MIDDLETOWN POLICE FOUNDATION CAR SHOW





FIRETRUCKS

FIGHTING FIRES AND SOME EARLY FIRE TRIUCKS

We do not know much about the very earliest firefighting equipment. Probably there have always been water and/or dirt tossed on to fires since the beginning of human life with some control over fire. Over time, a variety of more modern, efficient tools for putting out fires (like buckets of water) must have been built by various people, then they were built at machine shops, and/or finally at factories around the world. Bucket brigades were some of the early organized means of fighting fires.

Small, hand-operated water pumps have been recorded throughout history for centuries. Some of them were reportedly called fire syringes. By the 1600s, there were types of fire equipment that used compressed air to push water out of a pressurized tank and force it out of a pipe to deliver a jet of water at a distance. During this same century, there are lots of individual accounts of hand pumping devices to fight fires.



Already in the 1700s, there were laws in some of this country's cities mandating that every home always keep buckets of water ready to start a bucket fire-brigade when needed. History also notes further improved hand-pumped, homemade firefighting paraphernalia long-utilized around the world. In the early 1700s. One example was a British inventor, Richard Newsham, who patented an early firefighting vehicle that could squirt water to extinguish fires. They built a treadle-activated pump on a wagon with a water tank that allowed two firemen, with a foot on both sides of the pump treadle, to alternatively pressure water out of an attached hose and shoot water onto fires. The apparatus was transported by human power, but probably was horse-drawn as well. This was a major public safety innovation; no surprise, it was a widely copied success.

It is said that Benjamin Franklin established a firefighting company in 1737. The first known actual purpose-built apparatus for fighting fires in this continent was made by Thomas Lote in 1743; it was called a hand tub. The cistern-tub's water was to be quickly filled by people with a bucket brigade and from that a hand-powered pump allowed firefighters to shoot out a stream of water.

In the early 1800s, as the U.S.A. urbanized and industrialized, more efficient means of firefighting were developed. About 1822, bucket brigades became less important with the design of an independent engine to pull water from an outside water source. That was an important advancement at seeking copious water supplies, as from lakes or streams. A Philadelphia factory started making such a suction device called, "The Hydration." People could now more quickly extinguish much larger fires.

Bigger and better horse-drawn versions were an initial option up into the early 1900s, especially in cities. Often these horsedrawn contraptions were called steam-pumpers, and they were the main means of firefighting up until about the 1920s. As towns and populations grew, buildings became larger, and often were still of wood and/or other flammable construction. Thus, fires had become more dangerous and were overcoming the ability of human and/or horsepower for safe, quick operation. Human-powered water pumps were replaced by increasingly powerful steam-engine pumps. Unfortunately, that added weight that was more difficult to transport. More and larger fires called for greater water quantities and higher pressures were needed to reach and douse flames in taller and/or bigger structures.

What about fire trucks? Nowadays, alternatively called fire engines; both are the same, essentially a truck that conveys firefighters, water, pumps, and apparatus to put out a fire. They are usually built on another vehicle chassis and then outfitted for firefighting. This can include sirens, warning lights, emergency rescue equipment, and other needed paraphernalia. In addition to firefighting duties, they are often called upon to help at all sorts of other tragedies, accidents, and health crises, as well as to transport emergency medical teams.



New York got its first steam-propelled fire engine in 1841; however, some firefighters saw it as a threat to their jobs, so they destroyed the machine out of that fear. Hand-pumped fire engines emerged again about 1845. Steam-pumped versions arrived about 1856 and could spray significant quantities of water to great heights and across significant distances. Increasingly motorized devices appeared and were fire-purpose-built in the late 1890s. The advert of practical, popular gasoline engines and cars led to their use in more modern versions of fire engines throughout the world. They were already cited in the U.S.A. in an article during 1905 by the Popular Mechanics magazine.



Once the automotive industry expanded, internal combustion gasoline engine-power replaced human and horse propulsion. The Knox Automobile Company of Springfield, Massachusetts in 1905, Cincinnati's Ahrens-Fox Manufacturing Company in 1913, and the Peter Pirsch and Sons of Kenosha, Wisconsin led the industry in offering early motorized fire engines. Soon there was competition from many different firetrucks making business ... including one most familiar, past industry leader, American LaFrance.

The Knox Automobile Company had started around 1900 and fabricated a variety of vehicles. Their fire engine design heralded the making of similar equipment to come. In 1905, they initiated an automotive innovation with a two-cinder, 16 hp fire truck. Soon thereafter, a similar Ahrens-Fox machine was built onto a 44 hp vehicle. It had a six-cylinder engine with a four-speed transmission, guaranteed to attain 50 mph. A truck bed was there for firefighting equipment. A model for the future, but only six of them were produced and maybe none of them ever left Cincinnati.

Peter Pirsch & Sons made what is said to be the earliest modern US fire engine. They originated and patented trussed extension ladders. A Rambler chassis was the basis of their first motorized ladder truck. Until 1937, components from other companies included: Couple Gear, Diamond T, Dodge, Duplex, International, Nash, Sterling, and White. Various upgrades followed over the years with a homemade chassis, better pumpers, a General Motors enclosed cab, and already by the mid-1930s, an aerial, 85-foot ladder hoist. Soon, they fabricated 100-foot aluminum aerial ladders as their specialty product. Up into the 1940s, they continued improving and marketed articulated ladder trucks powered by Hercules or Waukesha engines.

Several LaFrance-connected businesses were founded in 1873, and with earlier startups in 1832, based in New York, South Carolina, and Canada. Manufacture included fire engines, ladder trucks, ambulances, and rescue vehicles. Through their connections and/or affiliated companies, and over time, they built hand-operated pumps, horse drawn steamers, hose wagons, water towers, and various other combinations of more recent motorized, up-to-date firefighting equipment. American LaFrance began in 1903 with production of a gasoline engine fire truck in June 1907. In this niche market they ultimately became leaders, distributing fire engines widely, but they terminated operations in 2014. Ward LaFrance, was a New York, unaffiliated competitor founded by another family member; however, bankrupt in 1979, they reopened that year under the new name, Ward '79.

These later designs were the model for our current fire trucks. By 1925, internal combustion engine driven water pumps had nearly replaced steam-powered types. Increasingly heavy equipment was called for as well, with lots of lengthy water hoses and extendable, tall ladders. In addition to the moving the vehicle and carrying more personnel, some came with heavy water carrying compartments and/or outside water supply devises; they then required more gasoline engines. Beyond that for transport, a second one would drive external water suction pumps, and yet other engines were for forcing water out of the hose to put out the fire. All aspects of firefighting capacity were expanding at speed and efficiency.

Rotary water pumps were another initial upgrade; they were a big improvement over reciprocating pumps that use an oscillating piston - best visualized by thinking of a hand-operated up & down motion of a well-water pump. The rotary types are mechanical devices that derive pump action through the mechanical use of vanes, gears, pistons, screws, or some variety of these means. Gradually, these were replaced by centrifugal versions that utilize a rotating impeller, like the ones on current day, modern fire trucks.



In this country, we are lucky at being able to get always-ready assistance in all sorts of emergencies, as well as to quickly put out fires, with lots of fire stations scattered about, especially in cities. That is true of Louisville. We encounter them in our neighborhood periodically for a wide variety of emergencies. Just recently a rescue squad with a fire truck came to our house when we had a question of a carbon monoxide poisoning from a failed heat exchanger at our home heater furnace. They were fast, checked it out, and did good service. Other fire rescue squads came close by here, twice for different medical emergencies. Really nice.

KYANA REGION BUSINESS CARDS

Region board member Tim Truax brought an idea to the board to design and print KYANA business cards. The cards would include pertinent information about the club allowing members to give to non-members for recruitment purposes. The board liked the idea and gave Tim the go-ahead. Examples of the cards are presented here. In addition to an email address and website address, the reverse side of the card includes a QR code that takes anyone with a camera phone to the club's website. 
