September 18--Mark your calendars for the 25th Annual Heritage Day at the Grand River Valley Museum from 1 to 5 p.m. Vendors, crafters, a blacksmith, a turn-of-the-century farm display, and more will be seen, as well as Jerry Apps, Wisconsin author and Karl Stewart, area author.

Heidi and Russ Hirschy presented the program during the August meeting, telling of their adventures in Iceland.

Did you know that astronauts trained to go to the moon in Iceland? Why? Because of the similarity in landscape.

There is just one road that goes around the country. Being an island with many fjords, 13 tunnels provide easier travel for the population. Going around each and every fjord would be too time consuming, and bad weather travel is much easier because of the tunnels.

Iceland has hundreds of earthquakes per month, prompting the installation of fences on mountains to restrain falling rocks.

On June 1st the cows are let out of the barns during the day, but must come in again at night because of the 45 degree temperatures. There are 800,000 sheep in the country, thereby producing the famous Icelandic wool. Iceland has more hot springs and sulfur steam areas than any other country. Homes are heated with 80 per cent thermal power. The word geyser comes from the name of Iceland's most famous spring, *Geysir*, which spouts water about 195 feet into the air.

Volcanoes and glaciers are also evident in Iceland, making it a land of contrasts.

David Prill will be popping corn by the Barn and Donnie and Pat Dallman and Marlene Scott will be serving pie and ice cream and lemonade in the main building.


Talented society members have often offered their skills shortly before Heritage Day.
