## FROM THE PRESIDENT MARK KUBANCIK

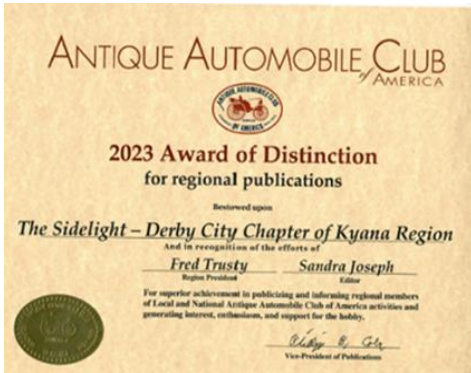
### From the President – Mark Kubancik

The KYANA Swap Meet has grown by leaps and bounds over the last fifty years. The first swap meet was held at the Armory and we had about two dozen spaces. The next year, we went big and moved to the Kentucky State Fairgrounds and rented a small part of the pavilion. A few years later we were at capacity so we rented the west wing at the Exposition Center. By the mid-eighties, we decided to hold a two-day meet. With the spaces on the west side all filled, it was time to grow again so we added Broadbent Arena about fifteen years ago. It took about five years to educate the shoppers to visit this area. Again, the spaces filled up fast. About five years ago we added the carpet areas and let our shoppers into this area first, after buying their wrist bands. Currently, we have over seven acres of shopping space for our shoppers and a car corral outside with over one hundred spaces. This year we set a record by selling the most spaces ever at our show. Maureen and I need your help to get a record number of workers to work the biggest indoor meet in the country. We need an extra five dozen workers to make this happen! We need you to work an EXTRA shift!

### KYANA Salvage Yard Tour – Friday March 29

Mark your calendar on March 29 – Good Friday - for another KYANA salvage yard tour. We will be visiting a “new” yard in Liberty, KY; by “new” I mean a yard that we have not previously visited on a KYANA tour. This is a large yard with lots of modern iron with many older vehicles scattered in and about. Rob Johnson and I made a scouting trip in late December and confirmed that this yard should keep most KYANA members busy for at least a couple hours. The yard owner is very accommodating and welcomes customers to walk the yard and remove parts on their own. If you plan to remove some needed parts, please bring your own tools. Kids are welcome if you keep them in check, so feel free to bring the kids or grandkids. We will be getting a relatively early start on March 29<sup>th</sup>, as the drive to the salvage yard takes about two hours from south Louisville. Be sure to get plenty of rest the night before and set your alarm.

Most salvage yards in early spring can be very muddy, messy places, and this yard is no exception. Please plan accordingly, dress in old clothes, and wear boots or footwear you do not mind getting muddy and dirty. You may want to bring a change of shoes to wear on the return trip home. Other suggested attire includes gloves and rugged pants to battle the briar bushes. There is limited parking at the yard itself so it would help to keep the cars in the caravan to a minimum. Please carpool with your fellow club members if possible and leave your car in one of the parking lots close to our morning meeting location.

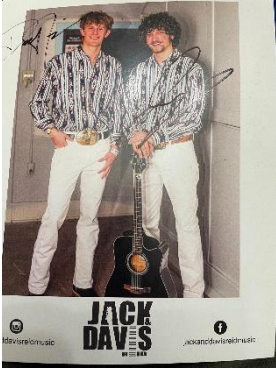
On Friday morning March 29 we will meet at 8:00 a.m. at the Mt. Washington Burger King restaurant located at 127 Brookside Ct, Mt Washington, KY 40047. This is the Burger King located in front of the Mt. Washington Kroger on Bardstown Rd-US 150. There is adequate parking in the Burger King lot as well as additional parking in the large lot behind the restaurant. Again, please consider carpooling with a fellow member or two and leave your vehicle in the lot. The two functions with the most need are admission sales at entry doors and security monitoring at the remaining entrance and exit doors at the KEC. **THE CHEVROLET BROTHERS**

## THE CHEVROLET BROTHERS: Louis, Arthur, and Gaston

In the early days of automobiles there were many people who influenced car development and are long remembered by car brands named after them. It is easy to think of just some of them: Buick, Chrysler, Cord, Dodge, Edsel, Ford, Hudson, Kaiser, Moon, Nash, Olds, Stanley, Studebaker, Tucker, and tons more. Additionally, there are a lot of vehicle names recognizing certain people such as Cadillac, De Soto, and Pontiac; even Mercury; or places like Auburn, Plymouth, Saturn; animals (Jaguar); or things (Corvette), etc. Also famous in automotive history are the three brothers in the Chevrolet family: Louis, Arthur, and Gaston.

Louis Chevrolet was born in Switzerland in 1878 and was the oldest of the Chevrolet brothers. He was a famous car personality, especially because of the Chevrolet name-brand. He made the first Chevrolet - the Classic Six. It was

produced during the time that Louis was a race car builder and driver for Buick. Louis is credited with creating the 1910 Buick 60 Special.

The Chevrolet Classic Six was powered by a large 40 horsepower, 6-cylinder cast-iron, liquid-cooled 299 cubic inch T-head engine. That name comes from not being of L-head configuration; but rather, the intake valves were located on one side of the block and exhaust valves on the opposite side, giving it a “T” appearance. Of course, it had dual camshafts. Ignition was by magneto, and some of the early engine starters reportedly might have utilized compressed air pressure to start the engine.

This early Chevrolet was well-made in Flint, Michigan, between 1911 and 1914. The car was equipped with a cone clutch, three speed transmission, top, doors, tools, and electric lights. Weight was between 3,000-3,800 pounds. The famous Chevy bowtie emblem first appear in 1914; but nowadays, nobody knows for sure how the design was selected. It could go 65 mph, which was fast in those days, and it was a pretty classy vehicle.

Louis also had a Swiss-born sister (1881), Fanny; she died in New Jersey in 1959. There were two more sisters, Marie, and Bertha, but less is known about them. Their mother was French; their dad was Swiss and a watchmaker. Louis was the first in his sibship to come to this country, and he helped the others emigrate to the U.S.A. All three brothers were enthusiastic, famous race car drivers and automotive mechanics.

The brothers ran the Frontenac Motor Corporation and manufactured parts for some Ford Model Ts, other automobiles, and including race cars, like those for the Indianapolis 500. Besides being an automotive designer and engineer, Louis competed all over the country in lots of races, even at Indianapolis and Daytona Beach. Reportedly, he once beat the famous race driver, Barney Oldfield, at competing in a motor speed-race. He came in at number 20 in the Indianapolis 500 of 1915. The vehicles and engines in these competitions came from a variety of manufacturers. The brothers were involved in making Buick, Chevy, Frontenac, Fonty Ford, Monroe, and other fast cars.

With his brother, Arthur, and his business partner, William Durant, they also started another company that produced Chevys: the Chevrolet Motor Car Company and the American Motors Corporation (but not the more recent business of the same name). Between 1915-1918, he and Mr. Durant developed management disagreements about automobile marketing. Louis wanted an expensive, premium car brand for Chevrolet, while William wanted a practical, inexpensive version to compete especially with Ford Model Ts.

This led Louis Chevrolet to quit their company and sell his Chevrolet stock to Durant; that resulted in Chevys then being built by the McLaughlin Company, a Canadian firm. During that time with various equity trades, Durant gathered a controlling interest in General Motors. Still in 1918, with further stock acquisitions, Chevrolet was merged as a division into General Motors. The sales contest between Chevy and Ford, as conceived by Mr. Durant, has continued to this day. This rivalry also persisted between their owners as a hot issue during the 1950-1960s. It was prominent not just in automotive sales, but at stockcar races all over our country and at bragging rights for the winners. At the dirt track races I attended as a teenager in Texas, there was lots of yelling to cheer-on favored brand during these contests.

Subsequently, Louis sustained his interest in various mechanical areas, including motorboats - both at racing and engine design. He worked for the Stutz Automotive Company and later developed a focus in aircraft manufacture. Between 1927-1930, he started the Chevrolair aeronautical engine company, but it went bankrupt during the Depression. Subsequently, Louis worked for Chevrolet in Detroit as a mechanic. His death from cardiac disease occurred in 1941.

Arthur Chevrolet was the middle brother; he was born in France during 1884, after the family had moved there. In the U.S.A., he followed the same interest and behavioral patterns of Louis’s involvement with all aspects of cars and racing automobiles. He seems to be the least famous of the Chevrolet brothers; yet, he was distinguished for engineering excellence and was prominent among race car drivers. At the Indy 500 of 1911, did not finish the race because of a problem with his Buick racer. Car trouble again resulted in him dropping out of the 1916 Indy at his 35<sup>th</sup> lap.



A serious injury from a crash during a practice run for the 1920 Indy, caused him to quit race car driving; however, devotion to mechanical projects continued. Between 1928 and 1930, a patent was granted to him for his design of an innovative overhead valve engine. During World War II, he was involved in the war effort at airplane manufacture and marine engine production; his work included perfecting diesel power. By 1942, Arthur retired after being troubled by depression. He then moved to Louisiana and died by suicide there in 1946.

Gaston Chevrolet was the youngest brother, French-born in 1892. After immigration to this country, he became prominent as a mechanic, racing driver, and vehicle manufacturer. At his first Indianapolis 500 entry in 1919, he came in at the 10<sup>th</sup> spot. Then, he won the Indy race in 1920, driving a vehicle built by the three brothers. He had gained a prestige, national reputation as an outstanding driver in competitions all over this country. That same year, however, he was killed in an accident during a race in California at the Beverly Hills Speedway, fatal also to his co-driver. Nevertheless, frequent previous wins qualified him for enough credits to also win the AAA National Championship recognition, posthumously, as the number one race car driver of 1920.
