Brrr, It's Cold Out There!

The horses love the cold weather but we humans have to put on more and more layers to keep warm! The freezing weather also means more work each feeding.


So much extra care has to be taken at the sanctuary when the temperatures drop to freezing. All of the tubs need heaters to keep the water from freezing and all of them are plugged into GFI outlets to help keep the horses and volunteers safe. We usually have a couple go bad each winter so we try to ensure that extras are on hand.

Each hose that provides water to the tubs has to be disconnected and drained to prevent freezing. Our on-demand hot water heater is set up to drain if the correct valves are opened. Last winter someone forgot to drain it and it froze and was beyond repair. It cost us about \$500 to have it replaced. Hot water is needed to soak the alfalfa cubes for the horses that need them to provide higher protein for them. All older horses benefit from the soaked alfalfa cubes as well as any horse in rehab.



The higher protein helps them to put on muscle and the older ones to keep the muscle they have developed. All the feed buckets have to be washed and dried after each feeding. It is not a pleasant job in the winter; especially at night when temperatures fall to their lowest levels.

It always seems we have more trouble with the electric fencing during the winter. Keeping the fences hot so the horses will remain in the areas where they are supposed to be is more difficult. The horses love the cold weather and it may be due to them being friskier. The fences have to be checked often to make sure they are fully charging. (*Cont. on Page 2*)

News from the Herd

Sonoma finished his EPM treatment and is doing well. He was retested and is doing fine. We will need to retest him in about 8 weeks since one of his numbers is higher than we want to see.

Stetson has been treated twice for EPM. Finally his titers are way down. He has a phobia of being loaded on a trailer and we are working to overcome the issue. He was in a trailer accident before we got him. We have backed the truck and trailer into the field and little by little we are moving his feed tub into the trailer. This big boy loves to eat and we hope his will help to get him over his fear.

Sonoma had gas colic and it was quickly remedied with tubing and sedation.

Hopi had a choke and it had dissipated by the time the vet arrived.

Rabies Vaccination was given to 24 of the horses that needed it. We divide the herd into two groups so we do not have all the expense at one time.

Medical needs costs HPS each month. We order 12 tubes of triple antibiotic eye ointment at a time so we do not run out. Pergolide powder is needed for the Cushing's horses to keep them from health threatening issues. It cost \$1.00 a dose and about \$200.00 when we order two containers. (We go through it faster with the number of horses that need Pergolide.)

Thank you for making the needed treatments and medications possible for the rescues. Any size donation is so needed!

It is not unusual to see five or six horses lying flat out on the ground soaking up the sun. One would think that the ground would feel really cold to them, but they really love lying in the sun.

We took in three ducks during the summer. The people who had them lived in town and could not believe the mess that three ducks made in the house. There was one baby Mallard duck and two immature India Runner ducks and the Mallard left when the other ducks went further South. India Runner duck cannot fly and they have amused us since they arrived. A wild Mallard hatched her eggs late and the four babies were not mature enough to leave with the other wild ducks. They are wintering over at the sanctuary. We feed our free ranging chickens all winter and all the ducks come and help themselves. They spend most of their time at the pond. We hope all of them can stay safe from predators.

Pumpkin and Zucchini, the two rescued kitties have grown wonderful coats. They spend most nights in the kitty huts in the feed room. Turk, our rescued life stock guard dog, also seems to enjoy the cold weather. He has a great indoor shelter with a dog bed and a huge pile of hay. He spends most of his time outside and is a lot more active now that it is cold.

All the creators at the sanctuary need care and we want to be able to provide for all their needs. We can only provide for two rescued kitties and two rescued dogs. The other dog is a house guard dog and is great company. She is coming 11 years old and has not been with us for even a year. She lets me know when a strange vehicle pulls in the drive.

The volunteers are the only ones not enjoying the cold weather.


