

Attributes of Successful Recycling Programs

- 1. Recycling education programming (online and outreach)
- 2. Breadth of recycling options
- 3. Local policies that support diversion
- 4. Sufficient and dedicated funding (recycling program and education)
- 5. Participation among households and businesses
- 6. Local government leadership and capacity
- 7. Measurement systems

TOP 12 BEST PRACTICES FROM HIGH DIVERSION CITIES

 City Council adopted Green Sustainability Plan
Council establishment of Zero Waste goals and benchmarks with funding support

▷ Support of Highest and Best Use hierarchy

- ▷ Support regional cooperation with local communities
- ▷ Public / Private cooperative regional ventures

▷ Above 75% participation rate city wide, and above 75% material capture focus on residential sector

TOP 12 BEST PRACTICES FROM HIGH DIVERSION CITIES

Recycling & Composting Ordinance requiring access to recyclables and compostables collection
Green Building Code synergies coordinated through a regional Construction & Deconstruction Ordinance
City Government Construction Recycled Content
Ordinance requiring recycled content materials to be used in public works and improvement projects

TOP 12 BEST PRACTICES FROM HIGH DIVERSION CITIES

Recycling economic development focus to support local recycling infrastructure (e.g. local green jobs)
Local support for Remanufacturing Hub to host companies that reprocess locally generated recyclables, compostable, construction materials, reuse materials, etc.
Support of Research & Development in technologies (e.g. Design for recyclability)


Residential 18% diversion




Commercial 38% diversion rate




Industrial 73% diversion rate




Hamilton County Diversion



Percent of Waste Landfilled






Total U.S. MSW Landfilled by Material- 2015


Food Waste Composting Facilities in Ohio





Cincinnati Landfill Characterization


