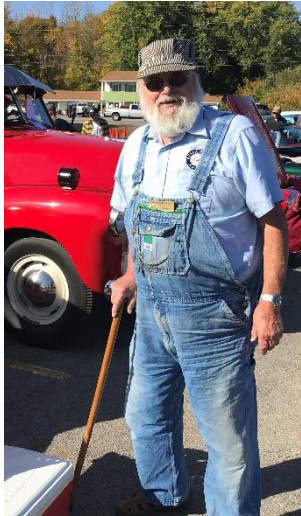

## REMEMBERING ROGER STEPHAN

### In Memoriam - Roger Stephan



Roger's recent passing was somewhat unexpected and a shock to many in KYANA. With no memorial service planned by his extended family until March, I thought it would be helpful to share what information we do know.

First, some background. Roger battled a case of the flu in November that really hit him hard. He tested several times for Covid but all tests were negative. Although he somewhat recovered from the flu, he was still short of breath. His shortness of breath got so bad that he went to the hospital and was admitted to Southwest. That was around December 13, the date of our December board meeting when I learned from a couple other members that Roger was hospitalized. Roger was then released from the hospital after a short stay. When he arrived home, he could not climb the stairs to his front door without again being short of breath. He drove himself back to Southwest and was readmitted. Southwest eventually transferred him downtown to U of L hospital, formerly Jewish. They performed a lot of tests, ruling out his heart as the problem. They diagnosed him with COPD, a possible result of the years he smoked a pipe. Roger was to have one more test for blood clots on the afternoon he passed.

Betty Haley, Chester, Ken Martin, Butch Mahoney, and multiple other KYANA members including Pat and I had several conversations with Roger while he was in the hospital. Ray Hayes paid him a long visit the night before he passed. Anyone who talked with Roger the day before or the day of his death, Pat and I included, found him to be in very good spirits and looking forward to being released. We talked to Roger around 10:15 am Monday morning and according to his cousin he was found unresponsive on the floor of his hospital room around 11:30 am. Several attempts to revive him were unsuccessful.

Roger's first cousin, Amy Kelty, is handling his affairs. She lives in Mt. Washington. She called me with the news of Roger's passing Monday evening after going through Roger's cell phone and began calling back recent callers. Amy's son, Shane Kelty, was recruited by Roger into KYANA a few years ago. He stayed in the club a couple of years but left the club after high school. Amy attended a few KYANA meetings with her son and is keenly aware of how important KYANA was to Roger. She has already gathered all of Roger's new membership information from his home and gave it to Chester. Amy is planning a celebration of Roger's life sometime in March at the church he attended. From what I understand Roger's remains have already been cremated.

Amy will be dealing with Roger's personal effects. She plans to sell his Model T and Chevy pickup at some future point with the proceeds going to the small cemetery where Roger's remains will be interred. She plans to give KYANA members the first opportunity to purchase these vehicles. An

estate sale may be held for his other possessions. Amy is a bit overwhelmed with all this right now so the progress of processing Roger's possessions may take time.

Roger's passion was working with our new members. He worked very hard to shepherd our new members through the pre-member process to become full KYANA members. He was very proud to report at our board meetings when a pre-member transitioned to full membership. All this work was done exclusively on paper, as most of you know Roger did not own a computer or have internet access. All this effort and dedication will not be easy to replace. Fortunately for KYANA, Roger had already begun to discuss transitioning his Membership Chairman responsibilities to Ken Martin. Roger informed the board that he would not likely run for another term and wanted to ensure a smooth transition should he step down from the board. Ken is eager and willing to continue the fine work that Roger performed as Membership Chairman.

Please keep Roger's family in your thoughts and prayers as they contend with his passing.

### **KYANA Salvage Yard Tour – Saturday March 18**



Mark your calendar on March 18 for another KYANA salvage yard tour. We will be visiting a yard in Mauckport, Indiana that we visited way back in 2012. They have since harvested a considerable number of unique older cars and trucks making a return trip worthwhile. Rob Johnson and I made a scouting trip in early January and confirmed that this yard should keep most KYANA members busy for at least a couple hours. The yard operators are very accommodating and welcome customers to walk the yard and remove parts on

their own. If you plan to remove some needed parts, please bring your own tools. Kids are welcome if you keep them in check, so feel free to bring the kids or grandkids. We will be getting an early start on March 18 as the yard closes at noon on Saturday, so be sure to get plenty of rest the night before and set your alarm.



Most salvage yards in early spring can be very muddy, messy places, and this yard is no exception. Please plan accordingly, dress in old clothes, and wear boots or other footwear you do not mind getting muddy and dirty. You may want to bring a change of shoes to wear on the return trip. Other suggested attire includes gloves and rugged pants to battle the briar bushes. There is limited parking at the yard itself so it would

help to keep the cars in the caravan to a minimum. Please carpool with your fellow Club members if possible and leave your car in one of the parking lots close to our morning meeting location.



On Saturday morning March 18 we will meet at 7:30 a.m. at the McDonalds restaurant located at 10411 Dixie Hwy, Louisville, KY 40272. This is the McDonalds located in front of the Walmart Supercenter on Dixie, just north of the Gene Snyder Freeway. There is adequate parking in the McDonald's lot as well as additional parking in the large lot behind the restaurant. Again, please consider carpooling with a fellow member or two and leave your vehicle in the lot. We will depart McDonalds at 8:00 a.m., so plan to arrive a little early if you wish to eat breakfast at McDonalds. Breakfast will be on your own. Neil White received the following email from Mindy Miller who is the Director of Development & Communications in Hazard, KY. It is nice when our efforts continue to be recognized.

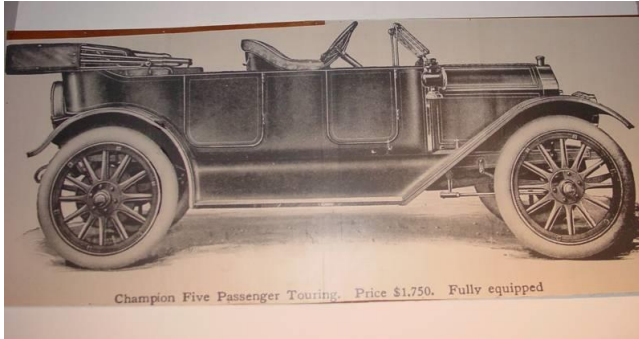

## MARATHON: A TENNESSE BUILT AUTOMOBILE

### MARATHON: A TENNESSE BUILT AUTOMOBILE



Indeed, there was an automobile made in Tennessee, our neighboring state: the **MARATHON**. It was started in 1908, but only remained in production under its own name until 1914. The Southern Motor Works Company began in Jackson, TN where it provided manufacture of Marathon cars in Nashville. In 1889, the factory had originally started out from an old cotton mill, called the

Southern Engine and Boiler Works. That plant began as an automobile maker in 1907. They insisted that all parts of this vehicle were to be engineered and made only by them.

The four-cylinder gasoline engine and transmission were designed by William Collier at the Southern Motor Works Company. Their first prototype engine appeared in 1906. The car was initially to be called the Southern, however, it had to be renamed for marketing under the name Marathon in 1910, because another company already claimed the name Southern for its cars. The name Marathon enhanced sales since Greek words were popular with people following the 1904 Olympics.

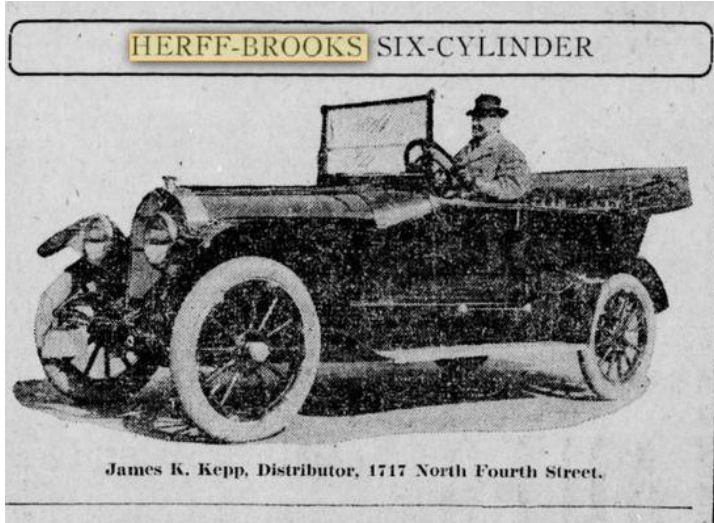


Marathons were produced in three chassis sizes and automotive styles. The Runner, a touring car, had a wheelbase of 104 inches and came with a 25 horsepower engine. A roadster, named the Winner, was larger at a 116-inch wheelbase and with 35 horsepower. Their biggest vehicle was a 123-inch wheelbase version, called the Champion; it had a still bigger, 45 horse-power engine. They were open body versions; yet, a top was an option. Marathons were of excellent quality and durability and had a fine public

reputation. Financial mismanagement, however, was said to have compromised the company function, but details are uncertain. They were building about 200 Marathons each month by 1912. Car purchase prices during 1914 varied between nearly \$1,000 to \$1,500. Yet, production never met

consumer demand. Nevertheless, the Southern Motor Works Company experienced greater financial problems by 1913.

Difficulties prompted the management to move production to an Indianapolis company. Though, by 1914 the Southern Motor Works business went bankrupt. Criminal activity, cheating, and/or greed might have brought about the demise of the company. Only a few of these cars are still in existence.



That prompted the Herff-Brooks firm, another Indianapolis automaker, to buy the Marathon manufacturing machinery and moved it all to Richmond, Indiana. Reportedly, about 200 of the personnel came with the move. Back in those days, Indiana rivaled Michigan as the second highest car-producing state in the U.S.A.\* This same vehicle briefly continued to be produced under the new brand name of Herff-Brooks. At first, they were identical to Marathons, but improvements were developed – some models were more

powerful and other types were less costly, even below \$800. Their automotive fabrication ceased in 1917; reasons are not clear, but it all occurred along with the coming of the First World War and with a major switch to wartime industry production.

The Marathon Motor Works factory was preserved and exists as a museum in Nashville, Tennessee. It is officially registered as a United States National Historic Place. The site includes a store, the Antique Archaeology.

\*Comment about Indiana: Manufacturing over a million vehicles per year, Indiana still retains this second to-the-top automobile building state ranking today. There were at least 172 auto makers in Indiana in the early 1900s. Just a few of the somewhat better-known examples include the American, Auburn, Cole, Cord, Duesenberg, Electromobile, Elgin, Marion, Marmon, McFarlan, National, Overland, Star, Studebaker, Stutz, and Waverley. Yes, way too many to list here. Besides internal combustion power, some were run by steam or were electrics. Most of the manufacturers, disappeared during our Great Depression era; others were gone soon thereafter or by World War II, and Studebaker ended by 1966. Indiana still has several domestic and foreign car makers currently in operation to this day

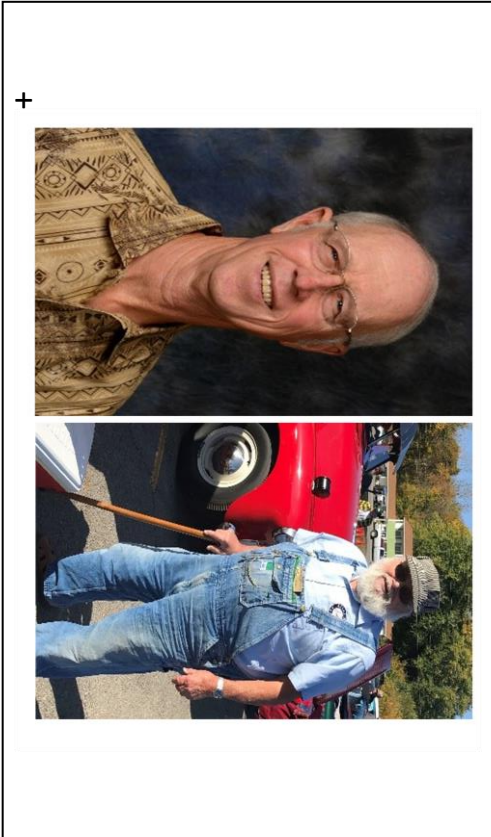
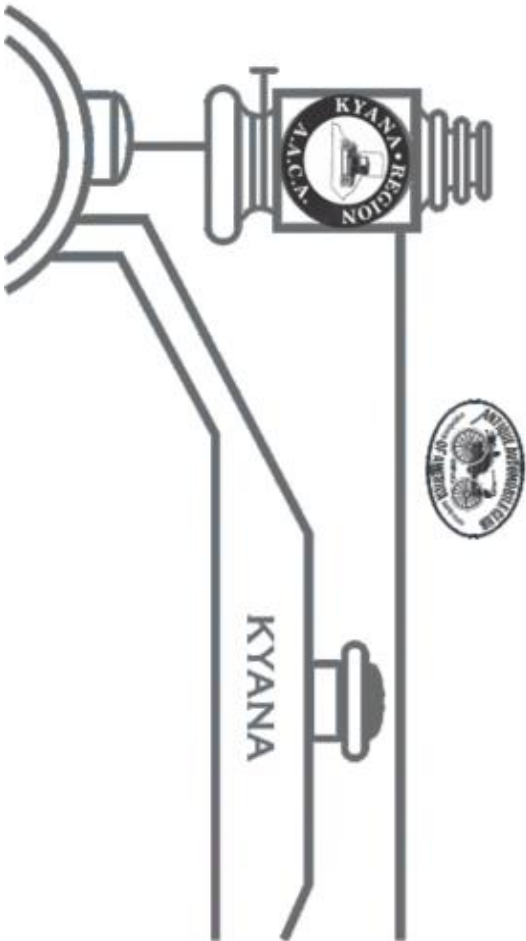
