SQUIRE BOONE CAVE TOUR SEPTEMBER 14TH



Stalactites, stalagmites, flowstone, and more adorn the cavern walls, ceilings, and floors in a natural wonder that has taken millions of years to create. You'll walk about 1/3 of a mile through this living and growing ecosystem deep below the Earth's surface and learn how its passageways were slowly formed over eons of time, even as dinosaurs roamed the Earth!

The caverns stay a pleasant 54°F year-round; a jacket or sweater is recommended. The tour takes place along lighted, paved walkways and steel bridges and ends with a 73-step spiral staircase (not recommended for those with serious medical conditions).

PAIGE, GRAHAM, AND GRAHAM-PAIGE VEHICLES

Tracking Three Brands of US Automobile / Truck History: 1908 -1940s (and a few more cars)

Paige was an independent automaker from Detroit, founded by Fredrick Osgood Paige, and in business between 1908 and 1927. Paige cars were fast and expensive. The company also manufactured a less costly vehicle, the Jewett, named after H.M. Jewett, the president of the Paige firm.



For two years, Paige first produced a two-stroke, three-cylinder engine car called the Fleetwood. Beginning in 1911, they made a four-cylinder, four-cycle gasoline engine – in a newer model for five years, and by 1914, a six-cylinder powered auto emerged in two different displacements. A

straight-8 version later came along, too. Duesenberg engines (Paige-Linwood) or a Continental power option (Paige-Larchmont) were available. In 1922, a Paige auto famously set a one-mile speed record for US stock cars at over 102 miles per hour in 35 seconds.



Between 1922 and 1926, Paige marketed the Daytona, one of its most well-known automobiles. It was a three-seat, six-cylinder coupe roadster; that third seat was built onto the side, extending over the running board. Jewett cars were also marketed during 1923-1927. However, in mid-1927, three Graham brothers, Joseph, Robert, and Ray, bought the Paige company, with all assets acquired by them, soon under a Graham-Paige name.

What about Graham vehicles? The Graham brothers were since 1919 making kits to change Ford Model T cars into trucks . Then, they also manufactured their trucks, most often with Dodge engines, sold through Dodge dealerships, but marketed under the Graham Brothers brand name.

Graham automobile manufacture began in 1927 in Evansville, Indiana. Over time, they expanded beyond, to plants in Michigan and California. They later adopted the still newer company name of Graham-Paige Motors Corporation. Production quickly escalated from nearly 22,900 Graham-Paige cars in 1927 to over 73,000 one year later.



Once Dodge dealers sold Graham-Paige cars in Canada, that led to the Dodge Brothers Company, with John and Horace, taking over the truck part of the firm; all three Graham brothers accepted executive roles at Dodge. Financial and corporate uncertainty led the Grahams to start their own automotive company. That is when the Graham brothers purchased Paige-Detroit Motor Car Company and became the three-person management team. In 1928, Chrysler Corporation acquired the Dodge Brothers Company. Graham's

mechanical offerings included several 4-cylinder-powered trucks and a 6-cylinder version with a Dodge engine. The Graham Brothers brand lasted until 1929. Together with Dodge, they also produced and marketed some Paige-badged trucks.

They additionally began making Graham-Paige cars in 6- and 8-cylinder types. Graham-Paige made most of their automotive bodies and engines; these vehicles had an excellent reputation for quality, escalating sales, and were fast. The racing image was a big part of the sales pitch. Engine design was largely an in-house endeavor, but some off-site services, like a foundry owned by Continental, was contracted as well. The three brothers' profile images were included in the company logo, even down to their depiction on the frontal nameplate and taillight lens fixtures.

Despite a production slowdown during the depression, a new engine was developed; then, the car and also its 6-cylinder power source were called the Blue Streak. Updated styling included the hood, with radiator caps mounted underneath. Enclosed, protective fenders were a nice, innovation. By 1934, a Graham-designed crankshaft-driven supercharger was built into the 6- and the 8-cylinder engines; they manufactured more supercharged cars than any other automobile brand up until 1990. Marketing nevertheless remained suboptimal in 1935.



They subsequently decided to acquire REO Motor Car Company automotive bodies, with annual restyling provided from 1936 through 1938. Advertisements suggested that they were a "Spirit of Motion;" this design got acclaim in this country and lots of recognition in France, including the Concourse D'Elegance Award in Paris. Fancy styling fondly led to the car's nickname of the "Sharknose." Despite an appealing frontal design and an improved chassis function, sales did not improve - perhaps partly due to

some question about deceptive advertising.

Still amidst the world's financial crisis during 1939, they contracted with Hupmobile, another economically troubled vehicle company, to purchase Cord-styled automobile bodies. Cord Corporation, another high-end auto maker, had just recently gone out of business. Hupmobile had earlier purchased the body production dies for a popular Cord model design, but they had insufficient resources to pursue their manufacture. Even adding the impressive Cord styling, reputation, and their joint automotive business venture, they failed to enhance car purchasing; the company was just barely surviving.

Graham then built Hupmobile Skylarks and used the same distinctive Cord dies to make their own version called the Hollywood. Bodywork was further modified and included a longer hood and rear-wheel-drive, providing hope that that would boost business. Both cars were equipped with 6-cylinder engines: the Skylark at 245 cubic inch size and the Hollywood with a supercharged 218-inch displacement powerplant. Nevertheless, considerable delays in slow manufacturing led to a sustained lack of customer interest. Hupmobile continued having financial shortages and thus ceased to exist later in 1939. Due to low sales, Graham-Paige automotive fabrication faltered and similarly stopped during 1940. During World War II, Graham-Paige production was reserved for military contracts.



In late 1945, Graham-Paige announced plans to resume car-making with the Graham name; but it took until 1946 for a modern, new model to emerge. However, beginning in 1947, the firm and its automotive plants were purchased by Kaiser-Frazer. Finally under full management by Joseph W. Frazer and Henry J. Kaiser, the Kaiser-Frazer

Corporation gradually began to build their own brand of cars at former Graham-Paige factories. Some reports indicate that the Kaiser and the Frazer automotive products initially contained somewhat more advanced engineering then many of their immediate post-World War II competitors. The Continental company fabricated a Graham-Paige engine copy that was utilized in some Kaiser and Frazer automobiles. They also began a farm equipment brand called Rototiller. Nevertheless, Kaiser and Frazer stopped US auto production in the early 1950s, losing out in very competitive sales rivalry, especially to the so-called Big Three Detroit US car brands.

Graham's manufacturing facilities in Detroit were sold to Chrysler Corporation during 1947, which initially and for years used these plants for DeSoto autobody and engine production. Yet during 1952, the Graham-Paige Motors Corporation dropped the "Motors" part of their name from its logo and branched into real estate; that, by the way, included a controlling interest in Madison Square Gardens. By 1961, DeSoto, too, was phased out of existence. Over time, this Chrysler Corporation production factory briefly also assembled their Imperial branded cars. The Graham-Paige corporate brand name finally disappeared in 1962.



Region board member Tim Truax brought an idea to the board to design and print KYANA business cards. The cards would

include pertinent information about the club allowing members to give to non-members for recruitment purposes. The board liked the idea and gave Tim the go-ahead. Examples of the cards are presented here. In addition to an email address and website address, the reverse side of the card includes a QR code that takes anyone with a camera phone to the club's website. 
