KYANA will provide refreshments and snacks. Please call Jerry Bass at 502 296 3814 to RSVP



#### SATURN: A GREAT AUTOMOTIVE EXPERIMENT

... why it came and why it so quickly went away ....

Saturn was a so-called, "different kind of car company" that officially began in 1985. The idea for a new, innovative small car originated in 1982 with an early demonstration model revealed in 1983. Several concept versions, called Saturn, were introduced in the following years.

Saturn was to be a subsidiary of General Motors with a new, geographically-distant and independent-from-Detroit factory in Springhill, Tennessee. The original intent was to better

compete with Asian and European imports that were gaining an increasing sales percentage of automobile purchases. With less good reputations, quality, and technology in their production offerings, American vehicle companies had been losing favor and market-share with the buying public. The intent for Saturn was to start from scratch with a brand-new company unencumbered by past practices to produce novel vehicles that were more innovative and exciting ... a great automotive experiment!

Originally, planning was to be away from "top-down" General Motors (GM) corporate micromanagement oversight; rather, it was founded to be "bottom-up" employee-owned with worker input, and fresh ideas that American people liked. In the beginning, Saturn had its own unique car models and automotive dealerships too, that were separate from others of GM. Production of vehicles began in 1990 for the 1991 model year. Initially, its introduction massively captured huge interest among lots of our motoring public. People instinctively liked having a new, unique car, from small-town origins - independent of a big company, with interesting differences like plastic "dent-resistant" external panels and no haggle show-room prices. Saturn was a big initial success.

Unfortunately, Saturn disappeared from the market in 2009. Franchises were closed the following year. It lasted just a few years, too bad. So, what happened? Here is the story.

Despite immediately catching many American car buyer's attention, there was resentment within the remaining personnel at GM. They harbored dissatisfaction that resources for Saturn were taken away from their realms. That sentiment compromised Saturn throughout its corporate existence. To start with, the cars were immediately popular, but never met sales expectation and the beginning dealership numbers were suboptimal. initially, they produced sedans and coupes, and later introduced wagons, sport utility vehicles, minivans, and convertibles. They were marketed in Canada, Japan, and elsewhere; by 1993, they produce their 500,000<sup>th</sup> vehicle. One million Saturn's were marketed by 1995; shortly thereafter Springhill began building right-hand drive cars on the same assembly line as the left-sided versions. Production of two million cars was achieved by 1999.

However, a downward trend began with the emergence of the early 1990s economic recession. Vehicles were too pricey, the Tennessee factory costs were higher than their competition, and GM management intruded increasingly into their plans and soon forced sharing platforms with other divisions. GM management was increasingly uncomfortable with Saturn's independence and lack of profitability. While the first Saturn's were products of their own design, thoroughly true Saturn's gradually disappeared with escalating encroachment by GM at design, sharing body-part

assemblies, and rebadging. Engineering deteriorated over time, as did product manufacturing. Things were not going well.

In the early 2000's, even as new Saturn models appeared, they were often based on previous GM designs. Some "so-called" Saturn's were actually European-designed models, rebadged other versions, and some were built in Europe. Vehicle platforms were interchanged. Disagreement within the companies increased. Popular interest waned. The unique labor contract for Springhill was discontinued by 2004; the following United Auto Workers' plan allowed Saturn workforces and designs to be increasingly integrated into the larger GM environment. Then it got worse.

Most automotive companies were having money troubles during our most recent recession; GM was gradually becoming bankrupt. Oldsmobile had already ceased to exist in 2004. During 2008, with government planning for a financial bailout, GM agreed to discontinue Pontiac, Hummer, and Saab. That left only Chevrolet, Buick, Cadillac, and GMC in the restructured company. In early 2009, announcements were made about the shutting down of Saturn during the 2010-2011 years. Dealerships in the USA and Canada were already closing. Confidence in the brand was disappearing. Also, in an attempt at increasing GM sales and customer retention, a \$2,000 incentive to existing Saturn owners was offered; it could be used to purchase new GM vehicles in early 2010, but not for a new Saturn.

Penske Automotive Group planned to buy the Saturn brand in 2009. They hoped to contract a variety of experienced other automotive factories (possibly French, Korean, or Japanese brands) to make vehicles under the Saturn name. GM still built some Saturn's through 2011; however, such manufacturing was not sustained.

Saturn ended in 2010, but General Motors continued to offer their own versions. In 2012, a rebadged Saturn Vue became a GM version, introduced as the Chevrolet Captiva Sport. Finally, to terminate operations more honorably, current Saturn customer car-service, auto part supplies, and future vehicle warranty claims were to be covered at other GM dealerships.

Too bad - a sad end to a grand experiment, one that once truly captured great public enthusiasm. Perhaps too, it is also a blow against independent innovative thinking during these times at the resurgence of big corporations that overcome the "little guy." Not an encouraging sign; yet, maybe predictive of what we have all experienced with the decline of American automotive manufacturing businesses over the past few decades. Our homegrown domestic auto companies are no longer dominant. Toyota is now the world's biggest auto producer.

Who knows what is coming next? Only time tells the future.
