

Book Review and Launch: "Dementia in Prison: An Ethical Framework to Support Research, Practice and Prisoners" Professor Joanne Brooke, IAH Trustee, Director of Centre for Social Care, Health and Related Research and Director of International Dementia and Culture Collaborative, Birmingham City University

The book Dementia in Prison has been written for healthcare professionals, prison staff and all of those who support prisoners. This book is divided into three sections, which commences with an overview of healthcare services within prison settings and the need to develop these to support an aging prison population, followed by an exploration of both the human rights of prisoners with dementia, and ethical considerations of healthcare in the prison setting, including the current support for prisoners with dementia, alongside an overview of ethical processes to enable the development of further research to support older prisoners and those with dementia.

A final note from our Vice Chair, Professor Zoe Wyrko

Well, what a year 2020 has been, and I have to start by apologising for not being the sort of Vice-Chair I hoped to be! I was really excited to join the IAH, and George and I had a brilliant meeting with so many great ideas for the future..... but then COVID-19 hit us.

As a UHB geriatrician who works within the Emergency Department and Acute Medical Unit, as well as virtually with the ambulance service, it's been a rather busy year, and at times has been all hands to the deck, especially now it looks as if we are entering wave 3. But the vaccine is in the foreground now rather than just a distant dream, so maybe by next Christmas there will be a type of normal again?
