



FROM THE PRESIDENT, MARK KUBANCIK



Happy Anniversary, KYANA! I was reading the letters to the editor in the current AACA magazine, *Antique Automobile*, and read about another region congratulating itself on achieving 70 years of existence. I paused and thought about KYANA and when we began. A quick text to Fred Trusty confirmed my recollection that KYANA formed in 1956, making this our 70th year of existence. Thanks to those who came before us and formed the club, grew the club, started and grew a swap meet, purchased our KYANA home, and wisely managed our finances, KYANA is stronger than ever! In just the past few years, the club was restructured to ensure long-term viability, we started a successful fundraising annual car show, and we added many active new members. The future of KYANA is bright, proving that despite our focus on the past, we can still adapt to the changes 70 years of existence and beyond bring to our door.

Last month, my President's message and the board minutes highlighted our focus on the future and financial viability regarding a dues increase. I shared that dues

have remained unchanged at \$10 per family per year since 1986. Since that time, the value of that \$10 has declined by two-thirds, while costs have continued to rise. Feedback from membership was requested, and the only two comments received were supportive of the board's action. In the board minutes from February's meeting, you will read that following a discussion on the topic, including the need to abide by the club's bylaws, a motion was made and unanimously accepted to increase dues in 2027 to \$25. This increase will allow the Region to sponsor a few more events and cease the continuous solicitation of support from our sister clubs.

Why did the board take action so swiftly? Article VI – Dues, Section 1 of the Region bylaws states the following: The amount of dues shall be determined by majority vote of the Executive Board. If the amount of dues is changed, said change must be ratified by a vote of the general membership. Lately, due to increased membership, it has been a challenge to achieve a quorum at all our general membership meetings and activities. Knowing that the Swap Meet Planning Meeting is one of our better-attended events, the board agreed to take action on the dues increase so that a vote can be taken at the March 1 planning meeting. Assuming the increase is ratified, we plan to implement the dues increase in October when we begin collecting 2027 dues.

Besides the dues vote, the Swap

Meet Planning Meeting will be important for several reasons, including learning about all the changes at the KEC just since last year, and for registering to work for one of the Swap Meet chairpersons. Please plan to attend this important meeting.

As we move ever closer to spring, we are beginning to see some outdoor events on the KYANA

calendar. The Easter Egg Hunt returns on March 28, and I'm pleased to announce that the Salvage Yard Tour returns April 4 with a new yard in southern Indiana that we have never visited. KYANA Cars & Coffee returns for the season on April 18, along with the rescheduled World of Wheels. Details on all these activities can be found in the following pages of this Sidelight.

Remember, it is supposed to be fun!

If you have ridden down I-65 and had a chance to look over at the Kentucky Fairgrounds, you can see that things are changing...

FAST! The KYANA Swap Meet knew it was coming, and the reality is, it is happening now. The new building is currently being built right over one of the buildings we've been using for 30 years.

The construction has some immediate effects on this year's Swap Meet: fewer overhead doors for vendors to get in and out, fewer ticket booths, and fewer parking passes for our workers. That said, the KYANA Swap Meet committee chairs are working with these new circumstances and have created a plan to get vendors in and out as efficiently as possible. Additionally, they are working with the Kentucky Fairgrounds management every week to stay on top of any changes or adjustments we may need to make due to the evolving circumstances posed by the construction.

We will have 3 overhead doors

this year. The main door is W-5, where about 900 vendors will come in AND out on set-up day. This seems like an impossible task, but with your help, we can get our vendors in and out on time. Plans are in place to have ticket sellers available first thing Saturday morning to handle the rush. We will be selling tickets outside, weather permitting, on Saturday morning. If you have never volunteered before, we need you! New members, old members, we need you all, and it is an expectation that you will be able to contribute 4 hours at some point during the four days to help make the Swap Meet successful. We are all going to be operating in new territory this year, and we desperately need everyone's help! Please make plans to work Thursday/Friday/Saturday or Sunday (or all). There are shifts available on all days and even some on Saturday night!

Come to the meeting at the clubhouse on Sunday, March 1st, and sign up for a shift. It is too late to get a meal, but we still need to see you and get your help!

The two functions with the most need are admission sales at entry doors and security monitoring at the remaining entrance and exit doors at the KEC. We again will be seeking volunteers to work both admission sales and door security at the Swap Meet.

Admission sales have a variety of shifts available Friday afternoon, all day Saturday, and Sunday morning. **Joanna Miller** will again be scheduling volunteers for admission sales. I'm pleased to announce that we will be visiting a new-to-KYANA yard near North Vernon, Indiana. KYANA members Ray Hayes, Rob Johnson and I made a scouting visit on February 18th and met with the yard owner. He allows everyone to roam the 36 acre yard and remove any parts they wish to purchase. Photos from our scouting trip will be shared on the "big screen" at the Swap Meet Planning meeting on Sunday, March 1.

Meeting Location – Please plan to meet at the Memphis, Indiana McDonalds located at 13615 Blue Lick Rd, Memphis, IN 47143. This McDonalds is part of the Loves Travel Stop at the Memphis exit 16 of I-65N. We will gather at McDonalds at 8:00 a.m. and depart for the salvage yard at 8:30 a.m. There is ample parking at the truck stop so we again encourage you to carpool with fellow members as parking at the salvage yard is limited. We will be traveling I-65N to Seymour, then traveling US-50 east, then turning north to the yard. Note: If you attended last year's salvage yard tour, this is the same meeting location.

Lunch Details – Lunch is optional on the salvage yard tour, though highly recommended as a fun way to conclude the day's events. We will be dining as a group at NV China Buffet in North Vernon, IN. This is an Asian buffet with traditional Asian favorites, sushi, and select American choices. Dessert and a soft drink is included. Should you

choose to dine, please plan to mail your check or pay me \$8.00 before or the day of the tour. Cash or check payable to KYANA accepted.

Directions – I'll bring complete directions with GPS addresses to our meeting location on the morning of the tour. The route is not complicated and runs mostly on US or state roads.

Preparation - Most salvage yards in early spring can be very wet, muddy, messy places, and this yard is no exception. Please plan accordingly, dress in old clothes, and wear boots or footwear appropriate for muddy and dirty conditions. You may want to bring a change of shoes to wear on the return trip. Other suggested attire includes gloves and rugged pants to battle the briar bushes. Bring your own tools if you plan to remove any parts. Finally, several cows roam one part of the yard, so watching where you step is recommended!

The KYANA salvage yard tour is always a fun event so hopefully many of you will be able to attend. Guests are always welcome! SURFACE CARBURETORS: ONE EARLY TYPE

History: We know little about the very first carburetors. Probably, the earliest carburetors began emerging by the 1700s. They gradually improved over time, and in the 1820s, they initially included various ways to mix turpentine vapor with air sucked into engines by vacuum pressure. Mechanical folks all over the world then began building increasingly more sophisticated versions. Over time, alcohol, gasoline, and many other options served as different energy sources. The first documented internal combustion engine to use an actual carburetor was said to be in the Netherlands.

Development: In 1826, Samuel Morey famously registered a US patent for a so-called surface version or “surface carburetor”; it ran a two-cycle engine. Atomizer devices were developed later, about 1870. In Austria, in 1875, a carburetor-fed engine actually ran an automobile with an atomizer-type carburetor. More upgrading followed in many places, especially in Italy. By 1884, English inventors built the first recorded spray carburetors. With Bernoulli’s Principle, fuel was sprayed into an airstream for mixing. Each innovation in design used past products as a guide in developing the next generation of progress. In 1885, a German vaporizer design yielded more efficiency. Increasingly advanced ones were soon manufactured and are similar to the ones used in car

engines of the 1900s; these later carburetors were early float-type designs. They were copied from previous varieties, improved, and used the latest technology, and were patented in 1886 by Benz. His design, together teamed with Daimler and Maybach, developed what became the industry standard for many years.

Surface Carburetors: These were some of the very earliest carburetors, all during the early 1800s. They were initially derived from motorbike engines. Surface carburetors are an enclosed box-like, simple, metallic device mounted above a fuel tank; while unreliable and inefficient, evaporation was the way it made fuel available to mix with air to run a 2-or 4-cycle internal combustion engine. They worked and led to further technological development. These carburetor walls had several holes and a throttle control mechanism. The picture visually helps explain the mechanism.


A tube in one of the openings brought fuel up from the gas tank and immediately into the bottom of the carburetor, forming a liquid pool. A hole at the top pulled air in from outside and routed it downward, allowing it to bubble through the pooled fuel at the bottom. Air mixed with fuel vapors then emerged into the upper region of the carburetor. In the middle between them was a partially covering surface plate; it adjusted

to the level of the fuel fluid beneath it and was open enough to allow evaporative fuel fumes, now with air, to accumulate above the plate. A wick in the fuel was added in some versions to augment evaporation/air exposure. Also, there was an outwardly directed pipe above the plate that transmitted the air/fuel mixture to the engine.

As the engine started, it created suction - drawing vaporized fuel with air into the engine to provide combustion in a cylinder. The vacuum created thus increasingly sucked more fuel from the tank into the carburetor bottom, drew in atmospheric air, and pulled the now homogeneous aerosol mixture into the engine for combustion. A manual air throttle control on the top of surface carburetors could regulate the flow velocities and alter the engine rpm speed. It worked by adjusting the richness of the fuel/air mix fed into the engine.

As the engine heated, it warmed the carburetor, increased the air inlet velocity, also the fuel entry stream, and augmented the

supply of the combustible vapor mixture continually flowing to keep the engine running. Heat also greatly increases the speed and degree of fuel evaporation. Some versions mounted means to pass hot exhaust near or at these mechanisms for higher temperatures (... maybe not the



fire-hazard safest design?).

Nevertheless, surface carburetors did allow engines to function and were a step toward better, more modern techniques. A later generation of carburetors are the ones most popular in our lifetimes.

KYANA BYLAW UPDATE

Following bylaw procedure, the language below regarding 50-year KYANA life membership was posted in the Sidelight for three consecutive issues in 2025. With a suitable quorum of voting members present at the November 2025 Awards & Elections meeting, a vote was taken to update the bylaws and add this language to the bylaws. There were no dissenting votes, and the updated bylaws will appear in

the next edition of the KYANA roster scheduled for completion in the first quarter of 2027.

Section 6... Lifetime Membership: Any member who achieves 50 years of continuous membership will be designated as a KYANA Lifetime Member. KYANA dues for such lifetime members will be waived in years 51 and thereafter.
