following generations would continue to grow here on the farm.

They say there is one person meant for us to be connected to in life. Someone who will help us succeed and push us to be who we are called to be. Sometimes we find them, and sometimes we don't, but in my grandparents' case they found each other. On July 2nd, it would have been 65 years of



marriage for them, however it has been 5 years since my grandpa passed. Their story did not start out here on the farm. When they got married they lived in a house closer to town. My grandpa would help his dad at his farm on boot jack. It was just something that they did. They didn't really know where it would go but my grandpa grew up on a farm and he knew he would want to farm. My grandma, well she grew up in town, and was only on the farm when visiting family. However, the opportunity to purchase this place from her relatives came up and so they took it.

Grandma tells me their mortgage doubled, bills, etc all were more than they were in the house they used to live in so they had to make this farm work for them in order to keep it going. It was a struggle but the dairy was thriving, till the 80's. Then it became hard but farming is something you just don't quit easily. The farm changed paths and sheep and produce became the things that kept the farm moving forward. I remember years of watching people come from other countries to sheer sheep, the hard times of the produce, the farmers markets, and more. It was just what we always did. Many years were tough and it was a struggle, but the farm was kept together. In 2000, my grandparents worked to pass the farm on to the next generation.

Together, they guided my parents through their years on the farm and my parents made changes and started to change the course of the farm to move away from wool sheep to hair sheep. It was a direction that took the farm to where it is now. The goal was to always sell meat by the cut here on the farm and we have made that happen. We continue to do many of the things that my grandparents, but we have adjusted and moved with the markets and the times. We find other ways to reach our consumers and while we might not always have the right ideas or methods to move about, we still know that it was my grandparents who brought us here to this farm and this location. Without their struggles all those years ago, we would not be here on this farm doing the things that we are doing. Each generation has a story and I hope one day when my grandkids are farming right here on the farm too, they can look back not only to my parents but beyond and see how this place has advanced, changed, and grown with each and everyone of us.

All the fields were cut on specific days so that we finished up today before the forecasted rain tomorrow. We are finding that the yields in which we were worried about are coming out more than we anticipated as this warm weather has helped. So now we are looking to sell some hay or fill the barn with more squares and the man power just is not there to do all that needs to be done some nights.
