Storm Cleanup & First Communion



When in-person worship resumed about a year ago, congregations across America experienced a significant decrease in our pre-pandemic attendance rates – though they had already been declining noticeably for quite some time. While there were congregations who grew in the last 27 months, the far-more-frequent story is decline - in some cases (including ours), up to 40% or more.

There are many reasons: some folks are still concerned about safety as exposures and infections continue rise and ebb, others now prefer worship online even though in-person is now pretty universally offered, and still others gave up and walked away. We still do not know how all this will ultimately play out nor settle. But as I have suggested along the way, the pandemic did not cause anything new to happen. It just accelerated what was already happening - a deeper cultural shift that has been underway for decades.

Looking to history, post-American Revolution, institutions built around voluntary association. Churches that were organized under a state church model in Europe evolved in America into religion that was independent. Congregations organized around voluntary association, with individuals choosing to join or support the organization, thereby claiming at least a piece of their identity from membership in it. This changed the way church had always been done and led to great innovation in the religious realm. Groups organized, and folks joined, participated, and served in and through them. Denominations developed that allowed for greater association, organization, resources, and influence. While unleashing a lot of fresh activity, innovation and progress, these institutions also became exclusive (to their detriment). The ELCA (in its various expressions) and its partner ministries were basically designed amid and largely for the Age of Association.

Since the late 1960's, the Age of Association has given way to what is called the Age of Authenticity. People find identity much less from the institutional attachments, and more from their individual choices. The focus is now on discovering and expressing their true selves, not affiliating with or serving institutions. In fact, institutions now elicit deep suspicion. In this new age, people feel free to leave voluntary associations and institutions without embedding themselves elsewhere. Things are far less rigid, and social and economic responsibilities once carried by institutions (ie. defined benefit pension plans) continue to shift to individuals. So, it is no real shock that the weight of membership declines is debilitating. Leaders of other voluntary associations - scouts, unions, PTA, band boosters - say the same thing. A larger cultural transformation is afoot, and we need to be open and willing to think outside the box, but we largely have not been.

There is incredible loss and grief associated with this, especially among older generations for whom the association model made sense and worked well. Lots of congregations are now sustained by faithful elders who understand building, serving and sustaining voluntary associations. They cannot comprehend how their children and grandchildren take a hard pass on affiliation and participation. Attempting to promote affiliation and participation (and financial support) is proving a touch proposition.

I have been asking along the way for us to focus our holy curiosity on how we can embrace this new age rather than resist it with all our might. The Age of Authenticity offers us a great opportunity to share the gospel in a culture where people are told to go their own way and find their own meaning, purpose and community. It is clear we all want deeper connections than those facilitated by social media, more adequate stories than those provided by consumerism, and more just and sustainable ways of patterning human life than we see around and within us. There is isolation, despair and division. I cannot think of a better God-moment for the church to uplift and make known the promises of God in Jesus Christ! We must awaken ourselves to embrace and model the gracious way the gospel provides to this culture that has been trained to go its own way, and find its own meaning, purpose and community.

If the church is going to make those promises known in this new age, we must embrace ministry outside the old boxes of association and assimilation. Our core values of Christian faith and community will not change, but we must learn to express them in new, culturally sensitive and welcoming ways. We must be extra gentle with each other, experiment, and faithfully innovate. Instead of expecting people to come to us, we need to find ways to spend time where people already are and learn how to connect the gospel into our daily living, especially in its longings and lostness. We must embody the richness of Christian spirituality in simple, accessible practices that people can see in ordinary lives and try on for themselves. People are seeking real, honest expressions of spirituality, community, justice and hope ... and THAT is a good thing.

May we meet them where they are with the good news of Jesus.

GSLC Task Force for Financial Options

- o Current Members: Pastor Kemp, Josh Stumpner, Laurie Sturzenegger
 - Could use a few more members
 - Tony O, Andy W were contacted
 - Tim L. was as well, but not as willing
- o Tim L and Josh S. will be doing a Q&A type podcast on 5/12
- Tim L offered to do a temple talk as well if necessary
- o Need to get council members to talk in front of congregation
 - Schedule was discussed and Sundays were dispersed
 - MI had feelings that an Executive Team member should be 1st
 - Tim L to do May 15th to start a series of council members presenting each Sunday
- Expected giving should be mentioned at \$35/mo. or \$8-10 /wk. from our roughly 200 regular contributors
- o Record June messages for posting online

Recording of Services

- Still not great as we don't have dedicated folks running cameras/sound
- o l shot to record during a service. If it doesn't work well, we have nothing to post
- o Mike stopped and talked to Sound World for ideas
- o PK not sure if a system issue or a platform issue (YouTube)
- o Don't have someone to sit at soundboard in back of church
- Chad to email a cousin who is a pastor as well as a friend who does music recording in Madison for any ideas

Bishop Anne Meeting

- o Josh gave recap on his discussion with her
 - Holy Closure keep things positive

- Estimated to take 3-6 months
- A decision to close is a congregational decision
- Yoking with another church
 - Yoking is basically just a sharing of a pastor
 - Typically done prior to a merger
 - ECLA prefers a yoking to be done with thriving churches, not one's looking to survive
 - Josh reached out to St. Stevens
- Josh suggested a task force to investigate yoking further
 - Motion to explore Chad/MJ)

Kartika Update

- She received her EAD in late April meaning she got an extension to work for GSLC while her Green Card application is being approved
 - Possibly a 3 month wait
- Her Visa states she can work for GSLC ONLY and has to be employed by GSLC for the next two years.
 - Bad news is if GSLC ends up closing

Technology Update

- o Comparison of Tithe.ly vs Vanco
 - Moving to Tithe.ly and removing similar products would save us about \$1025/yr.
 - Will discuss and potentially decide in June Council Meeting after members are provided documents for review
 - . Move would be a lot of work, but may be worth it in the end

 - Chad working on getting us compliant
- Chad to looking into having an online payment available for the plant sale
- o Chad to work with Angie to get Vanco Mobile Giving moved higher on website Home page
