

Ideas for Theme of the Year Chapter Activities

- Guest speaker
 - Invite survivors of trafficking, local politicians, or law enforcement officers who have worked on a trafficking case share about what they experienced and their insights
- Documentary screening with a Q&A
 - Show a documentary about trafficking followed by a Q&A with a professor that teaches trafficking or an expert in trafficking
 - If you do not wish to do a Q&A, you can discuss all aspects of trafficking with your chapter
- Fundraising for anti-trafficking organizations
 - This could be a bake sale, a talent show, or an auction where the funds are donated to a reputable organization(s) that bring awareness to trafficking and are actively trying to stop it
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- Awareness walk or vigil
 - Have your chapter go on a walk or have a candlelight vigil to honor trafficking victims who have passed or survived
- Art project
 - Come together as a chapter and create a painting that symbolizes resistance to all trafficking. This painting can be posted on social media and/or posted around the university/college or donated to a local anti-trafficking organization
- Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women Campaign
 - Educate your members by working with or hosting a talk by an organization that calls attention to the high rate of human trafficking of indigenous women
- Drug and Alcohol IQ Kahoot
 - <https://create.kahoot.it/details/0c339ba3-618a-4fae-a89d-c02a917e33d2> This is a kahoot from the Nation institute on Drug Abuse. It can get the conversation started before talking about drug trafficking awareness from a guest speaker of some kind.
- Host a mini job fair night
 - Have the student officers reach out to professionals in the field of trafficking and bring them in for a job fair or panel. You could work to get professionals from the various types of trafficking (human trafficking, drug trafficking, firearms trafficking) or you could limit it to one area.
- Become experts on the United Nations Aircop project
 - Have your members interested in the field of trafficking become experts on an anti-trafficking program and present it for the other members. Details for the

- Create a human trafficking presentation to raise awareness in high schools
 - Create a presentation to give to local high school students on online safety and ways they may be targeted for human trafficking or drug trafficking
- Poster campaigns
 - Make posters that inform the average student about trafficking awareness to put up around campus
 - Alternatively, use the following resource to identify what brands uses child labor or forced labor: <https://www.dol.gov/agencies/ilab/reports/child-labor/list-of-goods> (**Advisors:** Please note that this is done at the risk of the chapter and be mindful of the potential for legal action taken by these companies.)
- Volunteer with a gang resistance program
 - Often, gangs are the intersection between trafficking of people, drugs, and firearms. By your chapter volunteering with one of these organizations, you are helping prevent adolescents continued involvement in these organized crimes
- Have a workshop with your local Juvenile Justice Center
 - Workshop ways to prevent trafficking in the local schools with the Juvenile Justice Center or learn more about current techniques being implemented
- Host a firearms safety training
 - Host a firearms safety training session with a firearms specialist of some kind and have them discuss the legal restrictions in your state/territory that prevent the trafficking of weapons
- Visit a trafficking museum
 - Visit a museum that brings attention to issues on trafficking. This one is really unique in that students could also look at it from a cultural property trafficking perspective
- Write a letter to a victim
 - The chapter can come together and write heartfelt letters to organizations within the community that work closely with trafficking victims. The letters can share words of encouragement and admiration
- Defense and situational awareness workshops
 - The chapter can collaborate with law enforcement to teach self-defense techniques and provide skillful tips on avoiding becoming a victim of sex trafficking.

- Social media campaign
 - The chapter can come together on human trafficking awareness day which is Jan. 11th, have students make Instagram posts on the Alpha Phi Sigma Instagram, wear blue, and participate in awareness activities.
- What's the stats project ?
 - The chapter can come together and hold an information session showing the statistics of different trafficking in the community such as drug, child, and sex. This will allow students to showcase their research skills and showcase that it's not just a global issue but in our local community as well. Students with the best finding shows are awarded.
- Is trafficking normalized?
 - The chapter will come together to review various portrayals of normalized drug and criminal trafficking in music videos, movies, and TV shows. Students will have the opportunity to analyze the real-life implications of trafficking as presented in mass media.
- Charity drives
 - The chapter can work together to collect items from food to clothing to books, and as a whole they can donate to organizations that donate goods to victims of trafficking.
- Raise awareness during human trafficking prevention month
 - The chapter can raise campus awareness during the month of January by sharing resources to the school about how to prevent human trafficking. Ways to do this include raising awareness via social media, handing out/selling blue ribbons (the color for human trafficking), handing out brochures/pamphlets with protection tips and resources, etc. January 11th is also wear blue day for human trafficking awareness.
- Volunteer at the local anti-trafficking organization
 - Get in contact with your local anti-trafficking organization and encourage chapter members to support victims of trafficking through volunteering
- Drug trafficking game/simulation
 - Have groups in your chapter create a scenario where every group gets a set of tasks to complete, but one group also needs to "traffick" items without getting caught. This can include stealing a certain type of item, getting items from one location to another, etc. The objective of this is to display how easy it could be for trafficking to go unnoticed and how fast it can happen.
- Book club

- Invite all members who love reading to each pick a different memoir/nonfiction book to share with their chapter. This gets the conversation started about the various types of trafficking and dangers.
