Skye received her NACSW Elite Title! (3rd place overall and 3rd place on vehicles.) Kathy says, love this Girl!



the trial to everyone. The grounds are beautiful, the dogs are crated in a building with a/c. It is very well organized. All the members wore ID




JoAnn Neville


From Sonja Lund
