# A New Treatment Tried on a Severely Injured

Having seen so many different kinds of injuries over the years, we don't often encounter ones that stump us. However, recently this was the case with one of our mares, Midnight Sun. Her tail was pushed in and flattened so she couldn't move it and her rear end was swollen and distorted. We gave her some Bute, iced the injury and then called Dr. Lisa Busko, DVM and equine chiropractor.



Dr. Busko determined that Midnight had most likely jammed the sacral vertebrae in her lower back and the coccyx vertebrae in her tail, but without x-rays she couldn't determine if any vertebrae were broken, so she would not adjust her. We didn't feel it would be a good idea to try to take her to a special clinic far away for x-rays. This is not a horse that loads on a trailer, and we couldn't take the chance she would further injure herself. Dr. Busko suggested Cold Laser Therapy to help the inflammation and promote faster healing of the damaged tissues.

Cold Laser Therapy has been available for over 40 years and many studies conducted by doctors on their patients have shown it to reduce pain and inflammation without the dangerous side effects of drugs plus the

added benefit of quicker recuperation. A 1983 study done on racing Standardbreds with chronic bowed tendons showed that healing time could successfully be reduced from one year to 120 days.

Many of us are familiar with "hot" lasers that are used in surgery to cut and cauterize; "cold" lasers differ in that they stimulate tissue on the cellular level using light with short wavelengths, usually infrared, in the light spectrum. Photobio-stimulation is a natural part of everyday life and is necessary for melanin production, vitamin D synthesis, and viewing colors.

We agreed to allow Dr. Busko to treat Midnight with cold laser therapy and acupuncture that day. Midnight really enjoyed the cold laser session. She became very relaxed, dropped her head low and softly licked and chewed to show her satisfaction as the doctor moved the wand gently along her hips. Her muscles relaxed so much that she was pretty wobbly as she moved about her stall afterward.

The next morning we could see improvement in the swelling but Midnight was not going to have anything to do with the Bute, no matter how we tried to administer it, so no more Bute was given. Dr. Busko treated her again that day with cold laser therapy; two days later we could see a significant improvement. This is a treatment we will definitely use again!



Research has shown that cold lasers stimulate fibroblastic activity, tissue granulations and connective tissue projections which are necessary for healing of wounds, ulcers and inflammation. They also promote production of collagen and provide relief from pain by lowering sensitivity of nerves.

Midnight is now using other treatments for inflammation. We will wait about three months to allow any fractures she may have to heal. We hope that Dr. Busko will be able to safely begin chiropractic treatment on her at that time. In the meantime, please help Midnight through her treatment and recovery; she would greatly appreciate it.
