In March in Ohio, after the ground has warmed some, it is usually safe to plant onions, asparagus, rhubarb, strawberries, grapevines, small bush fruits, fruit and shade trees, evergreens, shrubs, and roses. Prune fruit and shade trees, grapevines, and shrubs which bloom in summer and fall.

Our annual poinsettia sale fundraiser was successful. Every year since 2019 our profit has been increasing. We had the highest profit in the past four years. Thank you to all who purchased poinsettias and made many phone calls to your contacts for orders. In addition to my customers purchasing poinsettias I purchased several and gave most of them to family members and kept one for myself. My poinsettia is still looking

PROBLEM	REASON	SOLUTION
Yellow, soggy leaves	Overwatering	Remove from soil and let dry out completely
Shriveled, wilted, or crispy leaves	Underwatering	Water thoroughly and let drain completely
Brown spots on leaves	Too much sun	Remove damaged leaves and adjust sun exposure
Stunted growth or stretched stems	Not enough sun	Move to place with increased sun exposure
Leaves turning brown, soggy, or odorous	Rot	Cut off rotten parts or propagate healthy parts
