Staff would always try to make it fun, every time we came. They were really welcoming and it made me happy to be around people.

I liked that I was learning how to fix things. My little sister knew how to do these things, and my uncle works on cars, so it made me feel accomplished that I could do this. I like being independent. When it was time to learn how to fix a tire, some people in the class said I wouldn't be able to, because my acrylic nails would get in the way. I had to take the tire off and put it back on. It was taking so long, but I said to Ari, we can do this—and we did! I did break a nail, but I was so proud of myself.

Then I earned my bike. It was the bike of my dreams. It is a cruiser bike, pink and white. I had mostly seen mountain bikes in the bike shop, so when I saw this bike I knew it was the bike for me. The instructors told me it would be harder to go uphill, but I have always wanted a bike like this and I love riding my cruiser.

Erick and James asked me to join Youth Leadership. This semester, we are talking about our futures, and it's really helping me. This spring I plan to do Youth Leadership again, to learn how to make change in my community, for people who are in prison and also for Community Bike Works. I also want to work at Bike Works and help teach Earn a Bike. I just like the community here and I want to be a part of it. I want to change kids' days like Bike Works changes my days.

One bright spot this year has been our announcement that we plan to open a bike shop in the West Ward of Easton in 2021, allowing us to mentor young people across the Lehigh Valley. Because of you, students like Paris—from Allentown, Bethlehem, and Easton—will discover the thrill of refurbishing a bike of their own, the joy of riding, and the satisfaction of being part of something bigger than themselves.
