TANKS OF WORLD WAR ONE (and some of their current legacy)

Tanks first emerged on battlefronts during World War I. They were the earliest, modern form of armored vehicle, as an innovation to overcome the disastrously high, attritional-death-rate trench-warfare that was static on the Western Front. The intent was to provide crew protection, deliver more firepower, overwhelm enemy troops, and traverse inhospitable terrain. The first tanks were unreliable and cumbersome. While yielding small arms or shrapnel safety, they were vulnerable to war-related artillery, mortar fire, and even machine guns; yet, they were improved over time during the fighting. How did it all get started? Soldiers have sought protection from their enemies since the beginning of time (e.g., using shields or wearing armor, etc.). By the 1800s wheeled, steam-powered tractors were equipped with guns, but they were not too successful. By the very early 1900s so-called "Chain—tracked" tractors were being developed. Armies all over the world were experimenting with armored car-like vehicles even before WW I; the French army was one of the earliest to mount a canon on them. These did fine on roads but not well on soft or wet areas and at crossing obstacles. Several countries experimented with heavily armored gun tractors, but the initial versions were too slow and not effective.

Prototypes of steam and other power source armor-protected tractors were increasingly being tested. By 1911, British and French engineers began copying a caterpillar-tracked tractor observed in Belgium. One Austro-Hungarian Army version included a main gun mounted in a rotating turret. Over time these developments later led to the first more practical tanks that were heavily armored, powerfully cannon-equipped, and could drive across difficult grounds.

Already, in 1914-1915, Great Britain experimented with tank prototypes The British Army is credited with being the first to field their initial introduction into military conflicts. They were called "tanks" to keep their production secret; workers initially were told that they were "mobile water tanks" for desert warfare. In 1916, a practical version, the Mark I, was battlefield-tested by the British Army. In addition to two side-mounted main guns, they had two machine-gunned versions. Its long rhomboid-caterpillar track-all-around shape, theoretically allowed it to cross trenches or counter obstacles. Transportation from Britain to France was shrouded in secrecy.

Too quickly rushed into the Battle of the Somme, many of these tanks were not usable; only nine out of 49 reached a tactical advantage. British authorities admitted that they were unreliable, sluggish, often got stuck, but did negotiate terrain with trenches and some reached defended German lines. Nevertheless, they yielded no strategic breakthrough.

Winston Churchill was instrumental during WW I at encouraging more upgraded models; that trend has continued well-beyond, up to the present day. He advocated for an armored troop transporter for the Royal Navy. The Mark IV version was Britain's most successful WW I tank and hundreds of them were entered in combat. Reportedly, its first battle-tested application initially induced

panic among German soldiers. Military use of tanks then began to revolutionize ground warfare; their design also led to the development of armored personnel carrier vehicles.

France developed their first tanks in 1917, called Saint-Chamond or Schneider; they were suboptimal in mobility as armed fighting vehicles, especially limited at trench-crossing. Their 75mmgun, however, was the most powerful vehicle-mounted antitank weapon operational for the next couple of

decades. These two tanks were replaced by

a better-designed, Renault – a light tank. Also tracked, it was considered to be the first modern tank, with an armament-mounted, fully rotating gun-turret (360°), rear engine, and was smaller, thus more mobile. They fabricated more of these tanks than all other nations combined. A fourth tank, the Char (French for = tank) 2C,



the was produced too late in that war to participate much in the conflict. French manufacture of armored vehicle expertise continued well into the 1930s.

Germany was late at utilizing tank technology, but in 1917, they introduced their so-called



Sturmpanzerwagen (German for = storm tank vehicle). It had one cannon, eight machine guns, but was only produced in very small volume. Not having many tanks themselves but being assaulted by British and French versions, the German army instead fielded a purpose-made, effective antitank rifle with powerful impact. After having lost WW I, the German engineering industry began developing new, outstanding tanks with excellent designs. Called

panzers, they evidenced improved fighting capacity, especially early in WW II and also some very famous, powerful examples near the end of that conflict (e.g., Panthers and Tigers). Early estimates about tank usage effectiveness in WWI ended up being militarily exaggerated. Function was globally inadequate tactically and crew safety was grossly deficient with dangerously poor ventilation and way too thin armor. Being slow they were also vulnerable to grenade attacks by infantrymen. Field commanders were often more familiar with horse cavalry tactics than with appropriate ways of committing armor to battle. Tanks did not have a strategic impact on the WWI outcome; their value was recognized and then augmented much more after that war.

During World War II tanks had a major role in fighting. For all armies, these machines were much more effective. German blitzkrieg techniques utilized tanks to great advantage early in WWII. Massive tank battles were fought in North Africa and on the Eastern and Western fronts later in this war, with many thousands of heavy armored vehicles participations, and also huge losses by both sides.

Tank warfare remained common in subsequent wars, most famously in the Middle East and Asia. They have also been used in non-combat, civilian rebellion suppression, and at crowd control. Much like during the Vietnam and Afghanistan Wars, the advent of powerful ammunition and precision-guided anti-tank missiles, the supremacy of tank deployment has gradually diminished. The introduction of drone warfare nowadays has further and very dramatically limited the utility of tanks. In fact, while tanks – propagandized as "game-changers" – and utilized a lot in the ongoing Russia War, they have not yielded a decisive effect. Even the most expensive, modern well-equipped, and heavily armored current types are devastatingly vulnerable to low-cost drone attack. The future role of tanks remains unknown.




