
In 2019, here in the Town of Olive, we voted in our Town Supervisor, Town Board and Town Justice candidates. On the county level we elected Democrat Pat Ryan as Ulster County Executive. We elected David Clegg as Ulster County DA, the first Democrat to hold that position in 169 years! We elected Bryan Rounds as Ulster County Court Judge, the first time a Democrat has been elected to that position since the Civil War!

This election year may be one of the most important in recent history. In addition to the Presidential election we have other important elections that will have sweeping and profound long term influence on all of us for the next decade. Your vote is critical.

**Don't be Undercounted:** With only 69% participation in the 2010 census, New Yorkers have been short changed by \$0.31 on the federal dollars they deserve! Let's get everyone counted.



**Representation:** Census population counts are used to determine how many Congressional seats a state gets. At the NY State level, officials use the census to redraw legislative districts for the State Senate and Assembly.



**Federal Funds:** Get counted to make sure NY State gets its fair share of the \$675 billion Federal funds distributed for health centers, highways, social programs, and education.



**State Funds:** An accurate count of county residents (regardless of citizenship status) means *more state investment in our hospitals, schools, roads and infrastructure.* 



**Future investment**: Leaders and investors use the latest census to make decisions about opening businesses, developing housing, and planning infrastructure projects.




**Economic Fairness:** Accurate census data ensures fairness in the drawing of school districts. It determines fair market rents and lending practices, and eligibility for loans and benefits.

### Congressional **District NY19**

Your congressman serves in the U.S. House of Represenatives. Their main focus is creating and passing legislation that benefits citizens of the district, and the country as a whole. House committees study and develop new bills. A majority vote is required to move that bill to the Senate.

### NYS Senate **District 51**

Your State Senator serves in the upper house of the New York State Legislature. The 63 members represent large districts. As part of the Legislature, the Senate is responsibile for drafting and approving changes to the laws of New York.

## NYS Assembly **District 103**

Your State Assemblyman serves in the lower house of the New York State Legislature.
With more members (150), the Assembly is the rough equivalent of the US House of Representatives Assembly Districts represent

smaller clusters of towns.



#### **ANTONIO DELGADO**


Antonio Delgado was elected to Congress to represent the 19th Congressional District in 2018. Since that time he has been a voice for his constituents across the district and has been accountable to them, holding 33 town halls in 2019, 3 in each of the 11 counties in the 19th Congressional District.

Representative Delgado has sponsored 28 bills so far. The bills address causes like rural broadband, money in politics, veterans' issues, and green jobs. Six of these bills have passed by the House and one, the Family Farmer Relief Act of 2019, signed into law. He is one of just five members of the freshman class to have accomplished that feat.

Your vote for Antonio Delgado will ensure that District 19 citizens will continue to have a voice.

In 2019, the NY Legislature passed election reform including early and expanded voter registration. Campaign finance reform included limits on LLC campaign contributions.

Working with local and state-wide partners,
Assemblyman Cahill authored and co-sponsored
legislation including The Comprehensive
Contraceptive Care Act, The Emergency Tenant
Protection Act, and Farm Workers' Bill of Rights
ensuring collective bargaining.


There's still work to be done. Let's keep the momentum going and re-elect Kevin Cahill.

March 12–20 Households will begin receiving official Census Bureau mail with detailed information on how to respond to the 2020 Census online, by phone, or by mail.

April 1: Census Day is observed nationwide. Respond to the 2020 Census you've received online, by phone, or by mail.

May-July: Census takers will visit homes that haven't responded to the 2020 Census to make sure everyone is counted.

#### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

#### 1. Can I vote in the Primary Elections?

If you are a registered Democrat, you can vote in the Presidential Primary on April 28 and the Congressional/State Primaries on June 23.

Visit *voterlookup.elections.ny.gov* to confirm your voter registration.

#### 2. Can I vote if I'm not yet registered?

You must be registered to vote. Get registered by:

- April 3 in order to vote in the April 28 Presidential Primary
- May 29 for the June 23 Congressional and State Primaries
- October 9 to vote in the November 3 General Election

#### 3. What if I'll be away on an Election Day?

There are two options if you cannot vote on Primary Day or General Election Day:

- 1. Early Voting sites visit elections.ulstercountyny.gov/early-voting
- 2. Absentee Ballot voting, see elections.ny.gov/VotingAbsentee.html

**NOTE:** Votes cast during Early Voting are tallied immediately. Absentee Ballots are counted after Election Day and are liable to challenge by lawyers in the case of a disputed election. Choose Early Voting whenever possible.

#### 4. Is my registration active? and to which party?

Visit *voterlookup.elections.ny.gov* to confirm your voter registration active status, voting and mailing addresses, and party.

Vote! Get your family and friends ready and registered. Educate them on the issues and make sure everyone has a plan to vote.




**Support a Candidate!** Join a campaign as a volunteer. Carry petitions, raise money, and get out your message.

**Help Get Out the Vote!** Attend a postcard writing party. Host a table at a public event. Join a voter registration drive. Make calls to voters in the final days before the election.



**Stand and be counted!** Help your district get the funding and representation it deserves by completing your Census forms. Encourage friends, family and neighbors to do so, too.



**Get Your Ideas Heard!** Be in touch with your elected officials. Learn their positions on the issues and tell them how you'd like them to vote on upcoming legislation.
