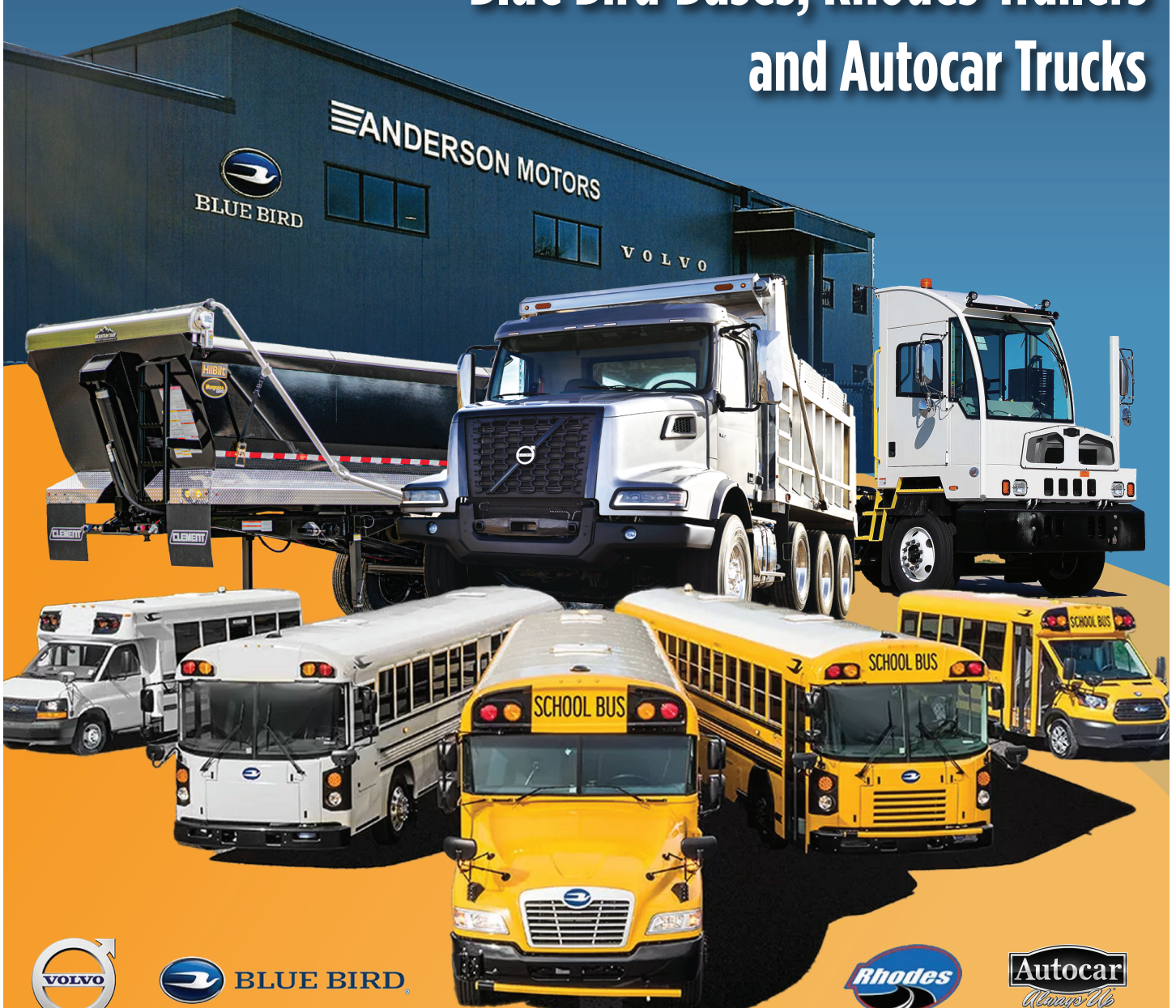

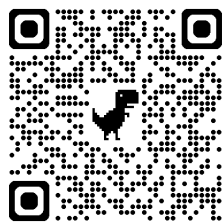
Dear Friends:

DISTINGUISHED AMERICAN AWARD

CARL RICCI



Carl Ricci, recipient of the 2026 Distinguished American Award, has built a life defined by excellence in academics, athletics, and public service, while maintaining a deep and lasting commitment to the Rhode Island community.

A 1991 graduate of La Salle Academy, Carl distinguished himself early as both a scholar and an athlete, finishing third in a class of 286 students. On the football field, he played under the guidance of Arthur Fiore and quickly established himself as one of the state's premier defensive players. As a linebacker, Carl earned All-State honors three times, a testament to his consistency, leadership, and impact on the game. His outstanding senior season was further recognized when

he was named a recipient of the prestigious Rhode Island Football Foundation Golden Dozen Award in 1991, honoring the top scholar-athletes in the state.

Carl continued his academic and athletic journey at Yale University, where he became one of the most accomplished defensive players in program history. A three-year starting linebacker, Carl remains third all-time in total tackles, a remarkable achievement in a program with a long and storied tradition. His leadership and respect among teammates were evident when he was named team captain in 1994—making him the only captain in Yale football history from the state of Rhode Island.

During his time at Yale, Carl's performance earned him numerous accolades. He was a two-time All-Ivy League selection, recognized as an All-New England player, and honored as an Academic All-American. Beyond his collegiate responsibilities, Carl also gave back to the sport by working at the Joe Namath Football Camp mentoring young athletes.

Following his graduation from Yale, Carl pursued a legal education at Boston University School of Law, where he developed the foundation for a distinguished career in law. He began his professional journey as a Special Assistant Attorney General with the Rhode Island Attorney General's Office, gaining valuable experience in public service and the justice system. He later joined the law firm of Wieck DeLuca & Gemma, where he continued to build his reputation as a skilled and dedicated attorney.

In 2015, Carl founded his own practice, focusing on criminal defense and civil rights law. Throughout his career, he has been a tireless advocate for justice, representing primarily indigent clients and ensuring that all individuals—regardless of means—receive fair and effective legal representation. His work reflects a deep commitment to protecting constitutional rights and serving those most in need. Carl is admitted to practice in both Rhode Island and Massachusetts and is also a member of the United States Supreme Court Bar, a distinction that underscores his professional accomplishments.

In addition to his legal career, Carl has remained actively involved in the community. He currently serves as an executive board member of the Providence Gridiron Club, supporting the advancement and recognition of football across the state. He is also a proud member of the Rhode Island Italian American Sports Hall of Fame, honoring his heritage and his contributions to athletics.

Carl Ricci's journey—from standout student-athlete to accomplished attorney and community leader—reflects a lifelong dedication to excellence, leadership, and service. His impact on the field, in the courtroom, and within the community makes him a truly deserving recipient of the 2026 Distinguished American Award.

EMO DINITTO CONTRIBUTION TO AMATEUR FOOTBALL AWARD BILL MCCAGNEY

Bill McCagney is the recipient of this year's Emo DiNitto Contribution to Amateur Football Award. He is a 1973 graduate of Barrington High School where he was a standout three-sport athlete. Bill competed in football, basketball, and baseball earning All-State honors in football twice (1972, 1973), was named Team MVP in 1973, and received All-League recognition in baseball in 1972 and 1973. He also served as captain of both the football and baseball teams in his senior year and achieved the rank of Eagle Scout in 1971.

Bill continued his academic and athletic career at the University of Rhode Island, where he attended on a full athletic scholarship and graduated in 1978. A four-year member of the varsity football team, he was a starting linebacker and three-year letterman. His accomplishments included two selections as Yankee Conference Defensive Player of the Week, All-Conference honors, and Team MVP recognition in his senior season. He also played rugby and later competed with the Providence Rugby Club (1978–1985), earning All-Northeast Regional honors twice and serving as team captain on two occasions. Committed to lifelong learning, he has completed thirty graduate-level courses and remains active in professional organizations, including the Rhode Island Football Coaches Association and the Providence Gridiron Club, where he Bill began his coaching career in multiple roles, including assistant positions at Barrington High School and Robinson High School in Tampa, Florida, and as head freshman baseball coach at Barrington, where his teams won league championships in 1978 and 1979 and a state title in 1978. He also served as a defensive coordinator at Roger Williams University and coached at New Bedford High School.

In 1990, Bill returned to Barrington High School as head football coach, a position he held for twenty-five years. During his tenure, he compiled a 187-109-2 record and built one of Rhode Island's most successful programs. His teams won seven outright league championships and two co-championships, appeared in ten Super Bowls, and captured five titles. He is the only coach in interscholastic league history to win Super Bowls in four different divisions, including Division 3 (1995), Division 2 (2003), Division 1AA (2004), and Division 1 (2005). He also led Division 1 championship teams in 2005 and 2009. In addition, he coached golf from 2004 to 2007, leading Barrington to three state championships, and oversaw the school's weight room program for more than two decades.

His contributions have earned numerous honors, including multiple Rhode Island High School Football Coach of the Year awards (1995, 1999, 2000, 2003, 2009), the Words Unlimited Schoolboy Coach of the Year Award in 2005, Providence Gridiron Club Coach of the Year in 2009, and the Larry Gilooly Humanitarian Award in 2017. He has been inducted into the Barrington High School Athletic Hall of Fame (2007), the Rhode Island High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame (2009), the Providence Gridiron Club Hall of Fame (2013), and the RIIL Hall of Fame (2019).

Beyond his coaching achievements, he has remained dedicated to supporting student-athletes and promoting the game of football across Rhode Island. Through his work with the Providence Gridiron Club, including visiting high school programs statewide and speaking at banquets, he has championed leadership, character, and participation. His enduring legacy is defined not only by wins and championships, but by his commitment to developing young people into responsible and impactful citizens.

Bill has been married to his wife Paula for forty-one years and they reside in Barrington. They have two daughters, Krista and Salina and their granddaughter Angelina.

FOOTBALL OFFICIAL AWARD JOHN ROSATO

John Rosato, a distinguished official and dedicated public servant, is the proud recipient of the 2026 Officials Award, honoring a lifetime of commitment to athletics, community, and professional excellence.

Born and raised in Boston, John graduated from Boston Trade and Technical High School in 1960. During his high school years, he was an active member of the hockey team for four years.

Following graduation, John attended the University of Massachusetts from 1960 to 1962, where he earned an Associate's degree in Food Services. Shortly thereafter, he answered the call to serve his country when he was drafted into the United States Army. During his two years of service, John trained as a medic in Texas before being deployed to Vietnam, where he served for one year providing critical medical care under challenging conditions.

After completing his military service, John continued his education at the University of Arizona, earning his bachelor's degree in Food Safety. In 1971, he began a long and impactful career with the State of Rhode Island, working in food safety inspection for thirty-five years until his retirement in 2006.

Parallel to his professional career, John built an extraordinary legacy in athletic officiating. He began officiating youth and high school football in 1972, dedicating thirty-three years to the sport. Over the course of his officiating career, he was selected to work numerous playoff games and Super Bowls, earning the respect of coaches, players, and fellow officials.

In addition to football, John contributed significantly to other sports. He served as a high school baseball umpire for 20 years before transitioning to high school lacrosse, where he officiated for an additional 26 years. His versatility and longevity across multiple sports highlight his deep passion for athletics and commitment to supporting student-athletes.

John has been married to his wife, Cynthia, for twenty years, and they currently reside in North Providence. Together, they are the proud parents of three children and three grandchildren, who continue to be a central part of their lives.

DEDICATION AWARD TO AMATEUR FOOTBALL JIM “JIMBO” ANDERSON

Jim “Jimbo” Anderson is the inaugural recipient of the Emo DiNitto/RI Chapter of the National Football Foundation’s Dedication to Amateur Football Award. A Rhode Island native, Jim has dedicated more than fifty years to the game of football as a player, coach, volunteer, sponsor, and—most importantly—a mentor to generations of student-athletes across the state. His lifelong passion for football began in his youth, influenced by his parents, Jack and Judy, founding members of the Barrington Pop Warner Football Association. Alongside his siblings, Jim grew up immersed in the sport, shaping a family legacy deeply rooted in football.

Jim graduated from Barrington High School in 1983 where he earned Division I First Team All-Division, Rhode Island High School Football Coaches Association All-State, and National High School Football Coaches Association Honorable Mention All-American honors as a middle linebacker. He continued his development at The Hotchkiss School, where he led the team to an undefeated 8–0 season, an Erickson League Championship, and All-New England honors.

Jim went on to attend Brown University, where he became a three-year varsity starter at offensive left guard. His collegiate achievements included Honorable Mention All-Ivy League honors, the Fritz Pollard Award, and the Providence Gridiron Club MVP Award. Following graduation, he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant under Head Coach John Rosenberg in 1989.

In 1990, Jim returned to Barrington High School, where he accepted a volunteer assistant coaching role—a position that would define his enduring impact on Rhode Island football. Over the last thirty-seven years, he has remained a constant presence on the sidelines, contributing to one of the most successful eras in the program’s history. During his tenure, Barrington has compiled a record of 245 wins, 170 losses, and 2 ties, while capturing 7 State Super Bowl Championships, making 12 championship appearances, winning 11 league titles, and earning 21 playoff berths across multiple divisions.

Jim’s contributions have been widely recognized. He was inducted into the Barrington High School Athletic Hall of Fame (2011), the Providence Gridiron Club Hall of Fame (2014), and the Rhode Island High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame (2018). In 2026, he was again honored as part of the Barrington High School Hall of Fame for his role as a volunteer coach on the 2005 championship team.

Beyond coaching, Jim has played a significant leadership role in the football community. He serves as Vice President of the Providence Gridiron Club, is a longtime member of the Brown University Football Association Board of Directors, a member of the Bryant University Football Black and Gold Club, and a founding member and current President of the Barrington Gridiron Club.

Off the field, Jim is part of the family-owned Anderson Motors, Inc., a Rhode Island-based heavy-duty truck and bus dealership established in 1961. The company has been a steadfast supporter of numerous athletic and community organizations throughout New England, including football programs and associations at the local, collegiate, and national levels.

While his accomplishments as a player and coach are impressive, Jim’s most lasting impact is his mentorship. For nearly four decades, he has guided student-athletes not only in football, but in life—instilling values such as teamwork, integrity, discipline, leadership, and self-confidence. Drawing inspiration from the poem “The Man in the Glass,” Jim has consistently encouraged young athletes to believe in themselves and uphold strong personal principles. His influence has shaped the character and futures of countless individuals, making mentorship the cornerstone of his legacy.

Jim and his wife Karen, of 25 years, have two children: James Jr., a student-athlete at Bryant University, and Primrose, a student at Providence College. They reside in Barrington, Rhode Island, where Jim’s impact on the community and the game of football continues to be felt.

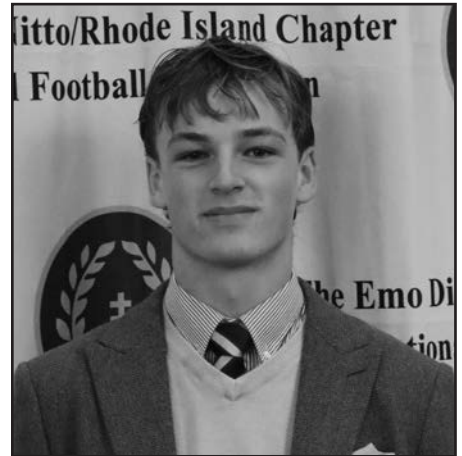

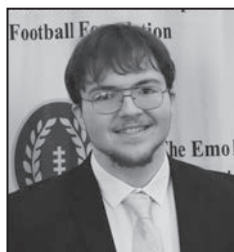

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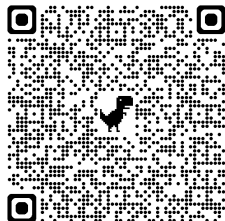
