



Alpha Phi Sigma Chapter Advocacy Grants \$250

There are many organizations that work within or with the Criminal Justice System to help individuals.

When a Chapter engages with an organization in their community that provides a service or services within the Criminal Justice System helping adults or juveniles, Alpha Phi Sigma will donate \$250 to the organization.

GUIDELINES

- 1. Locate an agency in your area that provides a service within the Criminal Justice System: Adult or Juvenile.
- 2. The Chapter must engage in an activity with the agency.
- 3. Visit our website and click on the link for the advocacy grant, located under the scholarships tab. You will be directed to the online application where you will submit a brief write-up about the organization, full name and address of the organization, name of a contact person, and a photograph of Chapter members engaging in an activity with the organization.
- 4. Once the information is approved, the Chapter Advisor will receive from Headquarters an Alpha Phi Sigma check for \$250 payable to the Advocacy Organization.
- 5. Alpha Phi Sigma members must return to the organization and present the check on behalf of Alpha Phi Sigma through their Chapter.
- 6. The original story and photographs of the activity along with the photograph of the funds presentation submitted to Headquarters will be featured in the Docket.
- 7. Only one check per Chapter will be issued per calendar year. Chapters petitioning for a second advocacy grant the following year must choose a different advocacy group from the previous year.

- The Advocacy Grant <u>cannot</u> be used as the Theme of the Year or a Chapter Goal.

University of Tennessee Southern Pi Eta Gamma Chapter

Alpha Phi Sigma Faculty Member, Sergeant Anthony Mottola, Shares his Experience of 9-11 with Tennessee School Kids

Former NYPD detective sergeant Anthony 'Tony' Mottola makes presentations on the terrorism attacks every year as his way to honor the victims and to process his own grief

Fear crept in as soon as they walked into the kitchen and saw the sliding glass window was open. Walking into the living room, they discovered the family stereo, a clock radio and other electronics items missing.

It was Easter Day 1976 in Staten Island, the smallest of New York City's five boroughs. The thief had stolen what had had been Christmas presents months before and eaten the decorated Easter eggs. Cracked, painted shells littered the kitchen table. The worst part for 10-year-old Anthony "Tony" Mottola was seeing his mom cry. "It was heartwrenching," Mottola said. "It fired up something inside me. I knew I wanted to make a change. I wanted to make a difference in that community."

Turns out, he added, "There was a lot going on in that neighborhood." Motorcycle gangs. Shootings. Drug deals. Spouses beating each other. As a boy, Mottola once had a serrated kitchen knife held to his neck as an older neighborhood kid demanded cash. A shop owner was shot to death on the family's front porch.

In his neighborhood, many kids grew up to be either criminals or cops. Mottola became the latter. After four years in the Air Force, Mottola joined the New York City Police Department in 1993. Saw deadly traffic accidents. Responded to homicides. But nothing like 9/11. Mottola and his squad spent several days digging through rubble at Ground Zero in lower Manhattan to look for human remains. They found hundreds.

Mottola, though, had seen those before. What proved to be most disturbing was seeing families holding up pictures of missing loves ones, staring at walls of pictures of missing people at the nearby church where first responders took breaks. "That's when you start realizing, at your core, each body part is a person.'



Mottola, now a college professor teaching criminal justice in Middle Tennessee, honors those victims each year by making presentations to school kids about the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11,

Mottola has found, though, that the presentations also have helped him process his own grief. "It's my opportunity to let it out," he said. "It doesn't build up anymore; I let it out every year."

'We're under attack!'

That morning, Mottola, a sergeant in Staten Island, near lower Manhattan, heard a civilian employee in the police annex say, "Hey, a plane just hit the World Trade Center." About 17 minutes later, the same employee screamed as the second plane started heading toward the second tower. Everyone in the room looked out the window and saw the crash.

"It was a puff of smoke," Mottola said. "And everybody started saying, 'We're under attack!" About 15 minutes later, Mottola was on a bus with 20 or so other officers, trying to wind through congested traffic to get to lower Manhattan.

They heard snatches of transmissions on the radio, about injuries, evacuations, estimates of how many were dead and injured, what police commanders were missing. tween transmissions. Mottola said, there was an "eerie quiet" on the bus. That's when they first heard about the jumpers.

"People are jumping out the windows? How bad is it that people

are jumping?" he said. "Everybody's screaming, 'Go! We gotta get there!' at the bus driver." The bus arrived near the scene around the time the second tower came down. All they saw were billows of smoke and ash — and some papers floating through the air. "I saw this check floating, on fire, half burned, that said 'One World Trade Center' on it.

I folded it and put it in my pocket," he said. "I said, there'll never been another World Trade Center."

Mottola and his squad started evacuating people from nearby buildings, telling them transit was down, encouraging them to get away from Ground Zero.

When it started getting dark, he and his colleagues got redeployed to the World

Trade Center, starting a three-day stint of digging through rubble, looking at first for anyone alive and trapped, then looking for bodies, then looking for any remains or personal items — jewelry, wallets, IDs — that would help identify victims. Human remains were put in buckets and carried to refrigerated trucks serving as morgues.

The two things Mottola found most troubling: a women's torso — and a woman's driver's license. "That ID, it was full of dust, and I couldn't see the woman's name because it was so badly damaged," he said. "I think it bothered me because I could see her picture. And if this is here, well, most women would grab their purse before they run out of a building. So this woman probably didn't make it."

After a few days, Mottola got assigned to providing security at the site and coordinating arriving fire and rescue squads.

'Are they gonna take my gun away?'

The most disturbing part of the weeks after the 9-11 attacks for Mottola: driving over the Verrazzano-Narrows Bridge from Staten Island to Brooklyn, looking toward lower Manhattan and not seeing the twin towers he'd grown up with. "You're going to work on a van, and we all looked to the left, and we'd all say it: 'I can't believe they're not there.'" City leaders offered mental health services for all first responders, but Mottola declined. First, there was a stigma that therapy means weakness. Second, some officers were afraid if they got counseling, it might label them as unable to perform police duties safely.

After a few days, Mottola got assigned to providing security at the site and coordinating arriving fire and rescue squads.

'Are they gonna take my gun away?'

The most disturbing part of the weeks after the 9-11 attacks for Mottola: driving over the Verrazzano-Narrows Bridge from Staten Island to Brooklyn, looking toward lower Manhattan and not seeing the twin towers he'd grown up with. "You're going to work on a van, and we all looked to the left, and we'd all say it: 'I can't believe they're not there.'" City leaders offered mental health services for all first responders, but Mottola declined. First, there was a stigma that therapy means weakness. Second, some officers were afraid if they got counseling, it might label them as unable to perform police duties safely.

"A lot of officers wonder, will it be held against me? Are they going to take my gun away? Will it show up in a future court case, like is this guy stable?" he said. "Because police officers love serving."



About two years later, Mottola said he remembers watching a documentary about 9/11 on his sofa in his Staten Island apartment. He started crying. Crying for the girl he went to high school with who died in the towers. Crying for the people whose remains he found. Crying for all the families holding pictures of loved ones at Ground Zero. Crying for the first responders who died that day and died from complications of injuries or lung infections afterward. Crying for the loss of the towers he visited since he was a boy. "I thought I had it under control until that day," he said. "I just broke down and let it all out."

Mottola worked for NYPD for 15 more years. That included stints as dignity protection for VIPs — including Presidents George W. Bush and Barack Obama and Pope Francis, a meaningful moment for a lifelong Catholic — who visited Ground Zero and the 9/11 memorial that opened in 2011.

He decided to become a college professor to teach criminal justice and moved to Tennessee after he and his wife, Rosemary, fell in love with the Smoky Mountains. Mottola got a master's degree and a doctorate and moved to the Franklin area after he accepted a job with University of Tennessee Southern. The couple now has two children, Angelina, 4, and Santino, 2.

The annual 9/11 visits to school students started in 2019. "I want people to appreciate the historical side of it, to never forget," he said. Those presentations also help him deliver a message to himself.

"I'm alive, I'm blessed to tell the story, and I'm blessed to tell their story."


APS Alumnus and Professor at Loras College Honored for Voiceover Acting




Dr. Kenny Loui was honored for his voiceover acting work in this year's One Voice Awards and Telly Awards.


