
The Royal Manitoba Yacht Club

Our Initial Experience with the Royal Manitoba Yacht Club



The first time I heard anything about the Royal Manitoba Yacht Club was when friends and neighbours were at the riverside by Copa Cabana. We were all watching a RMYC Parade on the water. Out oldest son, Colin was maybe 4 or 5 years old and he saw a big red and white boat and he yells out to everyone "There is my Daddy's boat!" The boat or yacht had to be at least 35 feet long, but it sure was painted the same colour as my 16 ft red and white Poplar Mechanics design with two prominent fins and wide gunnels. That is nearly 50 years ago and a lot of water has gone under the bridge. My son Colin, is now a family man with 2 of his own children, Madison and Michael. Colin and his wife Ingrid have brought them up to be good Manitoba adults. He is now a

Vice-President of a Manitoba Company. He just bought a nice lakeside cottage. He now has his own boat and motor he can parade around with.

Thinking back, my 16 foot runabout has long been sold. We also had another boat that we had fun with an old 18 foot Aeroliner that was previously an RCMP patrol boat.
