

Sheri Hicken, the 54th Alice in Dairyland, (2001-2002) was the speaker for the January meeting. Originally from Sauk County, she and her husband, Jeff, and two sons, Cole and Drew, now call Dodge County home. Continuing to tell agriculture's story, Sheri works as the Agricultural Educator and completes Community Outreach for the School for Agricultural and Environmental Studies, (SAGES) a project-based public charter school in Fox Lake.

Genealogy Data Structures

Where to Begin

*Sort items by categories: Diaries, Family Albums, Obituaries, Other Genealogies, Other Pictures.

*Decide on structure and format--manually or computer generated.

*Decide on the scope.

*Obtain the necessary "tools." Genealogy charts or computer applications.

*Research--Ancestry websites, Cemeteries, Historical Societies, Libraries, Newspaper Articles, Obituaries, Other Genealogies, Scrapbooks.
