The owners contacted HPS to take the horse realizing he was in need of more than what they knew how to provide for him.

The present people told us he had gained a lot of weight since he had been with them. The long hair hides the spine sticking up 3 inches and the ribs are easily felt, can you.....see Dalmatian page 2

This is a story of a crazy owner, a couple of innocent horses and their guardian angels. Meet Mancha and Salida ...Mancha is a leopard Appaloosa and Salida a sorrel Quarter Horse. We've only learned of the horses two days before the title was transferred to HPS. The guardian angels from the Humane Society had been working to save them for almost a year. The poor condition of the horses could easily be seen from the road. Last April the property was in foreclosure, and the owner moved out. Several of the neighbors, more guardian angels, started providing fresh water, feed and hay for the horses. They are the first to say, "We are not horse people" but even they knew that throwing dog food to the horses every 5 or 6 days was not right food that the owner's dogs and horses fought over. At one point he cut the horses off from their only water supply, a small yucky pond. Other folks, who knew about the situation, occasionally dropped off a bag of grain to help with the effort. Throughout the year the Humane Society repeatedly contacted the local Animal Control agency and the sheriff's office to get the horses some relief but nothing seemed to be happen-

ing Although, frustrated with the lack of action, they continued to care about the horses and then finally got a break of sorts. December 13, 2001 the foreclosure was finalized. Then another break came... they learned about the Horse Protection Society and immediately contacted Joanie. The bank was made aware of the horses and their situation. By default the bank was now the horses' owner since they had been left behind well over 30 days beyond the foreclosure. The bank made the smart decision to sign the horses over to HPS. The guardian angels were thrilled their relentless yearlong efforts had paid off!!

Now to get them moved from Lee County, half way across the state. Joanie knew the importance of getting them moved quickly as the crazy neighbor seemed to believe he still had some "ownership" of the horses. That's where I came into the picture...Joanie placed one of those calls to me that starts out "there are these two horses".....Well I agreed to help with moving the horses and was set to go ... unfortunately my truck wasn't quite as ready. I got as far as the sanctuary and knew I had a problem.....see Innocent Victims page 2

believe they were riding him. He would rate about a 2 on the Henneck rating scale. His appetite is good, and he is feeling better after the first week of care. It is our understanding that he was only wormed with a daily wormer for 60 days during the two years. Tonto will have to remain in confinement until his worming program can be completed over the next 3 weeks. Two treatments of Safe Guard and then ivermectin wormer should clean him out of the parasites. At that point he will be able to go on a normal worming program and be able to be with another horse. We may put Meadow Flower in with him until he recovers enough to go in with the other horses.

Tonto is quite the attraction, and folks are vying to brush and care for him. How wonderful to see a new fellow get this kind of interest. I think we need to paint spots on some of the other horses! He has very advanced grease-heel or scratches in the pastern area that we are treating with good athlete foot spray and liquid. If left untreated this can even cause lameness. The wet times of the year will cause this condition to flourish. It is believed to be caused by a fungus.

Tonto was on a Bartlet Senior feed. I don't think you could feed enough of this to take care of the nutritional needs of a horse. The First listed ingredient was "Grain by Products." What is this?.... ground up corn cobs??.... Oat hulls? The rest of the listed items did not sound much better. What are "Forage Products?" "Grain Products" were obvious what had been used in the feed, the very poorest whole oats! Why would anyone use whole oats in a senior feed? They are going to come right out the back end, which was exactly what was happening. I want the feed we use to read very differently than this. The manure from your horse should be inspected for proper digestion taking place. If you are finding undigested gain coming through your horse, you are throwing your money away. The horse is not getting any benefit from this. There are wonderful pelleted feeds on the market. It does not make sense to use sweet feed or products with whole gains. The information we have given the past owners should help them select better quality feed in the future for their horses and foals.



When we had first arrived one of the neighbors took us to meet the horses and the pair came over to us immediately. A testimony to the trust and respect they had developed for some of the guardian angels that had been providing them with feed and hay for many months. When it was time to go they let us put their halters on and headed out the pitiful pasture that they would never have to return to again. We were not sure what to expect when we asked them to load...turns out there was nothing to worry about! The horses acted like they loaded every other week...like pros. Mancha followed a bucket of feed right up into the trailer!! Then patiently waited to be secured. Salida waited outside wanting to get in the trailer NOW! With the horses tucked in we were ready to go. The guardian angels could not believe it was really happening. They gave us a send off that included a delicious chicken salad sandwich for the road! We had a nice quiet ride home. In fact at one of the gas stops Joanie did a head count to make sure they were still back there! Once at the ranch the horses were unloaded and put in the round pen where a fresh pile of hay immediately got their full attention. Soon new names to fit their new lives were being tossed out for a "horsy reaction"the horses do get a vote, you know!




