NMCSD Pulmonary and Critical Care Division Update

We have maintained good staffing levels during the past year. Christopher Stafford (2004 grad) rejoined our faculty after a twelve-year sabbatical in the civilian sector. He is a welcome addition to our training program. Russel Miller (2014 grad), our Interventional Pulmonologist is completing his third year as our fellowship Program Director. He remains an active leader in the Society of Bronchology and Interventional Pulmonary, chairing three committees and co-writing several society guidelines for that organization. At the recent CHEST 2024, he served as the Co-Chair for AABIP sessions. Our fellowship continues to do well under the leadership of Russel Miller. Our program continues to be fully accredited by the ACGME with a hundred percent first Board pass rate for our graduates during the past decade. We currently have six fellows in training. During their three-year fellowship, our fellows thrive during rotations at Balboa, UCSD, Scripps, National Jewish, Arrowhead Regional Medical Center, and Intermountain Health in Salt Lake City. Our academic output remains robust. At CHEST 2024 our faculty and fellows presented several posters as well as several podium presentations. Our fellows are planning to present five posters at the May 2025 ATS Meeting in San Francisco. Current active research protocols at Balboa include Swimming Induced Pulmonary Edema (SIPE), Bronchiectasis, and early Detection of Lung Cancer (DECAMP). Although the deployment tempo has decreased during the past two years, there is still lots of demand for our PCCM graduates. As we have done since 2007, our staff continue to deploy in support of Pacific Partnership missions. Two of our staff are slated to deploy with the Mercy on the Pacific Partnership 2026 Mission. Bobby Trentacosta (2022 grad) will be onboard that mission in the role of Director of Medical Services. CAPT Jonas Carmichael, (2013 grad) will deploy to CENTCOM in 2025 as an OIC.

Our fellowship is not all work! In September we had a program first, when two of our fellows Daniel LaMorte and Kathryn Hughes were united in marriage during a wonderful ceremony in Avalon. Eleven faculty and fellows managed to set aside their clinical tasks long enough to attend the wedding and reception on Catalina Island. It was a wonderful weekend for all who attended.

Balboa Alumni at CHEST 2024 (Boston)

Ryan Maves (2014) receives the Murray Kornfeld Honor Lecture!



I received the Murray Kornfeld Memorial Founder's Award from CHEST, awarded annually for a leader in infection and inflammation in respiratory disease. I am not entirely clear why CHEST decided to give this award to me, but I accepted it with gratitude, and I am very aware that it is

the training, mentorship, and friendship that I received at NMCSD that made this possible. My honor lecture was titled "Vaccines for Respiratory Diseases: Past, Present, and Future." In the lecture, I discussed the current impact of respiratory infections on morbidity and mortality in the US and globally, reviewed the underlying science and emerging technologies of vaccination, and discussed barriers to vaccination and ways forward for our society. I was especially thankful to see so many Navy friends at my honor lecture, and it was the time spent catching up with our Balboa crew that made CHEST 2024 an especially special time for me. I am honored to still be counted among your number.

After CHEST, I had the privilege to travel to Geneva, Switzerland, where I participated in an international panel sponsored by the Society of Critical Care Medicine and the World Health Organization. Our group conducted a Delphi process to

review the available data and develop guidelines for the care of patients with sepsis in low-resource settings.

Although the automatic (and reasonable) assumption about such a process is that it is intended to improve care in developing countries, it is important to recognize that "low-resource" settings occur in rich countries as well, such as the numerous critical access hospitals in the US



where our Navy colleagues deployed during the COVID-19 pandemic, as well as in the operational military environment where CAPT Mike Kavanaugh, CAPT (ret) Mike Tripp, and I have worked to develop guidelines on sepsis care in the shipboard and field combat settings. As an aside, I do think there are lessons for us to learn in the US about sepsis in low-resource settings as well. Many of the interventions we make in the ICU are likely of limited use to our patients, but there is ambiguity about what those low-value interventions are. To paraphrase Dr. Charles

Sidney Burwell, half of what we do is wrong; the problem is that we don't know which half it is. Hopefully, in working to improve sepsis care in low-resource settings, we can also learn to prioritize which parts of our own care are truly critical and which parts are merely theater.

Asha Devereaux (1999)- At CHEST 2024, I shared our experiences from California with medical supply constraints

during disasters, based upon my work with the State of California's medical assistance teams. We provided medical care to fire-fighters, COVID patients, and evacuees from a variety of disaster situations with limitations of supplies-including oxygen! Our work has been published in Disaster Medicine and Pub Health Preparedness. Additionally, Denny Amundson and I have



collaborated on a chapter in an upcoming book by the Am. Pub Hlth. Association regarding the Pandemic response. When not responding to disasters, I work in my private practice located in Coronado, Ca. Didn't stray far from Balboa following my Navyduty. Can't believe it has been 22 years!



Carla Lamb (1999) is the chair of the IP program at Lahey and shared her patient experiences with the audience at CHEST. Two patients were part of the patient centered panel and fielded questions ranging from reducing stigma toward patients with tobacco histories, life-saving benefits of CT Lung Screening, thoughts about bronchoscopy, navigating a

new lung cancer diagnosis, moving forward in life as lung cancer survivors, and the importance of communication along the way in all aspects. Carla has continued her leadership in the field as President of the AABIP.
