplace environment, therefore the students' performance with timeliness and adhering to clinic policies is also considered a factor.

CPR & First Aid

5 hours = 1 five-hour class

Instructional methods used: Lecture based instruction, hands-on practical training, demonstrations and modeling.

Course Description: Taught by the American Red Cross, this course includes peer-to-peer interactive scenarios to build the skills and confidence to provide this life saving procedure.

Competencies / Learning Objectives:

Students will receive CPR and First Aid certification so students can provide assistance to someone who is having a cardiac or breathing emergency.

Students' progress will be monitored and assessed by a representative of the American Red Cross through small group activities and individual practice.

The representative will observe practice for a demonstration of competency. A written test will be administered. Upon completion with a passing score of 80% or above, the student will receive a certificate stating they are CPR and First Aid Certified.

Student Dynamics

20 hours = 1 six-hour class and 14 one-hour classes

Instructional methods utilized: Lecture based instruction, interactive learning and group discussions, project based learning, digital learning and multimedia resources.

Course Description: Student Dynamics refers to topics beyond academic content, including student and teacher behaviors, emotions, and interactions. This course outlines the expectations for the students' behavior and academic success as well as what students can expect from the faculty and administration. Through exploring the seven major learning styles, students will discover how they learn best individually in order to develop active learning and studying strategies.

The content covered in this course will be utilized in all other courses.

There is no textbook for this course. Material from the Student Handbook and Program Guidelines will be presented and reviewed, along with other supplemental handouts.

Competencies / Learning Objectives:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Explain the policies, rules and regulations required of attendees of the Academy of Therapeutic Esthetics and Massage (ATEAM).
- 2. Identify the roles of the ATEAM administration and who holds these positions.
- 3. Build effective classroom behaviors and study habits based on seven major learning styles.
- 4. Utilize available resources in the event of academic or personal struggle.

Students' progress will be assessed through classroom participation during lectures and small group activities. The determining factor of the effectiveness of this course is how the students implement the material covered throughout the program. Written

assignments may be required should students not display competency in recollecting policies, procedures or regulations of the program.
