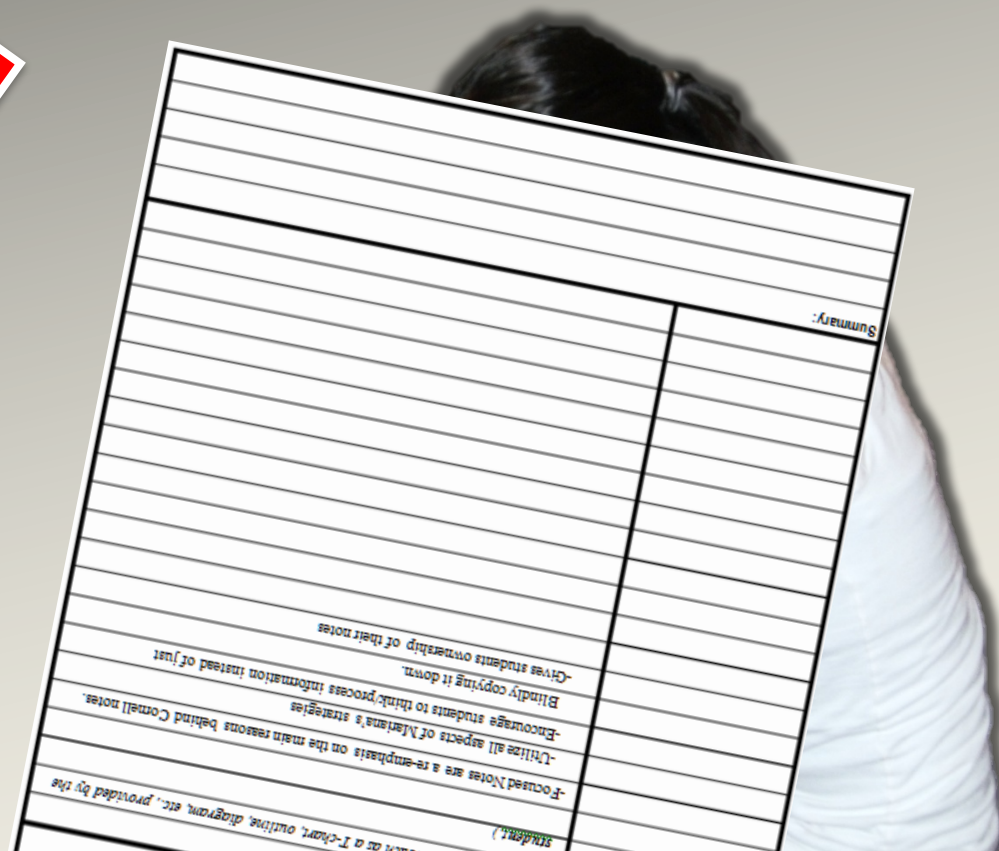

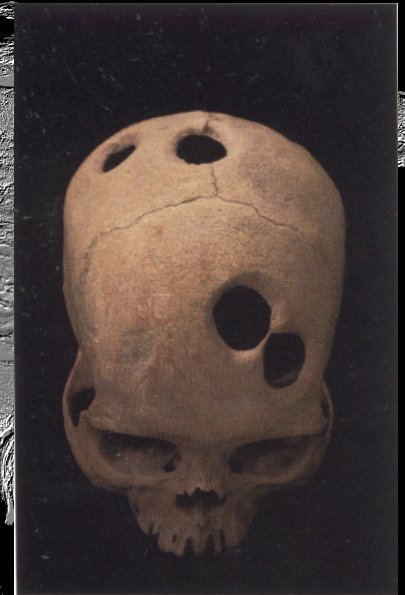
Achievements

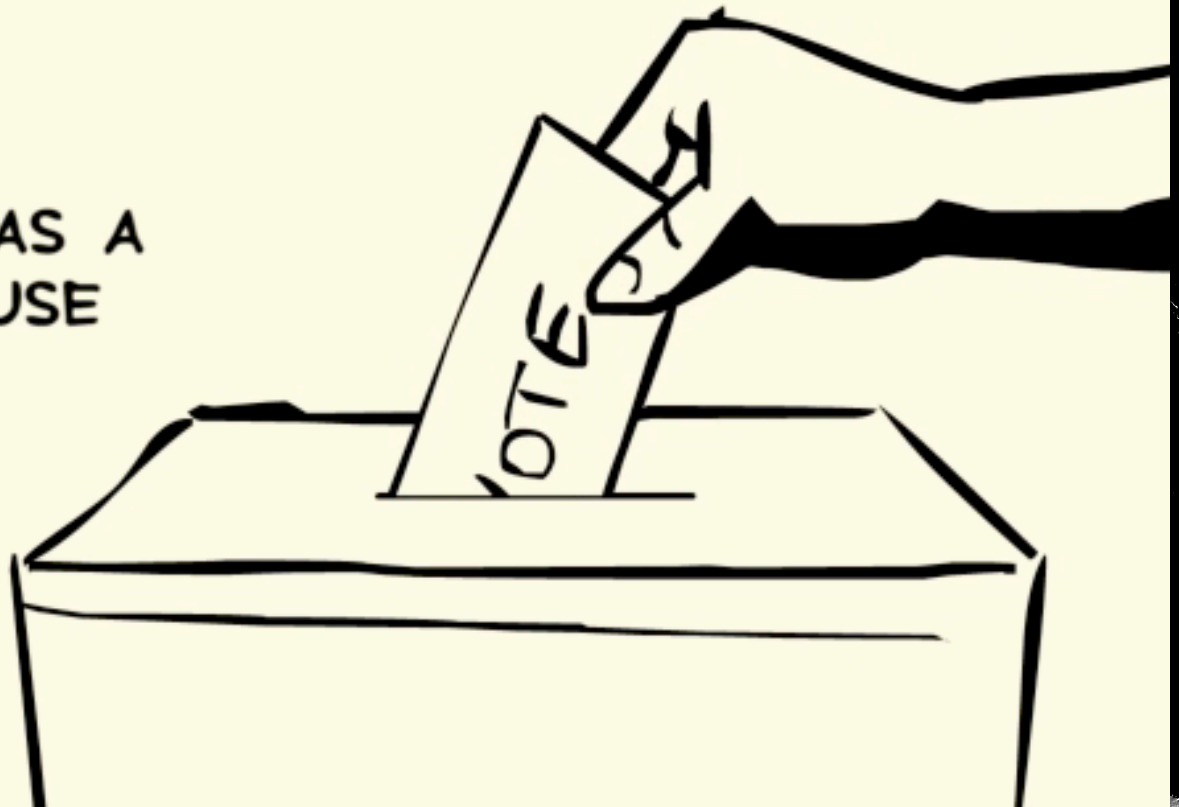

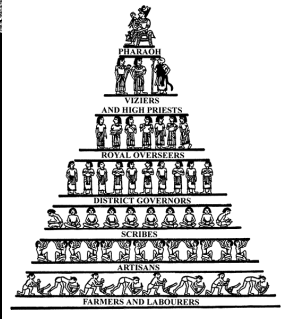

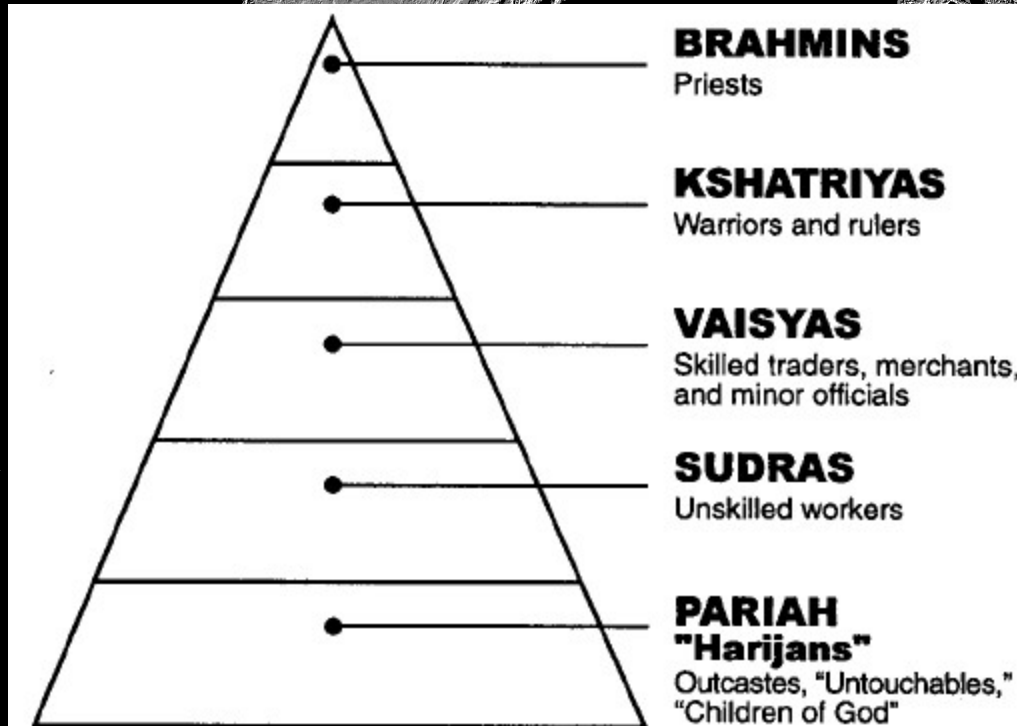
Social Structure
