

THREE of the EARLIEST AMERICAN CARS by Steve Lippmann

A French Cugnot steam-drive, carriage of 1771, might have been the world's first powered vehicle. In the 1800s, there were many developments toward making automobiles —initially often by adapting self-propelled bicycles. Steam-powered boats had emerged in France in 1783. Bigger steamships followed using this new technology. Steamboat service by Robert Fulton's Clermont began on the Hudson River in 1807. Steam locomotives had already been greatly improved, powerful, and well established in the rapidly expanding railroads. Subsequently, many people hand-built 2-, 3-, 4-, or more-wheeled versions of selfpropelled conveyances. They used external-combustion steam engines, electric motors, or internal-combustion engines. In many countries, there were already numerous self-propelled bicycles, carriages, intercity buses, wagons, and the velocipede, a charcoal-fired steam bike.

Philadelphia's steam-dredge of 1805 is the first, well-known powered land vehicle in this country. Steam engines and electric motors were often selected for the propulsion of early vehicles. Besides gasoline, internal combustion engines in these early automotive days often used other fuels, including ethanol, kerosene, benzene, ammonia, and hydrogen gas.

(interesting nowadays again), coal gas, and coal dust (shared use of diesel came later). While many automotive factories and car shops emerged beginning in the late 1800s and very early 1900s, Duryea, Ford, and Olds are among the names most prominently associated with making the very earliest of these cars in the U.S.A.



In 1893, Charles and Frank Duryea built and drove their initial car on the roads of Springfield, MA. The brothers had

previously been bicycle-builders. They added an internal combustion gasoline engine to a second-hand, conventional horse-drawn buggy. It heralded Duryea vehicles as the first successful pistonengine automobiles in this country. By 1896, they started the Duryea Motor Wagon Company, which became America's first company to produce and market automobiles. They used a German design guidance from a Karl Benz 1886 patent description. These events generally marked the launch of the horseless carriage business, which then became a significant part of the future industry and society here and elsewhere.

Power was provided by a 4 horsepower, single cylinder engine fed by a spray carburetor. People in Massachusetts were excited about this vehicle. Thus, the Duryea Brothers demonstrated it at several exhibitions and raced it. It came in first place in the first-ever US automobile race in 1895 and continued racing even in England. Subsequently, it was soon put into storage, where it reportedly stayed until 1920. The car was then given to the United States National Museum (of the Smithsonian

system). It was restored to its original condition in 1958 and is on display at the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, MI.

Apparently, the Duryea Motor Wagon Company manufactured about 15 copies of this car in Chicopee, MA by 1896. It is said that these Duryea cars were the most popular US vehicles of this era. Their initial 10 cars were reportedly the first sold in this country and were advertised in print media. They even produced an armored version and, by 1905, had made about 60 cars a year, many of them in Pennsylvania. However, Duryea ceased production in 1917; an initial attempt at a reemergence was not

successful.



In 1896, Henry Ford built his first automobile in Detroit. He was a kind of combination in ventor, engineer, and a mechanic. The

car was called the Quadricycle, and it was basically a wood frame with four spoked bicycle wheels having pneumatic tires and powered by a twocylinder, ethanol-internal combustion engine. Henry Ford reportedly had initially preferred alcohol as an automotive fuel. Output might have yielded 4 horsepower by a chain drive to the rear wheels and propel the car up to 20 miles per hour. A couple of years later he founded the Detroit Automobile Company, later the Henry Ford Company, and finally the Ford Motor Company by1903. With his mechanical expertise, he was and became an automotive icon in this

country and around the world.

A tiller steered the Quadricycle; the transmission had two forward speeds but no reverse. Seating was a buggy seat, and the fuel tank was underneath. There were no brakes, and a doorbell was the traffic warning system. Mr. Ford had been building and experimenting with this car for a long time, and he was an innovator in the horseless carriage era that lasted well beyond. Some mechanical problems with the ignition system compromised that first official trial run, but it was soon fixed for the drive back home.

This Quadricycle automobile is on display at the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, MI. Not satisfied with this version, Henry Ford rebuilt the Quadricycle into a better version over the next few months. Together with some associates, he replaced wooden parts with metal, added an engine cooling system, and attached more robust wheels. Much of the remaining Ford story is our common car history; their cars have retained a prominent automotive position ever since here and in many other countries.

In 1897, Ransom E. Olds began automotive marketing in Lansing, MI with the Olds Motor Vehicle Company. Merging with Olds Gas Engine Works resulted in Detroit's Olds Motor Works. Their automobiles were called Olds automobiles - then just "Oldsmobiles." They produced hundreds of cars by 1901 and were then the most numerous internal-combustion gasoline-powered vehicles in this country. John and Horace Dodge made transmissions and many other Oldsmobile automobile parts (and also for Ford).

In Spring 1901, the factory burned

down; the cars were ruined. Insurance funded the rebuilding and was aided by the Dodge brothers and Henry K. Leland for engine manufacture. The only undamaged vehicle was a prototype of their future very successful automobile. That famous early Olds car was the Model R, also known as the Curved Dash Oldsmobile. Between 1902 - 1907, on their famous assembly line, the Curve Dash was the first car type to be mass-produced; Mr. Olds learned this production technique from Chicago meat-packing facilities (Henry Ford greatly improved the process in 1913, with the moving assembly line). The 1905 hit song "In My Merry Oldsmobile" popularized this car, so much so that Oldsmobiles were number one in US auto sales.

ight up Touisville The initial Curved Dash had a midchassis-mounted, one-cylinder, 5-horsepower water-cooled engine with a gravity-fed brass carburetor. It was a two-seater, tiller-steered, with a two-speed transmission and a reverse gear. A better two-cylinder engine, cooling system, and brakes were added over time. Production peaked at 19,000 vehicles. Disputes over quality control in 1904 led Mr. Olds to leave the firm and found the REO Motor Car Company. The last Curved Dash automobile was made in 1907. Oldsmobiles remained a popular brand, but the manufacturer ceased operations in 2004.
