We have a challenge!

God has big plans for our ministry and your Council is committed to everything we are doing. This is the time of year when the Finance Committee watches finances very closely, and some people start to worry.

This year, instead of worrying, we are going to do something about it. We are currently \$17,000 behind in our revenues compared to what we have spent. We have kept very close to the budget voted on and approved by the congregation. In fact, if we were fully funding each ministry, we would be closer to \$30,000 behind.

This week, your Council committed to do two things:

- Each member promised that their family would review their giving intentions and make sure they are up-to-date, and
- Each member would contribute an additional gift to help fully fund our ministry.

In addition to this, we are able to share that one family is offering \$4,000 if 75 families contribute an additional gift this summer. This is over 10% of our need met by just one family! If the rest of us can provide the following gifts:

- 1 gift of \$2,000
- 6 gifts of \$1,000
- 12 gifts of \$600
- 30 gifts of \$300
- 16 gifts of \$125

We can exceed our goal with just these gifts. Certainly, any gift you give is a tremendous blessing. Perhaps you can even consider a gift between levels. The church is at its best when we each do our part. Please consider getting current on your giving if you are behind and consider joining the Council with an additional gift.

Hi all!

I feel so blessed today to be writing this newsletter article from a different location than my desk in my office. Some of my colleagues have suggested taking time occasionally to get off sight and work in order to gain a new perspective. Other than at home, I've never worked outside of my church office. That probably needs to change now and then. But I must admit, it definitely feels kinda weird.

As I sit here at my laptop with an icy drink nearby, I can't help but look out the window into this beautiful day that the Lord has made. I notice all sorts of things ... the wind blowing the leaves in the trees, pollen floating around. I hear the voices of conversations happening all around me (and they are HAPPY voices of people deeply engaged with each other, even though the conversations that I can fully understand are mostly about nothing). I notice the busy world driving by I also notice the decal on the windows that displays what appears to be Biggby's philosophy and/or mission statement: *B happy * have fun * make friends * love people * drink great coffee *

I don't know why it is, but I always feel like the secular world takes all the best lines that really ought to be used by a church that has been captured by the Spirit. I mean seriously ... Happy? Fun? Friends? Love? Coffee? Who wouldn't want to stay awhile with a people who live fearlessly into that!?

It's a HOLY SPIRIT mission (yes, even the coffee. A memorable experience topped off with a great cup of coffee is most definitely a holy spiritual gift).

It's the Friday before Pentecost Sunday, and of course the Holy Spirit has been on my mind in an extra sort of way this week. I've read LOTS about this nebulous thing that we place SO much hope and trust in for comfort, assurance, advocacy, intercession, and guidance. Yet, I've discovered again this year that we are just completely baffled by it as Jesus followers. At this point, we have heard Jesus' promise weekly to send this "presence" into our lives. Those of us who have been through confirmation already know that "Lutheran language" says this Spirit "calls, gathers, enlightens and sanctifies" ... but do we really know when that's actually happening?

Friends, the truth is it's happening ALL THE TIME. It happens in a sanctuary on a Sunday morning, or in a newly re-purposed room at the end of a hall on Wednesday evenings. It happens at the tables we set afterward for coffee and treats or an evening meal. It happens when we decide to go do some yoga together while goats are climbing all over us. It happens when we learn that we can clean out our closets and someone somewhere will be more delighted than we will ever know that we did it. It happens when we look out the window at Biggby on a beautiful Thursday afternoon, through the haze of a window decal that reminds us that the mission of a church and the mission of a coffee shop are NOT that dissimilar. It happens when you notice on the other side of that haze sits BioLife, where you can stop in and give the gift of plasma right after you have sucked down your second latte of the afternoon.

You never know when and how the Spirit is going to work. You can't grab hold of it, and inspect it for a little bit ... and then let it go like a butterfly – but it still delivers! You know it's working because it awakens something in you when you least expect it, and it brings you joy ... even when you're already feeling pretty joyful.





From your Parish Nurses JULY

The Everyone Sees Differently pictures provide a visual of what it is like to have a loss of eyesight. A loss of eyesight can be a risk factor for falls, social isolation and independence. "Everyone Sees Differently" was developed by the Wisconsin Council of the Blind & Visually Impaired, www.wcblind.org. They have resources to answer questions and they offer vision therapists, rehabilitation teachers, and orientation/mobility instructors. The Council has a catalog that has products to help low vison and blind individuals. There are many vision aids that can improve daily life such as a large remote for TV, items that enlarge print, playing cards, needle threading device and many more items to make daily living tasks easier. Knowing available resources can help achieve independence.

Isaiah 42:16 "I will lead the blind by ways they have not known, along unfamiliar paths I will guide them; I will turn darkness into light before them and make rough places smooth. These things I will do; I will not forsake them."

No two people see alike. Terms like totally blind, visually impaired, or low vision attempt to describe functional sight. Some people's eyesight cannot be corrected with glasses. This is called visual impairment.

Everyone SEES Differently



Typical
All of us see differently.
We've chosen to call this image normal for lack of a better term. Perhaps it's better to call it unobstructed.




Macular Degeneration
This is the leading cause of low vision. It occurs most commonly in older people, and it damages central vision, making reading difficult.



Glaucoma


High pressure inside the eye causes a loss of side or peripheral vision. In most cases, the disease is painless and progresses slowly.



Cataracts
The clouding of the eye's own crystalline lens is called a cataract. People with cataracts are often bothered by bright light and glare.



Diabetic Retinopathy
This disease may occur
when someone has had diabetes for several years.
Damage to eyesight can
occur in the entire field of
vision.



Total Blindness
Blindness is measured by
the degree to which
someone cannot see. It
can occur at birth, from
disease, or trauma, and in
any person.
