As for the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, do them, and the God of peace will be with you.—

Philippians 4.8-9

These final words from the Apostle Paul to his beloved community in Philippi are words of supportive instruction. Focus on the good. Remember what you have heard and what you have seen that is good. Do the good. Go with God's goodness.

These words are the foundation for our worship series "Heard and Seen" as we remember our calling to hear, see and do the good things modeled by Christ and those early followers of Jesus. This title is also the theme of the special annual offering we'll receive for the "Week of Compassion" our church's global disaster relief and recovery ministry. All month long, we'll be hearing stories and seeing clips from this ministry of how the gospel compels us to respond today. And I hope what you see and hear compels you to support this vital ministry.

Some days it seems that the good things Jesus calls us to do and Paul preached about are pretty mundane—feeding the hungry, visiting the sick, taking our concerns to prayer so they can come back to us with Christ's peace. But as we look closer to home, it seems that maybe these very things can soon be deemed radical or countercultural.

We need not look nor hear any further than the homily given at the worship service at the National Cathedral by Bishop Marriann Budde as a part of the Inaugural ceremonies. This worship service is a tradition meant to both be from a specific faith (as the host church the "National Cathedral" is an Episcopalian congregation) but also to represent the diversity of faiths encompassed in our country. Often, the sermonic moment is delivered both to the whole assembly and specifically to the incoming President.

But when Bishop Budde gave her sermon, her words were received as too political, divisive and unpatriotic. Her words were a cause for national controversy...but what I heard and saw is a gospel call rooted in our shared faith. I'd invite you, if you haven't listened or watched it yet, to do so, and to judge for yourself.

And, church, may we discover personally, and as a community of faith, what it means for us to hear and see the gospel today. And even if it causes us to stand up on our faith and stand out from the crowd, may we think about these things, do these things and trust that the peace of God will go with us.



Literacy Tutors Needed!



Did you know that 1 out of every 5 adult Americans cannot read? They cannot complete a job application, read a bedtime story to their child, or write letters to loved ones.

- 15 million adults holding jobs today are functionally illiterate.
- 1/3 of mothers on AFDC are illiterate.
- 85% of all juvenile offenders have reading problems.
- The U.S. ranks 49th in adult literacy when compared to other nations.
- 75% of the unemployed have inadequate basic skills.

How do you become a Literacy Tutor?

SRC Literacy will hold free training sessions for you and your fellow volunteers either daytime or evenings.

When do you meet the students?

Volunteers usually meet with students once or twice a week for 1-2 hours while an adult education class is in session. Those meeting times may be in the morning, afternoon, or evening.

Where do you meet with students?

Volunteers generally meet with students at a Spoon River College facility. By meeting at an SRC facility, tutors have access to instructional materials, faculty, and professional staff.

Who are the students?

SRC Literacy will match you with an adult student age 16 or older who needs help with basic reading or math skills.



The Lilly Endowment National Clergy Renewal Program seeks to strengthen congregations by providing opportunities for their pastors to step away from the demands of daily parish life and engage in a period of renewal and reflection.


"What will make your heart sing?" is a simple question, but one that pastors and congregations explore together and design programs to help their pastors reconnect with their deep roots and sources of joy in ministry and in life. We believe that when pastors have the opportunity to step away from their congregations and engage in activities that make their hearts sing, the whole church benefits. Sabbath rest includes time for pastors to renew themselves physically, emotionally, relationally, and spiritually. Clergy renewal periods are not vacations; rather, they provide opportunities for discovering what will make the pastor's heart sing through well-planned pur-

new way, finding joy and purpose in a simplified life, traveling to new lands and unfamiliar territories, creating opportunities where members of the congregation can exercise their gifts for ministry— are common themes of these renewal times.

Congregations may request a total maximum award of \$60,000. Of that amount, up to \$20,000 may be allocated to the congregational budget for the sabbatical. Proposals are due March 12. Awards will be announced on August 29, 180 grants are expected to be awarded to congregations who submit the most outstanding proposals. What are the selection criteria?

- Clearly articulated vision for what will make the pastor's heart sing.
- Leave-taking Pastor's program balances time for rest and reflection with travel, activities, and time spent connecting with others.
- Budgets are realistic and well-researched.
- Evidence of broad congregational awareness of and support for submitting the proposal.
- Proposals will be evaluated in terms of the renewal program's feasibility, coherence, creativity, and potential benefits to the congregation and pastor.
