KYANA REGION BOARD MEETING

January 12, 2021

Location: KYANA Clubhouse

KYANA Region Board members present: Brian Hill, Brian Koressel, Mark Kubancik, Pat Palmer-Ball, Chester Robertson, Roger Stephan, Fred Trusty, and Alex Wilkins.

KYANA members present: Ruth Hill

Meeting called to order @ 6:37 p.m.

Secretary's Report: Alex moved to accept the December report, Pat seconded the motion, and the motion carried with all in favor.

Treasurer's Report: Mark made a motion to accept the December Treasurer's report. Alex seconded the motion and the motion carried with all in favor.

Activities: Most activities still impacted by COVID-19. Mark asked about scheduling the salvage yard tour again in 2021, recalling that last year's tour was the first event to be cancelled after COVID restrictions were imposed. This year's tour will not include a group lunch after the tour, however, most everything else will remain the same. The board agreed that this event can be held safely due to it being an outdoor event. Mark will draft an article for The Sidelight.

Membership: Roger advised the board on another new member, John Duffy, who has filed initial paperwork to join KYANA. Clarence Chesser will sponsor. Mark then updated the board on the membership changes for 2021. The club enters 2021 with 165 member families totaling 279 members, and 29 of those members are pre-members we are hopeful will become active KYANA members.

Clubhouse: No rental activity aside from the Modelers Club on Saturday mornings.

Sidelight: There was much discussion about mailing delays of the paper copy of The Sidelight. The board believes much of the delay is the result of mail processing and delivery issues with USPS. However, Pat will check with the printer to ensure the mailing service did not change their process in late December. Further, Mark will send the most current copy of the roster list to The Sidelight editor to ensure she has the most current physical and email addresses.

Web Page: Fred shared recent experiences with new members searching the web and finding KYANA via the website. Mark still working on "Join Here" new member information to post on the website. Mark agreed to prepare a draft of this information and circulate amongst the board for feedback. Mark will also send a few photos from the Children's Christmas Party to the webmaster for uploading to the site.

Old Business: Alex still working on examples of windshield car show cards that promote KYANA. More to come.

There was discussion about KYANA on Facebook. It was agreed that the Swap Meet Facebook page should be separate from the Region Facebook page. Fred will check with AACA HQ regarding any shared support or hosting for Region Facebook pages.

Mark asked about the Calling Committee effort to contact members in December. Following discussion, the board agreed that we will request the Calling Committee contact each member via phone in January. Fred to make the official request.

New Business: Fred reviewed the Region budget for 2021. Budget still somewhat uncertain for 2021 due to COVID-19 and its impact on scheduled events.

There being no further business to discuss, Mark moved to adjourn. Brian Koressel seconded the motion and the meeting adjourned at 7:37 p.m. with all in favor. The next KYANA Region meeting will take place at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, February 9, 2021, at the KYANA clubhouse depending on pandemic conditions.

GETTING TO KNOW YOUR MEMBERS BY Bennie Coleman

As a young boy I grew up in the eastern part of Kentucky in a town called Fish Trap (Yes, that was the name was given to this little community). A river called *Lavisa Fork* flows through these mountains. When it rains, the river would rise and create a swift pool or vacuum trapping the fish. My mother was a schoolteacher and most of my KYANA friends knew her. Dad was a coal miner and Deputy Sheriff. Now you know why I walk a straight line, have creases in my pants and have never been to jail.

My love for cars came at an early age. The coal miners were paid in cash each Friday and during the summer I would grow muskmelons, a fruit like a cantaloupe, shaped like a football. With the use of a wheel barrel and boards placed on top, I would sell the muskmelons. Each melon was priced with a crayon and I would make between \$200 and \$250 during the summer. I bought my school clothes and a bicycle with the money I earned. I always wanted a black Phantom Schwinn bicycle.

Wait a minute, I got lost in my dreams. One summer, a beautiful 1932 yellow Ford with a V8 engine, the top removed to make it a convertible, stopped and bought some muskmelons. My dreams started on that day. All I could see was girls, girls, girls riding in that modified Coupe on a Saturday night at Pollyanna Drive In Theater. Unfortunately, the purchase of the 1932 Ford never happened. Instead, I had to ride Fred, our horse, everywhere I went.

In 1961, I graduated from Feds Creek High School, yes do not laugh, Feds Creek ...what a name. Ironically, now I live in Fern Creek. During high school, a friend had a 1960 Chevrolet, with a 348, with three deuces, and three-speed on the column. On Saturday nights we would go to a restaurant called Three Way in Marrowbone, Kentucky and drag race. I am sure you know what drag racing is like on a Saturday night. When I went to college I left my friend to carry on the Saturday night fun in Marrowbone.

One day my father approached me about needing a car for college transportation. I told him that a blue 1960 Chevrolet was for sale at the car dealership in Pikeville, Kentucky (as of today, the sign that the 1960 Chevrolet was sitting under is still there and so is the dealership: Bruce Waters Ford). My father looked me in the eyes and said, "Son, I can't afford the 1960 Chevrolet." Instead he bought a '56 Ford for me and off to Eastern Kentucky University I went.

My father lost his life during my second semester at college. I made myself a promise that someday I would purchase the 1960 Chevrolet in memory of my father.

I married my college sweetheart and raised one son. After my son graduated from medical school and left home, at the age of twenty-eight, I started my search for a 1960 Chevrolet. Every time I drove through Lexington I would stop at O.B. Smith,

a classic car dealership, looking for this car. I even traveled to several different states following advertisements in magazines, but the cars for sale just weren't what I was looking for.

One day, in a Hemmings magazine, I spotted a red 1960 Chevrolet convertible listed for sale in Nappanee, Indiana. I called the number listed and a time was arranged to see the car. I was working for Ford at the time and a friend of mine was traveling to Nappanee where Ford chassis were being shipped for bus bodies. I asked him to do a little research on the owner of the Chevrolet. I found out that the owner was a German man who owned several NAPA car part stores. His hobby was raising buffalos and collecting Model T's.

I called a friend in the KYANA Car Club, Keith Hall. Keith agreed to go with me to Nappanee on a Saturday to evaluate the car and try to make the purchase. On Saturday, we left Louisville and headed north. After about six hours of driving, we realized that during our travels we had talked too much and was about one hundred miles too far to the east. This was before GPS was available.

If you don't know much about Nappanee, Indiana it is a community of Amish. When we finally found the owners' home, we had to travel up a long quarter of a mile concrete driveway, I could see the 1960 Chevrolet sitting in the driveway. I told Keith this is it, I want this car. I knew I had the best horse trader with me to make this purchase and take home the car. Keith suggested I not say anything and let him do the talking. After about four hours of visiting and looking at all of his cars and buffalos, Keith looked at the owner and said, "If I make you an offer you wouldn't get mad would you?" He replied "No, let's hear it." Keith made an offer of \$14,000 and I turned blue, choked, and I knew that we would be leaving a lot faster than we arrived.

The owner looked at me and said, "Can you talk?" I said yes, and I explained the purchase was for me and that Keith and I had traveled many miles to see the car. He told me to write a check and I couldn't have written that check fast enough! As we got ready to leave, I thanked him and he said, "By the way, I have several parts you can have if you bring a truck next week." We left and after about six stops to buy fuel filters to keep the car running, we finally made it to Louisville. By the way, I didn't get my parts. When I called to set a time the following week, he was a little upset. The asking price for the car was \$21,500. He said we stole it!

Keith you are the best that I have ever seen when purchasing a car for the right price. I thank you for all you have done for me. Keith and I spent many hours scrapping specific parts to make the car what it is today. I named the 1960 Chevrolet convertible, *Going Home*, in memory of my father.



I almost forgot, I will stop dreaming because I also have in my car collection the 1932 Ford and the Black Phantom bicycle, again thanks to Keith.

My cars along the way as of today include: 1966 Fairlane, 1958 Chevrolet Convertible, two 1960 Chevrolet Convertibles, 1932 Ford Coupe, 1965

Mustang Fastback, 1955 Ford Thunderbird and a 2005 last edition Thunderbird.

Thanks to Patsy and Carl Basham for the 1958 Chevy Convertible, it's a beauty with many hours of their time and labor making this the number one 1958 Chevrolet in the country!

In 1992, I became a member of KYANA. I served one time as secretary and sponsored many events. The Hillbilly Days in Eastern Kentucky is one event that many of our members may remember.

A lot of my friends know me as a mountain boy from the hills of Eastern Kentucky, a hillbilly or Appalachian man.


