

#### **Farm Updates**

Well, well, what do we have here? That's what we all said when we noticed this little girl out in the field. It's only Oct., how in the world would/could we have a lamb this early! In fact we have never had lambs this early. We all started calculating when the rams went in the ewes. Well we put the rams in at the beginning of May, so this was possible from that. However, in the past we have only raised wool sheep and they typically don't go into heat that early. Hair sheep can come into heat and lamb twice in one year as sheep only have a 5 month gestation. So again we knew it was a "possiblity" however in our research the sheep need so much nutrition to help the

reproductive system and the drought was taking away from what they were eating. So this was a true surprise as we thought all things were against us for these ewes to breed for this early. But here we are with one ewe raising our newest baby girl on the farm! Don't worry they are safe in the barn at the moment as lambs make us nervous with predators and the current state of weather. Stay tuned for more updates as it looks like we might have a couple other ewes getting closer to lambing. We can't wait to start showing off baby lambs!

#### Farmer or Teacher, It's All the Same Title

We can't say enough how much we love educating the next generation, so any opportunity to help someone learn, you can bet we will try to be there. Well the FFA students in Animal Science class were learning about poultry and so we were asked to talk about the poultry business. Well there is no better way then to bring the animal to school! So 5 chickens headed off to school one morning and we taught some students all about chickens, their parts, and the poultry business! It was a great morning and we hope that the students told everyone all about it.

#### The Sunrises On A New Project



A farm is always full of "need to do" projects and the ability to keep changing and growing. Well as the sun rose this past week, we finally broke ground on a long awaited project here at the farm, our heavy use area. We talked to the contractors from the field as that sun came up and hoped that this project will make a lasting impact for the future of the farm and the ground.

A heavy use area is to be considered a sacrifice area in which the animals will stay in the winter. Now if you are on a large cattle farm, you might find that this is an all concrete space, however we are talking horses and smaller animal unit numbers, so ours is made from stone. We have fencing to add yet around the pad so that we can control when the animals stand on the pad

and when they can go to other paddocks for grazing. We also will have an added buffer zone in between the pad and water source (our creek). This buffer zone can also be grazed for minimal

amounts but with the fence around it, we have considered bringing bees back and using this area with easier access to raise bees. We will see what the future holds but for now we are excited to see a space that the horses can be on in the winter without destroying ground and we will not be able to move hay in and out easier. Now we realize this does bring more work as we will need to clean horse poop off it and so it will add extra things to caring for the horses, but in the end it will make their foot health better, reduce bacterial skin infections on their legs, and overall help their muscles and joints from not walking in the deep mud. The project looks great and we can't thank the guys at



Rodich Construction for their hard work. The pad looks so pretty and we can't wait for the fence to go up and the finished product!
