A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

relating to the medical use of low-THC cannabis under and the administration of the Texas Compassionate-Use Program; requiring registration.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Section 487.053(a), Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) The department shall:

(1) issue or renew a license to operate as a dispensing organization to each applicant who satisfies the requirements established under this chapter; and

(2) register directors, owners, managers, members, and employees of each dispensing organization.

SECTION 2. Section 487.054, Health and Safety Code, is amended by adding Subsections (c) and (d) to read as follows:

(c) Information within the registry regarding patient identification, including the fact that a person is listed as a patient in the registry, is confidential and may only be accessed by the department, registered physicians, and dispensing organizations for the purposes of this chapter. Confidential information under this subsection may not be disclosed except as authorized under this chapter and is not subject to disclosure under Chapter 552, Government Code.

(d) Notwithstanding Subsection (c), on request by a

1 patient, the department may release patient information contained
2 in the registry to the patient or a person designated by the
3 patient.

4 SECTION 3. Section 487.101, Health and Safety Code, is
5 amended to read as follows:

6 Sec. 487.101. LICENSE REQUIRED. (a) A license issued by the
7 department under this chapter is required to operate a dispensing
8 organization.

9 (b) A dispensing organization licensed under this chapter
10 is not required to apply for an additional license for the use of a
11 satellite location for secure storage of low-THC cannabis if:

12 (1) the address of the satellite location was included
13 in the application; or

14 (2) the dispensing organization obtains approval from
15 the department under Section 487.1035.

16 SECTION 4. Section 487.102, Health and Safety Code, is
17 amended to read as follows:

18 Sec. 487.102. ELIGIBILITY FOR LICENSE. An applicant for a
19 license to operate as a dispensing organization is eligible for the
20 license if:

21 (1) as determined by the department, the applicant
22 possesses:

23 (A) the technical and technological ability to
24 cultivate and produce low-THC cannabis;

25 (B) the ability to secure:

26 (i) the resources and personnel necessary
27 to operate as a dispensing organization; and

1 (ii) premises reasonably located to allow
2 patients listed on the compassionate-use registry access to the
3 organization through existing infrastructure;

4 (C) the ability to maintain accountability for
5 the raw materials, the finished product, and any by-products used
6 or produced in the cultivation or production of low-THC cannabis to
7 prevent unlawful access to or unlawful diversion or possession of
8 those materials, products, or by-products; and

9 (D) the financial ability to maintain operations
10 for not less than two years from the date of application;

11 (2) each director, owner, manager, member, or employee
12 of the applicant is registered under Subchapter D; and

13 (3) the applicant satisfies any additional criteria
14 determined by the director to be necessary to safely implement this
15 chapter.

16 SECTION 5. Section 487.103(b), Health and Safety Code, is
17 amended to read as follows:

18 (b) The application must include:

19 (1) the name and address of the applicant;

20 (2) [7] the name and address of each of the applicant's
21 directors, owners, managers, members, and employees;

22 (3) the address of any satellite location that will be
23 used by the applicant for secure storage of low-THC cannabis under
24 Section 487.1035; [7] and

25 (4) any other information considered necessary by the
26 department to determine the applicant's eligibility for the
27 license.

1 SECTION 6. Subchapter C, Chapter 487, Health and Safety
2 Code, is amended by adding Section 487.1035 to read as follows:

3 Sec. 487.1035. SATELLITE LOCATIONS. (a) A dispensing
4 organization licensed under this chapter may operate one or more
5 satellite locations in addition to the organization's primary
6 location to securely store low-THC cannabis for distribution.

7 (b) A satellite location must be approved by the department
8 before a dispensing organization may operate the location. A
9 dispensing organization may apply for approval in the form and
10 manner prescribed by the department.

11 (c) The department must act on an application submitted
12 under Subsection (b) not later than the 180th day after the date the
13 application is submitted to the department.

14 (d) The director shall adopt rules regarding the design and
15 security requirements for satellite locations.

16 (e) A dispensing organization may not operate more than one
17 satellite location in a public health region designated under
18 Section 121.007 until the dispensing organization operates one
19 satellite location in each public health region.

20 SECTION 7. Section 487.104, Health and Safety Code, is
21 amended by amending Subsection (b) and adding Subsections (b-1),
22 (d), (e), and (f) to read as follows:

23 (b) Except as provided by Subsection (b-1), if [~~if~~] the
24 department denies the issuance or renewal of a license under
25 Subsection (a), the applicant is entitled to a hearing. Chapter
26 2001, Government Code, applies to a proceeding under this section.

27 (b-1) If the department denies the issuance of a license

1 under this section to an applicant that has never held a license
2 under this section, the applicant is not entitled to a hearing.

3 (d) The department shall issue 11 licenses under this
4 section to dispensing organizations in this state provided that the
5 department receives applications from a sufficient number of
6 applicants meeting the requirements for eligibility under this
7 subchapter.

8 (e) The department shall issue and renew licenses under this
9 section in a manner that ensures adequate access to low-THC
10 cannabis for patients registered in the compassionate-use registry
11 in each public health region designated under Section 121.007.

12 (f) The director shall adopt rules to establish a timeline
13 for reviewing and taking action on an application submitted under
14 this section.

15 SECTION 8. Subchapter C, Chapter 487, Health and Safety
16 Code, is amended by adding Section 487.1045 to read as follows:

17 Sec. 487.1045. REQUIREMENT OF LICENSE HOLDER TO BEGIN AND
18 MAINTAIN OPERATIONS. (a) An applicant issued a license to operate a
19 dispensing organization must begin dispensing low-THC cannabis not
20 later than 24 months after the date the license is issued and
21 continue dispensing low-THC cannabis during the term of a license
22 issued under this subchapter.

23 (b) The director shall adopt rules to:

24 (1) monitor whether a dispensing organization is using
25 a license issued under this subchapter to dispense low-THC
26 cannabis; and

27 (2) revoke the license of a dispensing organization

1 that does not dispense low-THC cannabis within the time required by
2 this section or that discontinues dispensing low-THC cannabis
3 during the term of a license.

4 SECTION 9. Sections 487.105(a) and (b), Health and Safety
5 Code, are amended to read as follows:

6 (a) An applicant for the issuance or renewal of a license to
7 operate as a dispensing organization shall provide the department
8 with the applicant's name and the name of each of the applicant's
9 directors, owners, managers, members, and employees.

10 (b) Before a dispensing organization licensee hires a
11 manager or employee for the organization, the licensee must provide
12 the department with the name of the prospective manager or
13 employee. The licensee may not transfer the license to another
14 person before that prospective applicant and the applicant's
15 directors, owners, managers, members, and employees pass a criminal
16 history background check and are registered as required by
17 Subchapter D.

18 SECTION 10. Section 487.107, Health and Safety Code, is
19 amended by adding Subsection (c) to read as follows:

20 (c) A dispensing organization may not dispense to a person
21 low-THC cannabis in a package or container that contains more than a
22 total of 1.2 grams of tetrahydrocannabinols.

23 SECTION 11. Subchapter C, Chapter 487, Health and Safety
24 Code, is amended by adding Section 487.1071 to read as follows:

25 Sec. 487.1071. CANNABINOIDS ELIGIBLE FOR DISPENSING. (a)
26 In this section, "phytocannabinoid" means a chemical substance:

27 (1) created naturally by a plant of the species

Cannabis sativa L. that is separated from the plant by a mechanical or chemical extraction process;

(2) created naturally by a plant of the species Cannabis sativa L. that binds to or interacts with the cannabinoid receptors of the endocannabinoid system; or

(3) produced by decarboxylation from a naturally occurring cannabinoid acid without the use of a chemical catalyst.

(b) A dispensing organization may not dispense a low-THC cannabis product that contains a cannabinoid that is not a phytocannabinoid.

(c) A dispensing organization may not include in a product any naturally occurring chemical substance from the cannabis plant that is not a phytocannabinoid, unless the dispensing organization obtains approval from the department.

SECTION 12. Section 487.151(a), Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

(a) An individual who is a director, owner, manager, member, or employee of a dispensing organization must apply for and obtain a registration under this section.

SECTION 13. Section 487.201, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 487.201. COUNTIES AND MUNICIPALITIES MAY NOT PROHIBIT LOW-THC CANNABIS. A municipality, county, or other political subdivision may not enact, adopt, or enforce a rule, ordinance, order, resolution, or other regulation that prohibits the cultivation, production, storage, dispensing, or possession of low-THC cannabis, as authorized by this chapter.

1 SECTION 14. Section 169.001, Occupations Code, is amended
2 by adding Subdivisions (2) and (6) and amending Subdivisions (3),
3 (4), and (5) to read as follows:

4 (2) "Executive commissioner" means the executive
5 commissioner of the Health and Human Services Commission.

6 (3) "Low-THC cannabis" means the plant Cannabis sativa
7 L., and any part of that plant or any compound, manufacture, salt,
8 derivative, mixture, preparation, resin, or oil of that plant that
9 contains not more than:

10 (A) one percent by weight of
11 tetrahydrocannabinols in each dosage unit; or

12 (B) for tetrahydrocannabinol administered by
13 pulmonary inhalation, an amount of tetrahydrocannabinol equivalent
14 to the amount described by Paragraph (A), as prescribed by rule by
15 the executive commissioner.

16 (4) "Medical use" means the ingestion, absorption,
17 inhalation, or insertion by a means of administration other than by
18 smoking of a prescribed amount of low-THC cannabis by a person for
19 whom low-THC cannabis is prescribed under this chapter.

20 (5) "Smoking" means burning or igniting a substance
21 and inhaling the smoke. The term does not include inhaling a
22 medication or other substance that is otherwise aerosolized or
23 vaporized for administration by pulmonary inhalation.

24 (6) "Veteran" means a person who has served in:

25 (A) the army, navy, air force, coast guard, or
26 marine corps of the United States;

27 (B) the state military forces as defined by

1 Section 431.001, Government Code; or

2 (C) an auxiliary service of one of those branches
3 of the armed forces.

4 SECTION 15. Section 169.003, Occupations Code, is amended
5 to read as follows:

6 Sec. 169.003. PRESCRIPTION OF LOW-THC CANNABIS. (a) A
7 physician described by Section 169.002 may prescribe low-THC
8 cannabis to a patient if:

9 (1) the patient is a permanent resident of the state;

10 (2) the physician complies with the registration
11 requirements of Section 169.004; and

12 (3) the physician certifies to the department that:

13 (A) the patient:

14 (i) is diagnosed with:

15 (a) [~~(i)~~] epilepsy;

16 (b) [~~(ii)~~] a seizure disorder;

17 (c) [~~(iii)~~] multiple sclerosis;

18 (d) [~~(iv)~~] spasticity;

19 (e) [~~(v)~~] amyotrophic lateral
20 sclerosis;

21 (f) [~~(vi)~~] autism;

22 (g) [~~(vii)~~] cancer;

23 (h) [~~(viii)~~] an incurable
24 neurodegenerative disease;

25 (i) [~~(ix)~~] post-traumatic stress
26 disorder; [~~or~~]

27 (j) a condition that causes chronic

1 pain, for which a physician would otherwise prescribe an opioid;

2 (k) glaucoma;

3 (l) traumatic brain injury;

4 (m) spinal neuropathy;

5 (n) Crohn's disease or other
6 inflammatory bowel disease;

7 (o) degenerative disc disease;

8 (p) a terminal illness or a condition
9 for which a patient is receiving hospice or palliative care;

10 (q) [~~(x)~~] a medical condition that is
11 approved for a research program under Subchapter F, Chapter 487,
12 Health and Safety Code, and for which the patient is receiving
13 treatment under that program; or

14 (r) a medical condition designated by
15 the Department of State Health Services under Subsection (c); or

16 (ii) is an honorably discharged veteran who
17 would benefit from medical use to address a medical condition; and

18 (B) the physician determines the risk of the
19 medical use of low-THC cannabis by the patient is reasonable in
20 light of the potential benefit for the patient.

21 (b) Each prescription issued by a physician to a patient for
22 low-THC cannabis:

23 (1) may only provide for a 90-day supply of low-THC
24 cannabis based on the dosage prescribed to the patient; and

25 (2) may provide up to four refills of a 90-day supply
26 of low-THC cannabis.

27 (c) The Department of State Health Services may designate

1 medical conditions for which a physician may prescribe low-THC
2 cannabis under this section. The executive commissioner shall
3 adopt rules for the approval of medical conditions under this
4 section.

5 (d) If a patient is diagnosed with a medical condition not
6 listed in Subsection (a)(3)(A)(i), a physician may submit to the
7 Department of State Health Services a request for the department to
8 designate the condition as a medical condition for which a
9 physician may prescribe low-THC cannabis under this section. The
10 request must be accompanied by medical evidence such as
11 peer-reviewed published research demonstrating that low-THC
12 cannabis may be beneficial to treat that medical condition. The
13 executive commissioner by rule shall prescribe the manner in which
14 a physician may submit a request under this subsection.

15 SECTION 16. Chapter 169, Occupations Code, is amended by
16 adding Section 169.006 to read as follows:

17 Sec. 169.006. ADMINISTRATION OF LOW-THC CANNABIS BY
18 PULMONARY INHALATION. (a) A physician may prescribe pulmonary
19 inhalation of an aerosol or vapor as a means of administration of
20 low-THC cannabis if the physician determines that based on the
21 patient's condition there is a medical necessity for that means of
22 administration.

23 (b) The executive commissioner shall adopt rules:

24 (1) related to medical devices for pulmonary
25 inhalation of low-THC cannabis; and

26 (2) establishing an amount of tetrahydrocannabinols
27 when administered by pulmonary inhalation that is medically

1 equivalent to other means of administering low-THC cannabis.

2 SECTION 17. Not later than October 1, 2025:

3 (1) the director of the Department of Public Safety
4 shall adopt the rules necessary to implement the changes in law made
5 by this Act to Chapter 487, Health and Safety Code; and

6 (2) the executive commissioner of the Health and Human
7 Services Commission shall adopt the rules necessary to implement
8 Section 169.003, Occupations Code, as amended by this Act, and
9 Section 169.006, Occupations Code, as added by this Act.

10 SECTION 18. This Act takes effect September 1, 2025.
