

Introducing Rally!

Know the Basics

AKC Rally® is all about teamwork. You and your dog navigate a course together, side-by-side, at your own brisk pace. You move him through a course with signs where he performs different exercises. The courses are designed by the Rally judge (10-20 signs per course, depending on the class level) and include various turns and commands such as sit, down, stay, etc.

Unlimited communication from the handler to the dog is to be encouraged and not penalized. While touching isn't allowed, you can use verbal commands, clap your hands, pat your legs and use hand signals to praise and encourage your dog.

Scoring in Rally is less rigorous than in other competitions like traditional obedience. You begin with a perfect score of 100, with points deducted along with way. If you retain a score of at least 70 points, you will qualify toward earning a title. As you qualify the required number of times, you will move onto the next level.

There are six levels of Classes in AKC Rally:

Novice is for those just getting started:

- All exercises are performed with your dog on leash.
- There are 10-15 signs.
- Exercises vary from turning 360 degrees to changing paces during the course.
- You may talk, clap your hands and/or pat your legs to encourage your dog.
- To earn a title, it takes three qualifying scores.

Intermediate/Advanced Classes:

- After Novice, handlers may choose which class they are ready to participate in, either the Intermediate or Advanced level.
- All exercises are performed on-leash in the Intermediate level and there is no jump required.
- All exercises are performed off-leash in the Advanced level and there is one jump required.
- There are 12-17 signs.
- To earn a title, it takes three qualifying scores.

Excellent is the next level of competition. The course is like the Advanced level (above), but with some more challenging exercises.

- All exercises are performed off-leash.
- Handlers are not allowed to pat their legs or clap their hands to encourage the dog.
- Dogs must jump twice.
- There are 15-20 signs.
- To earn a title, it takes three qualifying scores.

Master/Choice: These classes are the highest level of competition.

- All exercises are performed off-leash.
- Handlers are not allowed to pat their legs or clap their hands to encourage the dog.
- Dogs must jump once in Master, no jumps in Choice
- There are 15-20 signs
- To earn a title, it takes ten qualifying scores.

Enter a Rally trial

You've both worked so hard and it's time for your first trial ("competition"). The official announcement of a club's event is called a "premium list." It contains all relevant information regarding the trial, including date, location, classes offered, and judges — as well as an entry form.

To enter a rally trial, the owner of the dog must submit an official AKC entry form, which can be found in the premium list or on the AKC website. The entry form should be sent to the trial secretary or superintendent of the trial listed in the premium list. You may find rally trials using the AKC Event Search on the website. After the entries have closed, a program showing the schedule for the judging of each class will be mailed to you along with all relevant information about the trial



Nutrition

4 Items you can add to your dog's food to hugely boost the nutrition and quality of nutrition they receive

We know the world is imperfect today, and we know the kibble we so conveniently scoop into our dog's food bowl every day or the canned food we open and serve is likely an imperfect food for our dog, but the convenience is hard to beat. And they seem to enjoy it. Here is a quick very basic background of a dog's nutritional needs. There are 3 macronutrients in a dog's diet: Protein, fat, and carbs. Everything else a dog requires in their diet is considered to be a micronutrient because even though they do require many vitamins, minerals and other micronutrients, they require small amounts compared to the macronutrients. Of the macronutrients, dogs require protein and the right balance of the right kinds of fat, but they have almost NO nutritional requirement for carbs. Most kibble on the market today is 1/2 or more carbs! It has so much carb filler in it because that makes it more shelf stable at room temperatures and it also makes it much cheaper to manufacture, but it does these things at the cost of our dog's nutrition.

Any dog food that is labeled "for adult maintenance" or "for all life stages" meets the AAFCO nutritional requirements for dogs. But the AAFCO nutritional requirements are far from perfect for our dogs and may set min or max values for some of the required nutrients for our dogs. AAFCO also does not have any quality standards as to where these nutrients come from. The most nutritional way for our pets to get their nutrition is directly from a high quality food source. Not from the synthetic, cheap, manufactured and franken nutrients added to most dog food these days, again done to keep the price of manufacture down.

OK, enough background, let's get to the meat of the article!

Eggs

Eggs are a superfood! Eggs are a wonderful source of omega 3 fats and protein! They also contain vitamin A, folate, vitamin B5, B12, B2, phosphorus and selenium! Crack an egg into your dog's food dish every other day. Raw eggs will benefit your dog the most nutritionally. However if you are not comfortable feeding raw egg to your dog, you can scramble it and they can still benefit from many of the nutrients.

Wild Caught whole sardines

Sardines are a fabulous source of omega 3 fats and protein! They also contain vitamin D, calcium, iron, potassium, antioxidants, zinc, vitamin D, B12, Vitamin E and Vitamin K. Put a sardine or 2 in your dog's bowl every other day. Canned sardines are the next best thing if your dog does not care for raw sardines.

Whole oats

Fiber is beneficial for dogs, it provides all of the same benefits for their intestines as it does for ours! That means it is a pre and probiotic which helps support the healthy bacteria and discourages the bad bacteria in the gut. Whole oats has lots of fiber and it also is a source of iron, potassium, thiamin, phosphorus, magnesium and zinc! You may recall that whole grains in dog food was blamed for the cardiomyopathy heart condition, but that was never true. The right amounts of the right kinds of whole grains in your dog's diet are super beneficial for your dog, their gut, and their immune system! 1 tablespoon per day is all it takes. Remember to get whole oats and not steel cut or quick oats.

Hemp seed hearts

Hemp Hearts are one of mother nature's multivitamins! They are a great source of omega 3 and omega 6 fats and plant protein! They are also a source of iron, potassium, thiamin, riboflavin, niacin, folate, phosphorus, magnesium, and manganese! Add 1 teaspoon to your dog's food every other day.

You can see how adding these 4 items to your dog's food everyday will greatly help boost their nutritional intake! A note about quality of ingredients: try to get organic or non-gmo items in order to reduce the toxins in the foods such as heavy metals, herbicides and pesticides, all of which are unfortunately a part of our food sources given the factory farming that dominates the food sourcing industry in current times.

From the K-9 Kitchen

Attention fur parents! Your pups are going to love these DIY Dog Treats! They are quick and easy to make with nutrient-rich ingredients and a great way to let your pup know how much they're loved.

Prep Time10 minutes

Cook Time 20 minutes

Ingredients

- 1/2 cup all natural peanut butter
- 1/3 cup pumpkin puree
- 1 large egg
- 11/4 cup almond flour I use Bob's Red Mill Super Fine
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon turmeric

Optional Glaze

- 1/3 cup natural peanut butter
- 2 tablespoons melted coconut oil
- 1/2 teaspoon turmeric

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Line a baking sheet with a silicone baking mat or parchment paper and set aside. In a medium-sized bowl combine peanut butter, pumpkin puree, and egg; stir until well combined. You can use a hand-held electric mixer if preferred.
- 2. Add in almond flour, cinnamon, and turmeric and stir again until everything has come together into a dough. NOTE: The dough will be sticky.
- 3. Scoop a heaping teaspoon of dough into your palms and gently roll and shape into a disc-shaped cookie. Place on the baking sheet and continue until you have 20 cookies on the tray. Use a fork to create a crisscross on top of each treat. It helps if the fork is wet so it doesn't stick to the dough.
- 4. Bake for 20 minutes or until the dog treats are set and golden brown around the edges.
- 5. Optional: Combine peanut butter, melted coconut, and turmeric in a small bowl and mix well. Transfer into a small zip-top bag, remove all the air, and seal. Cut a tiny piece off of the corner and drizzle the glaze over each cookie.

Notes

This is a sticky dough, I find shaping the treats with slightly damp hands helps prevent the dough from sticking to my hands.

The glaze is fun (and tasty!) and while it will firm up, it does remain soft, so if you add the glaze, be sure to store the treats in the fridge.

Store the treats in an airtight container for up to three days on the counter, one week in the fridge and three months in the freezer.

Escaping dogs: LED collars and Apple AirTags




Let me introduce you to Grant, or "Goofy Grant". He's getting older, but not wiser, and he takes advantage of any opportunity to take himself for walks. After a January snow storm, a small section of my fence came down, and of course Goofy Grant went visiting. At 10pm. I think he followed a cat's scent. Not to be found. Panic.


Of course preventing a dog's escape is always best, but no system is foolproof. I have several strategies to get them back ASAP. My dogs have little plaques riveted to their flat collars which give two cell phone numbers and my name. Each is also microchipped to prove ownership.

Flashing LED collars give the dogs great visibility not only on walks - bike riders won't entangle themselves in my leash - but help me monitor them in the yard.

Finally, Apple AirTags secured to a small waterproof case riveted on their collars are my secret weapon.


In under 5 minutes, Grant was gone from view. I hopped in the car and circled the immediate area, nothing. Then I remembered Apple's "Find My" app which allows the owner to ping the AirTags. The Find My app puts the Tag's location of the last time an Apple device "saw" them and marks that location on a map. It also allows the owner to sound the Tag's notification, which helps find keys or other valuables to which it is attached. On the app's map, I saw Grant was







Thankfully I didn't have to use the last resort – my neighborhood "Lost Dog" FaceBook page, those folks are vigilant at searching for dogs! So yeah, making sure our dogs are safe and secured in any location is the best, but using tech is good backup.







Head collars may be worn unless they are prohibited by a specific activity for safety reasons (e.g., when a dog is running the agility course, the only collars allowed are flat buckle or rolled leather collars). Leashes should be 4 ft. to 6 ft. long and should be made of fabric or leather. You can still participate with a prong, but it will not count toward a FIT dog title.
