# Memoriam and Remembrance Dwight Hardesty 1931 - 2024



The KYANA AACA Region was formed in 1955 and three years later Dwight joined the club. Dwight became active from the beginning in 1958 attending tours and meetings. He would continue this involvement with KYANA for over 50 years.

He attended the very first swap meet in 1964 at the Armory. The event was a success with a profit of \$391.71. Two years later the meet was moved to the Kentucky Fairgrounds. In 1970, under the leadership of Dwight, the meet had a profit of just under \$1,500. Just nine years later the swap meet had a profit of \$14,155.46. Dwight and his wife, Mabel would lead the KYANA Swap Meet from the sixties into the mid-eighties.

The Hardesty's used a simple computer in those days (a 4X8 foot sheet of plywood). As the vendors came in, a small card with their name was stuck on a square representing their space on the plywood "computer" layout. Back in those days we only had the building for 24 hours, starting at midnight on Saturday and ended Sunday at midnight. We started marking the room at midnight and a few hours later started letting the vendors enter and set up. By daylight Sunday morning the room was filled and ready for shoppers. I remember seeing Dwight with both eyes having large black spots below them from lack of rest, but he never complained.



Dwight became Sidelight Editor in 1969 - 70 and also again in 1979 - 80. During this time Dwight had a large influence on keeping the membership growing. He served on the KYANA Board several years during the seventies and always chaired/sponsored an event or events every year. These events were always driving tours in old cars (not that way today). Dwight sponsored the St. Francis Car Show for years.

The Dwight Hardesty family was truly a *SPARK PLUG* for KYANA in those early days and for many decades.

#### TANKS OF THE VIET NAM WAR

Tanks were widely used by all armies during the Viet Nam War. Lots of us in KYANA well-remember this conflict. Some were there in combat or at least for in-country backup assistance, served domestically or otherwise, and many of us know people who did not survive and/or were disabled. Fortunately, many of us were lucky enough to emerge okay. While tanks are most famously associated with WWI, WWII, Middle Eastern Wars, the current Ukraine/Russia conflict, they also had a big, less-well known



role in Viet Nam's southeast Asian war, during battles in the 1960s and '70s.

The tanks of the U.S. Army in that war mostly were the M41 Walker Bulldog light tank and the

M28A3 Patten main, heavy battle tank. Our military employed about 600 Pattens (90mm main gun and 704

hp Continental engine), including a M67 variant, having a flamethrower, sometimes called the "Zippo". The

South Viet Nam forces employed many 100s of the same M41 (76mm gun and a 500 hp Continental

engine). The M41replaced old WWII Stuart and Chaffee version light tanks (respectively with 37 and 75mm main guns), leftover from French forces and past South Vietnamese armor utilized by their Army of the Republic of Viet Nam (ARVN). Australian soldiers, also allied with South Viet Nam, had access to nearly



140 heavy British Centurions, of WWII design (105mm gun and 650 hp Rolls-Royce engine). The Army of North Viet Nam initially utilized Soviet T-54 main battle tanks, some T-55s (both with 100mmm main guns), and a similar Chinese Type 58 tank (with 85mm or 100mm guns). These tanks were manufactured with either a 500 hp or 520 hp diesel or an 800 hp gasoline engine. Their army also had PT-76s - a light, amphibious version. Many of us sadly remember photographs of the North Viet Nam's troops driving into South Viet Nam's capitol, Saigon, prominently sitting on top of their T-54 tanks near the end of the conflict.

Tanks were not widely fielded early in this war, during the 1940s and 1950s, especially because of Viet Nam's jungled, mountainous country, rice-patty areas with difficult logistics of transport, terrain, and supply. However, their application escalated later into the 1960s, after the introduction of more modern, powerful weapons and particularly useful in less hilly clear areas or with more roadways. Initial vehicle losses were said to be "low" due to relatively few available anti-tank devices. Yet, the lighter tanks became

increasingly vulnerable to damage by rocket propelled grenades and recoilless rifle fire, etc. Main battle tanks gradually became more common at infantry support on the battlefield, de-mining operations, and at destroying hardened bunkers or obstacles. They also served as soldier-protecting mobile artillery. Tanks gradually became more commonly used after 1967. They emerged ubiquitously after the Tet Offensive, in1968, particularly in the more heavily



armored types, but even those vehicles sustained significant losses, often fatal to their crews. By then, the war was shifting away from an asymmetrical / guerrilla form of conflict to a more conventional open battle format; that favored further use of heavily armored vehicles, especially by 1971. All these armies utilized more tanks and were equipped with lethal anti-tank missiles. Our U.S. forces benefited from long-range artillery and could call for accurate, fire-power air-support assistance by helicopters and airplanes.

As combat severity increased, the South Viet Nam Army also became more competitive, then equipped with M48 Patton tanks. Nevertheless, with the advent of Soviet made anti-tank missiles in Viet Cong arsenals, they too suffered attrition; thus, most tanks switched back to more use as fixed artillery. With continued high losses of armored vehicles, the U.S. military then primarily deployed helicopters capable of firing anti-tank missiles (i.e., TOW).

These developments revolutionized tank warfare there and globally thereafter with advanced amor protection and enhanced firepower. This is much like the innovations with the advent of drone combat emerging widely during the current Ukraine-Russian War; in these recent years, infantry and armor support has dramatically changed. Nowadays, a relatively inexpensive, small drone can capably destroy multimillion dollar heavily armored enemy tanks, without endangering one's own soldiers. Armies all over the world are or should be adjusting to this new battlefield reality.

In the 1970s, tank battles and causalities were high. With U.S. popular support vastly diminishing, our government and many of our people decided against pursuing or even vigorously supporting this war. Contrarily, North Viet Nam's Army was gaining strength. They were importing modern weapons, especially through North Vietnam's Haiphong harbor – an area the US reportedly did not even target in bombing. Its army introduced new tanks, including more Chinese Type 58s; it was a new copy of the famous old World War II Soviet T-34. These later, modernized Chinese tanks, initially came with an 85mm gun and with either a 500 or 520 hp engine.



The original T-34 of the late 1930s was equipped with a 45mm gun but that was soon upgraded

during WWII to a 76.2mm version to be more competitive with German panzer tanks. During the early

1940s, it was often considered the most practical, overl best tank of WWII. Toward the end of that war

and/or shortly thereafter the T-34 gun was again replaced by an 85mm weapon.

As the U.S. backing for the war further declined, South Viet Nam's Army began collapsing. Finally, on April 30, 1975, the Viet Cong captured Saigon, arriving there with tanks, claiming a war victory. Tanks, nevertheless, did not have the decisive nor a predominant role during this conflict. Loss of popular South Vietnamese and our US public support at home and on the battlefield played a more finalizing aspect

After this war there were continued conflicts in the region, especially in Cambodia and near China. Tanks were utilized during those subsequent years. The Vietnamese Army employed a variety of Soviet and Chinese tanks. Some older versions were improved gradually with better guns, fire control, engines, stabilizers, and computer systems.


