Born in **Baghdad**, I left home in 2008 carrying little more than faith in education, medicine, and the written word. What began as **survival** grew into a lifelong pursuit of **purpose** — to transform adversity into belonging.

As a Fulbright Scholar, I came to understand that knowledge alone is never enough.

(Wisdom × Perseverance × Resilience) = A Life of Purpose.

Guided by the Zoroastrian principle — Good Thoughts · Good Words · Good Deeds — this work reflects a belief that **science** must always be balanced by **soul**.

What the book explores

The Physician as Reader invites reflection on how literature deepens the moral and emotional imagination of care — how stories teach physicians to see beyond the clinical and into the deeply human.

Across one hundred literary reflections, it examines **five themes** through which stories shape the ethical imagination of medicine — from **Dostoevsky's** conscience to **Woolf's** empathy, from **Dickens'** compassion to **Hemingway's** mortality, and from **Chekhov's** realism to **Morrison's** vision of healing.

As physicians, we often enter people's stories at their most fragile chapters. Literature reminds us that leadership begins not with authority but with understanding — the capacity to read the human story with imagination, humility, and heart.
