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Due to the absence of the Secretary, the Chair appointed Melissa Coudeyras as Acting Secretary.

**<u>SPECIAL PRESENTATION</u>**: Emily Tranter, executive Director of the National Organization to Insure a Sound Controlled Environment (N.O.I.S.E.) was introduced by Brad Pierce and welcomed by all. She joined the meeting virtually, to provide updates from the Federal level about noise issues and airport funding.

*Legislative information*: Covid impacted air travel and policy. N.O.I.S.E. had asked the FAA to continue to look at various issues. There had been some movement with the American Rescue Plan passed by Congress last year which provided funds to help with Covid relief and long-term recovery with for the FAA. Congress and the Biden administration have invested in transportation and aviation recovery. The Federal government infused \$1.1 trillion into infrastructure funding. As far as aviation is concerned, \$25 billion in for airports, \$5 billion to improve aging airport terminals, \$15 billion to increase safety and expand capacity to include airport improvement programs. The third phase of the Continuous Lower Energy, Emissions, and Noise Program (CLEEN) investment is to go to aircraft companies to improve aircraft emissions and reduce noise levels by producing quieter aircraft. CLEEN is the FAA's principal environmental effort to accelerate the development of new aircraft and engine technologies. Tranter then noted after January 1, 2022, many legislators are now focused on re-election instead of business in the legislature.

Question was asked about impacts of 5G on airports. Tranter was not aware of this issue. It was noted there is going to be a 2week delay by Verizon and AT&T for implementing 5G, which is their 5th generation mobile network. This new global wireless standard after 1G, 2G, 3G, and 4G networks, enables a new kind of network that is designed to connect virtually everyone and everything together including machines, objects, and devices. The concern is 5G transmitters could adversely affect some radio altimeters, crucial to navigation systems of planes and helicopters, particularly those needed for instrument flying. Tranter indicated she would speak to her air traffic controller expert to get more information about this..

Question also asked about the FAA and reducing noise from flight schools? Tranter stated that federal policy impacts flight schools, but this would be a long-term change. It was likely any changes would occur at the local level, not the Federal level. Brad Pierce gave a brief synopsis of what CACNR had been doing to work on this issue here..

Question was asked about the money that has been slated to go to large aircraft companies to reduce emissions and reduce noise. Will they also be making smaller planes quieter? Tranter said this is a policy program for funding and the companies must apply for it. Not sure if companies have applied.

1. Flight Schools Meeting Draft Summary Report. Brad Pierce spoke about the flight schools meeting and the draft report which had been sent to the Members' Representatives and Alternates. He asked for feedback on the report which would be shared with Jason. It had been a good meeting, with three schools attending. Andy Jones indicated he went to the Aspen Flight School after the meeting and they were excited about working with us and to learning more about the locations that have issues with noise. They were talking about moving the southwest flight training area further south on their own. Jones would like to go to the other schools as well. Idea was expressed that it might be nice to have a presentation from them next month or have a back-and-forth discussion with CACNR. The owner had encouraged the chief pilot to engage with the Roundtable. Mike Fronapfel would reach out and invite them to come to the February meeting. The other flight schools may be asked to come to other meetings..

D. <u>AIRPORT DIRECTOR'S REPORT</u> –1. Airport Activity- Mike Fronapfel reported Lauren Wiarda and Samantha Blymyer had been hired to take over some of the workload left by his promotion and the departure of Rachel Keller. There had been some delays in the availability of various reports during the transition time.

Jet fuel sales had been 35% higher in December 2021 than December 2020. Operations had been down a little. Some training flights had been pushed out to other airports due to Air Traffic Control trying to limit traffic on the parallel runways. There will be a closure of the training runway next year for construction. Hangar development is catering to jet/corporate traffic.

Question was asked about concerns about the City of Centennial's land use. Mike Fronapfel indicated ACPAA had heard that city was putting in live/work units on commercial property close to airport. The City's code allows this. The involved area is near the noise monitor which records the loudest noise of the twelve monitors the airport has. Airport staff attended the City's Planning Commission meeting and pleaded the case against the development, but it was approved regardless; the Centennial City Council then approved it on consent and the project is moving forward.. Bill Skinner asked if a referral wasn't sent out in the early stages. Fronapfel indicated the airport's land use guidelines are well established, but the City of Centennial was not going to budge. Bill Wasmund asked if that was in the runway protection zone for 35 left. Fronapfel said it is just outside that zone for take-offs, but is just inside the approach. The City of Centennial apparently was not concerned about that.

#### 2. PUBLIC COMMENT:

A. VIRTUAL/IN-PERSON MEETING ATTENDEES - Randy Johnson of Louviers thanked airport staff for placing a portable noise monitor at his location last week. It had some issues, which had been fixed. The monitor would be in place for one week.

Kimberly Hellweg of Elizabeth noted frustration that it had been a month and there still had been no meeting with the flight schools. There was continual flight traffic over her Ponderosa Park neighborhood, and she was feeling targeted. It was noted the meeting with the flight schools was scheduled for December 6, 2021, and the training areas would be discussed.

James Slaggert of Orchard Hills #1 in Greenwood Village reported there were still planes flying constantly over his house. He thought residents should have the ability to know the tail numbers of offending aircraft, and should have the ability to specifically complain. Training airplanes are affecting personal property. He thought the flights schools should be sued by city councils, etc. for infringing on residents' peace on their properties.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS:** 5.

#### A. EXECUTIVE /WORK PLAN COMMITTEES -

The meeting with the flight schools was scheduled for December 67 at 2:00 p.m. Others who wished to be a part of 1. that meeting were identified and would be provided with information on how to access it.

Invoices had been generated for each Regular Member, and would be going out in the next few days, to their 2. Representatives and Alternates. Payments were to be sent to the address at the airport, which was on the invoice.

B. COMMUNITY OUTREACH - As Melissa Coudeyras will be leaving CACNR soon, the committee will need a new chair.

C. FLY QUIET - Bill Wasmund had provided a written report for the committee, which was included in the email packet. In relation to an incentive program for pilots to fly guieter, there are many factors to be considered which make it hard to judge a pilot's ability to fly quiet at any given time. More consideration is needed. Flight schools may need to fund mufflers and prop conversions etc. to make planes quieter. The Airport is looking into developing a proposal for rewarding pilots who comply with Fly Quiet procedures that will be presented to CACNR. Another approach might be based on reinforcement.

Work is still being done to find a second location for a noise abatement sign, possibly between taxiways Charlie 6 and 8 which are centrally located and provide a larger area for the sign. A runup area is slated for 2022 if grant money and approval are given.

The committee is still looking at other airports and their noise abatement programs and how they compare to ours.

Question was asked who the target audience was for the sign, with the response being any aircraft that operates on the Airport. Andy asked about posters being placed in the flight schools, with the response that they are already there; Mike Fronapfel stated that the Airport has provided posters to the FBO's and flight schools and even framed them to make them nice to hang. Fly Quiet brochures have also been distributed. They are also mailed to all gate card holders. Question was asked if we can follow up on a regular basis. Fronapfel stated that new gate cards are mailed out every October.

Question was asked about the budget for the sign. Rachel Keller stated that will be part of the FAA grant.

D. NOISE MONITORS – The committee would like to provide CACNR with another in-depth look at the capabilities of the Noise Monitoring software. Question was asked about the portable noise monitor placed at the agreed upon location in Highlands Ranch. Rachel Keller indicated it can be left there as long as good weather holds and it is not needed elsewhere.

October had 90 noise complaint responses requested, 59 by email (66%) and 31 by telephone (34%). Year to date at the end of October 2021, there had been **1,189 responses requested**, with 647 requests made by email (54%) and 542 by telephone (46%).

1,048 of the 1,174 complaints in October were about flights during day hours (89%); 126 were about night flights (11%)

Year to date at the end of October, the top five complaining households were in:

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2,494	Unincorporated Douglas County (21%)	1,235	Unincorporated Arapahoe County (10%)
1,362	Greenwood Village (11%)	1,167	Unincorporated Arapahoe County (9.6%)
		882	Castle Rock (7%)

**Props accounted for 70% of the complaints by aircraft type** in October, while **jets accounted for 29% of the complaints**, and **1% were about helicopters.** These figures do not include complaints made by the top complaining household.

**Departures** were responsible for **45**% of the complaints in October. **Arrivals** were responsible for **36%** of the complaints, and **Training** was responsible for **18%** of the complaints in October. Again, these figures do not include complaints made by the top complaining household.

The graph showing the 13-month relationships between airport operations and the numbers of complaints with and without the top complaining household removed was again provided.

The October and Year to Date complaint maps continued to show the **largest cluster of complaints** located north and slightly west of the airport's north-south runway. In October, there had been 3 complaining households from outside the map boundaries. Year to date by the end of October, there had been 27 households located outside the map area.

Four October 2021 Radar Track Density Maps were included, which demonstrated that Metroplex has changed the flight tracks for Centennial Airport. The relationship between DIA traffic and that of Centennial Airport was demonstrated, with Centennial traffic being routed around DIA traffic, causing a huge impact for residents on the ground in this area. Question was asked if it would be worth comparing year to year or 5 years? Airport staff can and has generated a 35-year comparison as well.

Question was asked if Metroplex changed the altitudes of Centennial flights. Response was that no change was made to altitudes, only flight tracks. Question was asked about Elbert County on the noise complaints, as we had a public comment from an Elizabeth resident. It falls under "other". Request was made for that to be separated out. Mike Fronapfel and Rachel Keller stated that could be considered now that there are more complaints from that area.

Question was sked about any recourse CACNR has with the flight schools? Rachel Keller stated that outreach with the flight schools and collaborating with them is what we can do. The goal is to develop a good relationship and gain their cooperation. We can't make them do anything. The Airport meets with the flight school multiple times a year. It's in the flight schools' best interest to fly quiet and be good neighbors. Mike Fronapfel said that majority of flights are operating legally. It is rare that someone is operating outside of legal parameters. Rachel Keller noted when the flight training "boxes" were created 30 years ago, there weren't homes in those areas and they were created for safety. This will be part of the discussion with the flight schools. Question was asked about quiet hours. Rachel Keller said that voluntary quiet hours are between 10 pm and 7 am. It was noted pilots have to do some night operations for their ratings.

B. <u>AIRPORT DIRECTOR'S REPORT</u> – Mike Fronapfel reported strong activity at the airport, with October showing large jet fuel sales. Five new hangars will be under development in the next year, with ten more to come.

The airport has received 3 small grants received so far, with a possibility of some additional grants in the next year.

The Colorado Aircraft Business Association Is looking into laser pointers aimed at aircraft, which can blind pilots. It may consider legislation to prohibit this. Question was asked if they have a lobbyist to take it forward? Fronapfel indicated CABA does have a lobbyist and they are working to get someone to sponsor such legislation.

Fronapfel indicated he and Rachel Keller would be attending a Planning and Zoning meeting at the City of Centennial, regarding a residential development proposed that is too close to the Airport. It was considered the worst location ever seen by them, and the airport strongly opposes the development. Noise monitors at that location regularly exceed 90 decibels.

Brad Pierce said it didn't have to be decided tonight, but following further discussion, it was agreed to meet in January, particularly to consider follow-up to the December meeting with the flight schools.

Candace Moon noted the need to have a combined January/February CACNR report to the February ACPAA meeting. She will be able to represent CACNR in March 2022.

## Symposium Topics

After almost 2 years of virtual programming, our Technical Program Committee is excited to greet you in-person once again at the 2022 ANE Symposium. After great consideration and input from you, our planning is underway with sessions being developed and speakers being contacted. The Symposium will be hosted in it's original format with trainings on Sunday afternoon and general sessions on Monday and Tuesday.

## How Airports Can Work with Their Communities on Noise Abatement Procedures

This session will provide a discussion on how San Diego International Airport helped facilitate a dialogue with local communities and industry stakeholders (notably the FAA and airlines) to evaluate the feasibility flight procedure modifications to reduce noise impacts outside the CNEL 65 contour.

## Climate Change and Aviation – Pathways to NetZero

Climate Change is an existential threat to the aviation industry and, in response, the sector is aggressively pursuing pathways to decarbonize. The industry recognizes that urgent action is required to reduce its contribution to climate change as rapidly as possible while maintaining the vital societal and economic benefits of air transportation. This session will explore what the aviation industry's impact on climate change is, share how the sector is striving to achieve "net zero", and update on the regulatory process and developments that are needed to help the industry achieve these goals.

## What is "Meaningful" Community Engagement?

The aviation sector includes a wide variety of key stakeholder groups. What does "meaningful" community engagement mean to these different groups, and how do they define "community?" Our panelists will discuss their answers to these questions and share thoughts on where community engagement has worked well.

## <u>Health Effects of Noise – From Local to National; Three</u> <u>Perspectives on Research, Legislation, and Implementation</u>

Human health factors related to aircraft noise have been well documented as a complex subject that involves stakeholders at many levels, from local land use planners to global health organizations. How do we go from research to implementation? This session will focus on hearing from three perspectives that include research, land use implementation and legislative efforts.

## Noise Metrics and Impacts: Thinking Beyond DNL

The FAA uses the DNL metric and related thresholds for all noise-based decision making purposes which is informed by the Schultz curve published in 1978. The DNL metric was adopted by the FAA in 1981 to meet the requirements established by the Aviation Safety and Noise Abatement Act of 1979.

Over the past 40 years, aircraft noise has changed such as:

- Performance-Based Navigation procedures enable precise flight tracks which result in increased concentrations of flights and noise over some areas
- Steadily increasing volumes of aircraft traffic
- New, and quieter, airframes and engines

Although the effects of these changes have been pointed out in subsequent research and reports, the DNL metric remains as the single metric the FAA uses for assessing "significance in the context of impact analysis". Speakers from a variety of perspectives will share their thoughts on noise impacts and metrics beyond DNL, for the changing aviation environment, including for communities outside of the DNL-65 contour.

## **New Entrants and Technology**

This session will discuss how eVTOL (electric Vertical Takeoff and Landing) manufacturers and operators are developing these aircraft with noise reduction in mind and planning their route structure to serve the community's transportation needs while also minimizing noise impacts

### Aviation Emissions: Reduction Efforts and Current Research

This session will exhibit the current efforts and research toward understanding and reducing aviation-related emissions. There are various sources of air pollutant and greenhouse gas emissions at airports including, but not limited to, aircraft, ground support equipment (GSE), aircraft auxiliary power units (APUs), passenger and employee motor vehicles, construction activities, and building energy use. Airports are actively working toward understanding and reducing emissions from these sources, however doing so is often complicated by the varying levels of ownership and control of the sources, as well as the involvement of multiple stakeholders. Additionally, there is ongoing research into the efficacy of various emission reduction efforts and their best means of implementation. This session will include presentations from airport representatives on their efforts, successes, and lessons learned. Additionally, research and results pertaining to aviation-related emissions and reduction methods will be presented.

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# **Centennial Airport**

**Monthly Noise Report** 



## January 2022

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**A-weighted Sound Level** – A measure of sound level with weighted frequency characteristics that correspond to human subjective response to noise.

**Arrival** – The act of an aircraft approaching and landing at an airport.

**Ambient Noise Level** – The level of noise that is all-encompassing within a given environment for which a single source cannot be determined. It is usually a composite of sounds from many and varied sources near to and far from the noise monitor.

**Community Noise Event Level (CNEL)** – The average sound level over a 24-hour period, with a penalty of 10dB for nighttime hours between 10:00 PM and 7:00 AM.

**Day Night Average Sound Level (DNL)** – A measure of the average noise level over a 24-hour day. It is the 24-hour, logarithmic (or energy) average, A-weighted sound pressure level with a 10-decibel penalty applied to the nighttime event levels that occur between 10:00 PM and 7:00 AM.

**Decibel (dB)** – A logarithmic quantity reflecting the ratio of the sound pressure of the source to a reference pressure. This results in a sound pressure level of about 0 dB for the quietest sounds that we can detect and sound pressure levels of about 120 dB for the loudest sounds that can be heard without pain.

Departure – The act of an aircraft taking flight and leaving the airport.

**Energy-Averaged Sound Pressure Level (Leq)** – The value or level of a steady, non-fluctuating sound that represents the same sound energy as the actual time-varying sound evaluated over the same time period.

**Flight Track** – The path along the ground followed by an aircraft in flight.

**Instrument Flight Rules (IFR)** Rules and regulations established by the FAA to govern flight under conditions in which flight by outside visual reference is not safe. IFR flight depends upon flying by reference to instruments, and navigation is accomplished by reference to electronic signals. It is also a term used by pilots and controllers to indicate the type of flight plan an aircraft is flying, such as an IFR or VFR flight plan.

**Local Operations** – Operations in the local traffic pattern or within sight of the airport; flight in local practice areas within a 20 mile radius; execute simulated instrument approaches or low airport passes.

Maximum Noise Level (L<sub>max</sub>) – The peak noise level for a single noise event.

**Noise Exposure** – The cumulative sound energy affecting a person over a specified period of time.

**Overflight** – Aircraft flight originating and terminating outside the area that transits the airspace without landing.


**Visual Flight Rules (VFR)** – A set of regulations under which a pilot operates an aircraft in weather conditions generally clear enough to allow the pilot to see where the aircraft is going. A flight plan is not required when the pilot is operating under Visual Flight Rules.

**Sound Exposure Level (SEL)** – The total energy in the A-weighted sound level measured during a transient noise event. SEL accounts for both the duration and the loudness of a noise event.


## **3** ABOUT APA'S NOISE MONITORING PROGRAM

Centennial Airport's (KAPA) Noise and Operations Monitoring System (ANOMS) is a new state of the art system that enables the Arapahoe County Public Airport Authority to monitor and better understand aircraft noise in the vicinity of Centennial Airport. This system is comprised of 12 fixed noise monitoring terminals in the community, as well as 2 portable monitors that are available for short term monitoring anywhere in the community.



## 4 ABOUT WEBTRAK<sup>™</sup>

As part of an ongoing program, Centennial Airport now offers an online tracking system for the movement of flights and air traffic patterns within the Denver Metro area. **WebTrak** Flight Tracking and Noise Information System allows concerned individuals to research data about flights to and from Centennial Airport, Denver International Airport, Rocky Mountain Metropolitan Airport, Front Range Airport and Buckley Air Force Base, as well as any transitional air traffic through the region.



## How to participate

The general public may use **WebTrak** to investigate a noise or flight that occurred near their location. The system also simplifies the process of filing a noise complaint, offering an easy, online option for residents to register concerns regarding noise levels at the following web addresses:

## Definitions

**Air Taxi** – A company that operates aircraft that carry cargo or mail, or passengers on an on demand or charter basis.

**General Aviation (G.A.)** – All civil aviation operations other than scheduled air services and non-scheduled air transport operations for remuneration or hire.

**Local** – Operations are performed by aircraft which operate in the local traffic pattern or within sight of the airport; flight in local practice areas located within a 20-mile radius of the airport; execute simulated instrument approaches or low passes at the airport.

IFR Itinerant – Operations other than local operations conducted under Instrument Flight Rules.

VFR Itinerant – Operations other than local operations conducted under Visual Flight Rules.

**Overflight** – Operation performed by aircraft that transit the area and did not originate or did not terminate within the airspace.

## **6** NOISE MONITOR REPORTS


The following data displays the amount and associated decibel level of aircraft noise events at a given monitor. An aircraft noise event must contain the following characteristics:

First, the noise event must exceed the ambient noise level. This number varies at every monitor but is generally greater than 50-55db. Secondly, the noise event must last longer than 5 seconds. Lastly, using radar data, the system must correlate an aircraft with the noise event. This ensures that the sound is not associated with a 'community noise event' such as a lawn mowers or emergency sirens.





## **Current 12 Month Trend**




