
The show will have food, museum tours, door prizes, music, 50/50 raffle and photos available. All show entrants can take a \$10 per person

This will require a majority vote from all of our club members. The biggest change will be our need for sponsors for pre-members. The AACA does not make it mandatory for its members to have a sponsor and neither should we. In past years our by-laws have been bent far past the breaking point to accommodate sponsorship for pre-members. This needs to stop. We need by-laws for the times were are now living in. I still think sponsors play an important role in welcoming pre-members into our club, but very few members want to be sponsors.

Over the winter I have been thinking about how I can help our club grow. I am willing to take over the responsibilities of the sponsor if requested. Please read over the following that I am proposing and give them your serious consideration. I will be asking for a vote on this once we start having meeting in our clubhouse again.

I have another suggestion of something we need to focus on and that members must live within the boundaries of our region. There are currently good folks who don't live within the region. So, what do we do? It is my suggestion that we drop this by-law at the end of this year. But my opinion and the opinion of your Board of Directors and the club officers doesn't mean anything. You are the members and it's up to you with your votes to make any change in by-laws.

This notice of my asking all of you for a vote on these matters will be posted for the next few months in the SIDELIGHT. During our awards and elections meeting in November we will vote on these changes.

Please all of you, give this your attention. If I didn't consider this matter important, I wouldn't waste my time or yours asking for your support.

Please let me know if any of you have suggestions or comments. I welcome all the help I can get.

PROPOSED BY-LAW CHANGE NOTICE

Current KYANA bylaws:

Article I Section 2 – The boundaries of the region shall be Kentucky and Indiana. Article III Section 1c – Live within the boundaries of the region.

The proposed change is to eliminate both of these sections.

Reason for the change request:

AACA has no restrictions on how many regions or chapters that you can belong to. There are many AACA members that belong to several regions, some within a very short distance of each other. KYANA has members that live in the Kentuckiana area part of the year and other parts of the country the rest of the year. One example is members that go to Florida for the winter each year. Neither article has been enforced so why not eliminate them both.

Current KYANA By-law:

Article III Section 3b: Pre-members must be sponsored by a present KYANA member in good standing who has a minimum of two years regular membership. Members may not sponsor in consecutive years or sponsor more than one pre-member in the same year.

The proposed change is: Pre-members must may be sponsored by a present KYANA member and/or the KYANA membership chairman. The sponsor must be a member in good standing who has a minimum of two years regular membership. Members may not sponsor in consecutive years or sponsor more than one pre-member in the same year.

Reason for the change request:

The new by-law will hopefully help the club grow especially when there may be some candidates out there that don't have a sponsor available.

My First Car By Neil White



I was born in a time where every boy (and many girls) dreamed about the day they could get their driver's license. Do you remember when you knew every car and most models, colors and their engines? I rode the wheels off my bicycle waiting to get a car under me.

One day Dad finally said, "Well, I guess you should get the book and study the laws, signs and all." I still don't remember how I got that book but I think it had to do with magic. I read every word over and over. Then, somehow, there I was in front of the big brick building where the test was given. The state police officer never smiled, he just gave me the test paper and a pencil, pointed to a table and said, "There". A little while later I found myself outside with a driver's permit in my hand. I passed the test. Wow!

Now the hard part was getting dad to find time to let me drive with him in the car. My dad was on the quiet side and seldom raised his voice but he had a look that would bring me around to his way of thinking in short order. He used that look as he explained the finer points of driving to me. I made a couple of standing sticks to practice parallel parking in the driveway. I was ready for my driving test in a few weeks but Dad wasn't. Then one day, he told me to make an appointment.

Some of my friends already had their license so I knew all the stories. Only a few passed the driving test the first time. Many failed because they didn't signal a turn, or didn't stop where they were told, but most failed the parking test. I knew you only had two attempts at passing it or else you had to come back and try again some other time.

My Dad had a '56 Ford Victoria hardtop with automatic transmission, so I didn't have to worry about shifting. I did well until the dreaded parking test. I parallel parked in my spot to my satisfaction but when the officer opened the door he told me that I was still halfway in the street. "Try it one more time," he said (only he used a few more adjectives). So, I pulled back out and this time I parked it two inches from the curb. Then he said, "Park it over there." I was successful on the first try, wow!

The next few months I came up with many reasons why I needed to use the car like taking Mom to the store was always a good one. At the time, I was going with a girl who had her license so I was able to drive with her in her dad's car, a '59 Mercury four door.

While I was working more hours in the local theater, I saved up some money to buy a car. After looking at a few, I brought a '61 Ford home for approval, but that didn't work out. I tried a few more times but those cars weren't in very good shape either and didn't get approval from dad.

During my junior year in high school I became aware of a car that the body shop teacher was working on for his class. The senior shop class was rebuilding the engine for that car. It was a 1957 Plymouth Belvedere four door hardtop. The engine was a 1956 277cu. V8 with Powerflite automatic and it was for sale!!!

After a week of talking to my dad and mom, dad agreed to go with me to the teacher's house and look at this car. It had no power steering or brakes and there wasn't a radio, but the body and engine were like new. We spent over an hour talking with the teacher. If I remember correctly, he wanted \$150 for the car. I had saved a little more than that which would help cover insurance. I still remember when dad finally said yes. That drive home was beyond description. The first drive in my own car! On the first day that I drove it to school, I parked next to the automotive shop so everyone could see it.

The car was black and the teacher agreed to repaint the car any color I wanted. When I picked out the colors for the car I chose a Cadillac light blue top and stripe down the side, and a GM blue for the rest. I named it "The Blue Lady".

I learned a lot with that car. Flashing the field on the generator was a common thing to do. I don't know why, but the generator would quit charging until I flashed it. After a while it charged OK from then on. The brakes was another area that needed attention. The rear springs seemed a little weak too. I found a junk '57 two door Savoy for \$30 and I towed it to a shop down the street from our house. I gave them the car for a radio and antenna. I had them cut the rear spring off and used the main leaf to build up my weak springs. This worked very well.

After a few years I joined the US Air Force and after school went to Amarillo, Texas for eighteen months. I flew home that summer and drove the "Lady" back to Amarillo. During my Christmas leave that year I drove back to Ohio for a visit. On the return to Amarillo I blew a heater while driving through St Louis and the windshield fogged over as I drove into the setting sun. (There were no interstate highways then.) It was cold! I found a shop in Amarillo to repair the heater.

By now the Lady was looking her age. One spark plug needed cleaning every thousand miles, some blue smoke was noticed every now and then too. The tin worm was showing up in ever increasing areas. One day a light hail storm poked holes over the headlights. The Blue Lady had passed her prime.

After some mechanical prep work I started making the rounds of used car lots. I found a '61 Dodge Seneca four door with air, power brakes, power steering and tinted windows with about fifty thousand miles. I had just enough money to buy that car. It was a no brainer.

I'll always remember that Blue Lady Belvedere and all the things she taught me. The only time I have ever seen another one has been on two of our club yard tours and they were way too far gone to even think of being restored. I have never seen one on the road, only in photos.


