



## FROM THE PRESIDENT, MARK KUBANCIK

Affordability. It's the new political buzzword. One side talks about rising costs, hoping to gain political favor. The other side attempts to point out actions they have taken or would like to take to bring down the cost of living. Regardless

of where you line up, pretty sure we all agree the cost of many things has increased, and some significantly, in the past few years. KYANA is not immune to this

discussion.

If you attended January's Business Meeting, you heard Region Treasurer Shawn McDonald and me mention that the Region board will be exploring a dues increase to take effect for 2027. At the January board meeting, we asked Chester how long Region dues have been \$10. Chester joined KYANA in 1980, and to the best of his recollection, dues have remained unchanged at \$10 since at least 1986. That's 40 years ago, and that \$10 in 1986 is worth only \$3.38 today. Needless to say, \$3.38 per family does not go very far today, regardless of how much we grow year over year.

The Region board has worked hard to control costs while still creatively supporting a full calendar of events. Again, referring to Fred Trusty's presentation at the Business

Meeting, the Region cannot simply help itself to the revenue generated by the Swap Meet or the proceeds from KYANA Charities' investment income. The IRS would frown upon such behavior. That said, we work closely with the boards of Charties and KYSWAP to support our social calendar while abiding by government regulations. The board will discuss a dues increase over the next several months and make a decision before the fall dues collection period. Meanwhile, let me or any other of the region board members know what you think. We want to know your thoughts. We want to hear from you.

Another hot topic in our hobby these days is getting younger members involved. There is good news to share on this topic. Many of you know Reagan Lanum, the 18-year-

old IUS freshman who was recently elected to his first term on the Region board. If you do not know the back story

# DOBLE AUTOMOBILES

Enthusiasts have admired Doble automobiles for excellence, despite early models that were not perfected. Nevertheless, many vehicle experts say that some later versions equaled or exceeded the luxury and precision of Rolls-Royce, Duesenberg, and similar prestige brands. While high price and low volume production limited accessibility, experts agree that many Dobles contained advanced design. In varying quantities, they were made from 1909 until 1931.

Until about 1910, external combustion steam engines predominated in American vehicles. They were quiet, fast, and delivered lots of torque. However, the popularity of electric starters for internal combustion gasoline engines and oil discoveries in Pennsylvania and Texas rapidly caused a precipitous decline from steam power to gasoline fueled automobiles. Nevertheless, Abner, John, Warren, and William Doble (brothers) were successful at producing innovative steam cars. Between 1915 - 1925, Doble was said to be an inspiration for retaining steam as a vehicular power source and commercial product. They had fine engineering, nevertheless, external combustion steam engines faded from the market and similarly ended the Doble brand.

Doble became famous for quick steam production start-ups. Lots of folks wonder how they

accomplished drivability by making enough steam within 90 seconds. First, Doble used a convenient key-operated ignition system that sent an electronic impulse to a spark plug that lit a fan-propelled kerosene-droplet-mist fire without other driver action required. Then, a flame in a wellinsulated heat-exchange steam generator heated small metal tubes filled with flowing water quickly getting to boiling temperature. That promptly made the water hot enough for steam pressure to start the car and maintain power while driving. Dobles did not need a person to light a boiler fire or to wait long until there was high steam pressure. Some other steam vehicles had big boilers needing a fire to be hand-started and then had large volume water tanks that were slow to get the water hot enough to boil for steam generation.

People are also curious about how Dobles managed to go long distances without needing a water refill. The front-mounted, radiator look-alike, was a water vapor condenser. Without venting steam exhaust, steam was routed to this condenser for cooling back into liquid water and be recirculated. That diminished water loss and extended the milage until a refill was required.

The first Doble emerged between 1906-1909 by rebuilding a White Motor steam car in Waltham, MA. About five Model A versions were built. By 1915, the Doble brothers improved their automotive designs. Their Model B was high torque and quiet, but it was only an experimental adaptation - not for sale. Moving to Detroit with this car, they established the General Engineering Company

and produced a Detroit Doble, the Model C. It was the first to utilize the advanced steam systems that later made Doble famous (electric fire starter, quick steam production, and water conservation). For chassis balance, the boiler and condenser were up front, engine in the back driving the axel without need for a transmission, and it had rear wheel drum brakes. These cars were fast and easy to drive.

In 1918, Doble got acclaim, ownership requests, and some down-payment money after a 1917 New York Motor Show. However, few cars were built, and they were still mechanically substandard. World War I also inhibited production, but Doble built some British designed military tanks. Their steam engines also powered tanks made by other manufacturers. Conflict arose between the brothers; John perfected boiler function but sued Abner and died of cancer in 1921.

The other three brothers moved to Emeryville, CA and established Doble Steam Motors where they further up-graded their car's power and reliability. The Model D emerged as a major redesign with a two-cylinder compound engine, improved/more-insulated kerosene-fired burners, better efficiency at air-water-steam flow passages, and added driver controls. Only about five were fabricated; yet this resulted in the celebrated Doble design. These cars reportedly could approach 120 mph.

Less than 50 (?) Model E Dobles were marketed by the mid-1920s; they are the most remembered, still existent versions. They evidenced refinements, ran quietly, and came in several car body-types. It utilized dual 2-cylinder engines to double

the power and could burn different liquid fuels. They were said to be able to go 1,500 miles without refilling their 24-gallon water tank. One was owned by Howard Huges and exhibited in Jay Leno's collection; Abner Doble drove another one. Rarity and elegant engineering made these cars desirable, then and now.

Only seven Model F Dobles were built around 1930. Two were kept by Doble family members; one was exported to Germany for use by Herman Goering, but it was reportedly destroyed during World War II. The fate of several of these last Dobles remains unclear. Supposedly, these cars could attain 0-to-75 mph in 10 seconds. Despite modern engineering concepts, not too many Doble steam cars were ever built. Some of their engines ended up in buses, a locomotive, for a power plant, a truck, tractor, and a Buick.

Over-perfection at design, slow production, being so expensive, and then legal allegations of illegal stock trades, complicated the company's existence.

The brand headed toward bankruptcy. A less costly car, the Simplex, was introduced, but only few were produced.

The remaining brothers began to pursue other interests. The Doble company officially closed in 1931.
