What are some of the things you do at church here?


At present I am an elder in law Parish Church. Last year attending regular Board and Kirk Session meetings via zoom. Now we are able to meet in person.

I would invite someone to come along to Law Parish Church, to experience God's love for us, to experience the support and friendship our church gives.


What do you think the challenges are for church in these times?

an update on our building renovation

In November the General Trustees granted the congregation permission to reshape the sanctuary and entrance of the church.

What changes are coming? next year the sanctuary will have:

- replacement windows
- · new lighting
- replacement seating
- new flooring
- new audio/visuals
- repositioning the entrance to where the door that's blocked now is.
- a new vestibule.
- redecoration

We have quotations for pretty much all the work and will be seeking to try and find grants/match funding in the near future too.

With the radical changes that are coming to the church of Scotland nationally, churches will have to show that they are the right kind of space in the right place if the buildings are to have a future.

The steps we are making to modernize the sanctuary will ensure that LPC is in the best position to remain a worshipping congregation serving its community.

The presbytery of Lanark comes to an end as of 1
January 2022 after over 460 odd years. At that point I will also cease to be the depute clerk for the presbytery (phew).

The new presbytery will be made up from Hamilton, Falkirk and Lanark presbyteries. I am one of the 3 people from Lanark presbytery making up a quorum of 9, forming the mission planning group. The task of this group is to bring a new presbytery plan together by December 2022.

This will be a huge undertaking given there are something like 106 congregations to work with. There will be much more information on this to follow, not least what it ill mean for

As of the end of January I will be stepping down as interim Moderator of Douglas parish church, and no longer covering their pastoral care. Once again as a Kirk session we would like to thank everyone who has been helping the church to retain a space here in the village where grace can happen in worship and care.
