The Holiday Season

After a drop in donations during the Great Recession, individual 2008, giving has been increasing in both current and inflation-adjusted dollars for the last couple years, although it has not recovered to pre-recession levels. According to *Giving USA*, individual giving peaked in 2005, staying relatively level before dropping in the first year of the recession (2008) and again in the following year. Every year since 2009 has seen a gradual increase, but has not returned to 2005 level. What saved HPS during the recession was an estate that was left to the horses. This is a "Thank you, God!"

The last few months of the year make up what is commonly called the Giving Season for the nonprofit community. As the holidays near, people may feel encouraged to give more generously than during the rest of the year. Nonprofits rely on receiving the largest portion of donations during October through January. Studies show that the nonprofits receive 16% to 50% of the funds they need for the upcoming year's expenses during the Giving Season.

The yearly expenses have been close to \$154,000.00 a year for the last few years. There have been so many horses at the sanctuary with very serious conditions that are costly. Good news is that the horses were here and we were able to provide everything they needed.

We need you to open your hearts and make a donation to aid the care of the 31 horses presently at the sanctuary. You know we will be aiding more horses in need during the coming year. We never know how many will need us and we need to be ready to provide for them.

Horses were helped across many states by HPS sharing the information we have learned over the many, many years of curing horses with odd illnesses and some common ones. The educational part of the Horse



Protection Society is an important commitment we have made to aid horses whenever possible. Please make sure we are able to continue in the future.
