## THE LEXINGTON AUTOMOBILE

#### THE LEXINGTON

#### Kentucky & Indiana built car: 1908 - 1927

Vehicles have been and are made in Kentucky. Nowadays, there are Louisville Fords, Corvettes from Bowling Green, and Toyotas of Georgetown. Lots of automobile parts are also made in various Kentucky locations. Indiana also was and still is a significant vehicle manufacturing state.

What about cars built in Kentucky early in the 20<sup>th</sup> century? That included Louisville's Dixie Flyer, the Firefly Speedster, and the Urban Electric tractor. Between 1912 and 1923, these were products of the Kentucky Wagon Manufacturing Company of Louisville. Some of us have knowledge about these three products. By appointment, one can still view a Dixie Flyer, on exhibit at the Kentucky Tractor Company in Louisville. During 1912, another company planned to produce a car, the Kentucky Electric; however, none were built. Were there any others?

The **Lexington** was an early four-cylinder car initially produced in Lexington, Kentucky by the Lexington Motor Company. They were an "assembly vehicle," put together with parts from many different sources. Lexingtons were built there between 1908 and 1910. The original intent of the owners, who had been horse-racing enthusiasts, was to enter competitive automotive racing. Subsequently, however, fabrication moved to Connersville, Indiana in 1910. Not doing well financially, the company nearly collapsed in 1912, 1923, and 1926, but was twice rescued by added monetary backing.

One early financial supporter for Lexington automobiles in 1913 was the Ansted family-owned United States Automotive Corporation. Ansted assembled Howard engines, and they powered Lexington. The company made a potentially lucrative deal with General Motors, contracting to produce a high volume of six-cylinder Ansted engines for GM's Durrant and Princeton automobiles. GM ordered 30,000 of these engines, but some patent infringement questions dampened enthusiasm. It was a great idea, but too late for the Lexington Motor Company, partly because of a countrywide recession with diminished car sales in the 1920s. The Ansted family diversified into other ventures. Decades later, one of the members acquired a fast race-car, winning the Indianapolis 500 two times in the mid-1960s, scored by A.J. Foyt, the famous auto racing driver.


One Lexington innovation in 1919 was a dual exhaust system for each cylinder; that boosted power and gasoline mileage. Other engineering improvements included a rigid box cross-section frame for strengthening the undercarriage. The emergency brake operated on the driveshaft rather than on the wheels. Vehicles were produced in a wide variety of styles that included roundabouts, roadsters, touring cars, limousines, coupes, sedans, and sedanettes, many with a variety of seating capacities.


Lexington's racing niche had success in 1909 and 1910 by winning the Glidden, multi-thousand-mile endurance tour and the Indianapolis 500 in 1912. Some prestige came by winning the Colorado Pikes Peak mountain-climbing race three times between 1920 and 1924. Yet, these victories never translated into high sales; the Lexington brand never achieved a wide-spread reputation. It was not a prestige automobile, nor a real performance car, or even just a fast, reliable vehicle for the public. This issue was reflected in the manufacturing. Performance options favored hill climbing and racing; however, the body styles were less popular. At the company's peak they operated 10 factories, and they were recognized for joining many different parts into a finished automobile. There had been interest in expanding the company, but competition remained a problem.

The aftermath of a recession following World War I led to the demise of many automobile companies. Lexington in its first year fabricated under 200 cars, but they gradually escalated to an annual peak of over 6,000 during the 1920s. Production subsequently declined to well below 200 units in a year; that small number was economically unsustainable. They never achieved enough volume, having captured just a small automotive following. The last financial shortfall led to the end of the company; the manufacture of the Lexington ceased in 1927.

That same year, E.L. Cord, of Indiana's Auburn Automobile Company, purchased the Ansted Engine Company and the Lexington Motor Car Company. Then, \$2 million was invested in upgrading their factories ultimately into state-of-the-art Auburn, Cord, and Duesenberg manufacturing plants.

For those wanting to know more about the Lexington, there is a book: the <u>Lexington Automobile, A</u> <u>Complete History</u>. It is authored by Richard A. Stanley and published in 2007 by *McFarland and Company, Inc.* (ISBN-13: 978-0786469345). This publication also contains numerous photos, old-time advertisements, drawings, and maps.
