## TELEIOS — Learning Styles Short Overview

Students have different styles of learning. Some of them are **visual** – *they study with the help of visual support*, others are **auditory** – *they like listening and talking*, and others are **tactile/kinesthetic** – *they prefer to analyze text, highlight or underline it, and take many notes*. However, most of us have **a mixed learning style**. The important thing to remember is that any learning style can lead to successful learning.

Definition of Learning Styles: "Your natural learning preference or style dictates how your brain works most efficiently to process, comprehend, and learn new information, and how easily or quickly you learn something new."

Visual Learners: Learn best by seeing. That means graphic displays, such as charts, diagrams, illustrations, handouts, and videos, appeal to people with a visual learning style. Visual learners prefer this type of learning and would rather see information presented visually rather than in written form.

**Auditory Learners:** Learn best by hearing information. They enjoy listening to lectures and are good at remembering things they are told.

Kinesthetic (or Tactile) Learners: Learn best by touching and doing. Hands-on experience is important for kinesthetic learners. If you are a Kinesthetic (or Tactile) learner, trace words (or highlight words or phrases) while reading them. Facts that must be learned should be written, so keep a supply of sticky Post-it notes for this purpose. Do your best to take ample lecture notes and make study sheets. sheets.
