

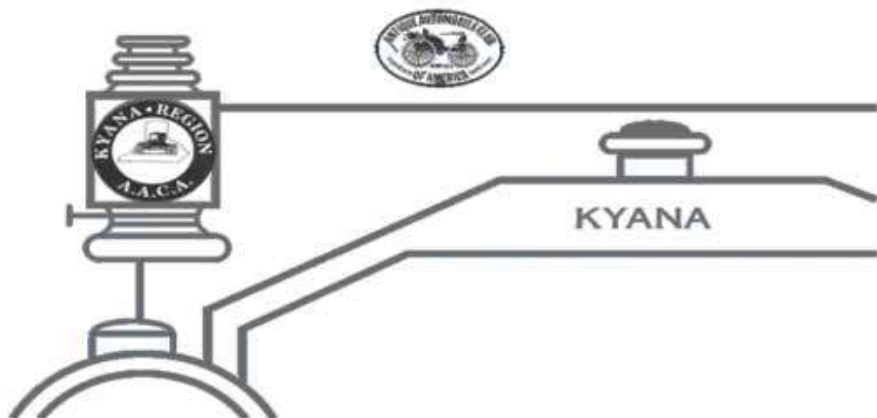

“You cannot go home again” is the title of an autobiographical novel by Thomas Wolfe, published after the author’s death in 1940. Consistent with the theme of the novel, this book title has been repeated many times since, meaning that good times from years gone by cannot be easily recaptured by returning to the old neighborhood or home town.

Pat and I tested that saying while participating in a recent AACA Southeastern Divisional tour based in western North Carolina and upstate South Carolina. Hosted by two local AACA chapters of the North Carolina Region, the three-day tour traveled the hilly and circuitous back roads of this beautiful area in the foothills of the Smokies.

So what was the test, you say? During the recession of the early ‘90’s, my job in the heavy equipment industry relocated us to western North Carolina. With steady employment promised and a young family to support, we made the tough decision to leave extended family and friends behind in northeast Ohio and bought a home in Hendersonville, south of Asheville. Although difficult at

the time, striking out on our own was definitely the right decision. We made new friends, built a career that led us to Louisville, and enjoyed a more relaxing pace of life.

While on tour, we had the opportunity to drive through our old neighborhood. Although now thirty years older, our old home built in the mid-‘70’s still looks good and the neighborhood has held up well.

While many things have changed as the area has nearly doubled in population since we lived there, some things have not. The friendliness of the hosting chapter’s members reminded us of why our memories of the area are still held in high regard. We could easily see ourselves returning to the area one day, so I guess you can go home again!

Speaking of author Thomas Wolfe, there are several memorials and historic markers throughout western North Carolina that carry the author’s name. While researching the book title, I learned that The Thomas Wolfe Memorial is a historic 29-room Victorian boardinghouse in downtown Asheville, North Carolina. Known as the ‘Old Kentucky Home’, it was the author’s childhood home and inspired his 1929 novel, *Look Homeward, Angel*. Considering we moved from the Asheville area to the Louisville area, with both areas claiming a historic home named the ‘Old Kentucky Home’, that’s some irony.

Add to that the novel's title of Look Homeward, Angel; fans of Louisville's Monarchs will certainly recognize that song title. If you ever have the opportunity to participate in an AACA tour, take the chance. Tours offer a very relaxed way to see some local attractions while driving your vintage vehicle along the road less traveled. You also have the opportunity to meet and spend time with the host region or chapter as well as your fellow tour participants. I'll be discussing

the possibility of KYANA hosting a tour, likely in 2028, with both the Region and Charities boards. We can duplicate much of the touring schedule recently conducted by the National DeSoto Club, so a lot of the heavy lifting has already been done. The biggest challenge will be calendar timing and gathering a dedicated core group of volunteers. If you would be interested in planning and supporting a tour of the Bluegrass state, please reach out to me.

STRAIGHT SIX BEATS V8s: ENGINE DOMINANCE BY THE HUDSON HORNET

In the early 1950s, despite that many vehicles still ran on straight-sixes or straight-eights, old car folks know about the huge excitement about the then newly introduced fast V8 automobile engines. There was special fondness for the V8s of Oldsmobile Rockets, Olds 88s, the Chrysler Hemi, Fords, Studebakers, Chevy small blocks, and so many other legendary engines. The industry was switching to overhead valve V8s. New, modern automotive power were important aspirations. Having a speedy image often boosted sales.

However, there also was big enthusiasm about some powerful straight-sixes. Two good examples include the 1953-1954 Corvette Blue Flame - an overhead valve -triple carburetor version and the 1950-1954 Hudson Hornet Big Six - a flathead - dual carburetor engine. Big Six-equipped Hudsons often outran V8 cars, and this L-head engine was a big winner in the early-1950s stock car racing circuit. The Hudson Hornet's 308-cubic-inch (5.0L) inline was the biggest six cylinder automobile engine around. The block was a chromium-iron alloy and their rigid crankshaft had 7-mainbearings. It utilized side-valve placements when companies were transitioning to overhead-

valves. Size and smart engineering also yielded lots of low-end torque, a big advantage off the line at racing.



In 1950, standard Hudson long-stroke, aluminum cylinder head engines came with a 7.2 compression ratio (highest number available with six cylinders). They were equipped with a single 2-barrel carburetor producing 145 horsepower at 4,000 RPM and 257 foot-pounds of torque at 1,600 RPM. It was an upgraded, larger, and higher- compression ratio engine than Hudson's 1948 and 1949 past 262 cubic-inch powerplant. Also offered as an extra was a dealer-installed kit by 1951; it was called the so-called Twin H-Power. This production version used two 1-barrel carburetors on a dual intake manifold system. More advantageous air-fuel distribution, increased power to 160-170 horsepower. This optional offering became a factory installation

election, if requested in 1952.

There also was another special factory-built racing upgrade available that included special cams, bigger valves, and yielded well over 200 horsepower. Good quality design and manufacture provided these Twin H-Power engines with excellent function on the track even over long duration at high-speed stress. By 1955, the so-called "Fabulous Hudson Hornet" dominated racing with 81 NASCAR wins.

Despite exciting racing wins in those early 1950s years and that the Hudson Motor Car Company had productively existed since 1909, sales of Hudson autos

declined, as did manufacturing. Hudsons were then known for good quality at reasonable

prices. They were famous too for the 1948 innovation of "step down" bodies attached within the frame, rather than on top. This design yielded a low, safer, and more stable, comfortable profile. The lower center-of-gravity advantage allowed faster speeds at race-track turns and curves for Hudsons that could more quickly negotiate necessary slow-downs better-and-faster than their competition. Beyond the engines, this was another aspect of the race-winning strategy.

There is amazingly huge variation and very wide discrepancy at reporting, but some statistics suggest that Hudson might have built over 121,000 cars in 1950 and

maybe even over 132,000 (less well documented) the following year. Nevertheless, production dropped further, maybe to only about 50,000 units by 1954 (all these numbers remain unclear?).

Hudson subsequently merged with the Nash-Kelvinator company the following year, then becoming the American Motor Corporation. Thereafter, production numbers continued to fall rather drastically. By 1957, possibly only about 4,000 (or even lots fewer) Hudsons

were made that year, ending Hudson automobile manufacture.
